- **Albavale** (orchard) - Karragullen area (FSS p72).
- **Appleton** (Archbishop George W) - Consecrated St Mary in the Valley Church, Kelmscott in the 1960s (FSS p150).
- ~~**Asplin** (Frederick John) — owned Lot 383 Lake Road (now part of Champion Lakes development) from February 1954 to his death on 24 December 1964 (C/T Vol 815 Folio 64.H)~~
- **Austin** (two Misses) - Ran a greengrocery in Third Road, Armadale early 1900s (FSS p100).
- **Atkins** (W) - One of the contractors on the East Perth – Pinjarra railway line construction through Armadale (FSS pp57, 75).
- **Bailey** (Job) - Landlord of the Narrogin Inn in the early 1900s (FSS p91).
- **Barron** (Sgt Edward) - Probably sergeant in charge at Kelmscott in 1830s (FSS pp13, 14, 17).
- ~~**Bates** (Daisy) — Involved in naming Karragullen (FSS p67). *TOO SIMILAR TO BATE.*~~
- ~~**Baudin** (Commodore) — French captain of the Geographe. Visited WA in 1801 (FSS p3).~~
- **Beegebar** (siding) railway siding near Challis (FSS p58).
- **Belches** (Lieutenant) One of Captain Stirling’s party exploring the Swan River 1827 (FSS p4).
- **Bellas** (Nurse M) First nurse to register for midwifery training at King Edward Memorial Hospital. Opened a hospital in Kelmscott in 1924 (FSS p118).
- ~~**Benson** (Dr & Mrs) — Held surgery in River Road, Kelmscott from 1911 (FSS pp117, 118).~~
- **Berican** (paddock) – Somewhere off Brookton Highway. Logs from there were used to build the bush log cabin (that became Chalet Healy?) (FSS p133).
- **Berkshire** (ship) - Constable Cronin and family arrived on this ship in 1855 (FSS p24).
- **Betheras** (Miss) – Teacher at Roleystone school some time after 1914 (FSS p111).
- **Beukers** (Pastor J) – Congregational minister. Helped revitalise scout movement in Armadale c1914 (FSS p124).
- **Bickford** (Mrs) – Storekeeper in Kelmscott early 1900s (FSS p102).
- **Birch** – Owner of a farm off Seventh Avenue.
- **Boas** (Harold) – Architect and town planning adviser to Armadale Kelmscott Roads Board in late 1950s (FSS p147).
- **Boatwright** (Miss L) – Teacher in temporary school held in the Mechanics Institute hall late 1890s (FSS p88).
- **Boyle** (I G) – General storekeeper in Kelmscott in early 1900s (FSS p101).
- ~~**Bransby** — Owned horse property on Wungong Road.~~
- **Bridecake** (tearooms) – In Jull Street in the early 1900s, owned by Mr McKinlay and later Mr Blackburn (FSS p100).
- **Bright** (Mrs) – Midwife in Armadale district 1902 – 1905 (FSS p117).
- **Bristow** (H) – elected Member 1908.
- **Caldwell** (Mrs E) – Haberdashery in Jull Street, Armadale in early 1900s (FSS pp97, 98).
- **Campion** (Sir William) - Governor of WA in 1930 who formally opened Araluen on 9 November 1930 (FSS p132). *MAY BE TOO SIMILAR TO CHAMPION.*
- **Capstick** (Constable Charles) – Policeman in Armadale 1934 – 1939 (FSS p98).
- **Clare** (W) – Farmer for many years in the now Champion Lakes complex area.
- **Clause** (F R) – Surgeon with Captain Stirling’s party exploring the Swan River 1827 (FSS p4).

- **Clouett** (Alf) – First garage owner in Armadale (Eleventh Avenue) in early 1900s (FSS p119).
- **Cockshott** (R J) – Elected Member 1931 – 1932.
- **Cole** (Miss, and Miss C H) – Ran newsagency on corner of Third Road and Jull Street in early 1900s (FSS pp97, 99).
- ~~**Colyer** (Dr N) – Armadale’s first full time resident doctor from 1955 (FSS p144).~~
- **Compton** (Francis) – Leased the Buckingham’s farm at Moraba when they moved to Roleystone in 1860 (FSS pp36, 39).
- **Courtney** – Bootmaker in Armadale in the early 1900s (FSS p100).
- **Cowie** (A J) – Policeman in Armadale 1950s on (FSS p145). *MAY BE TOO SIMILAR TO COWES.*
- **Crocker** (C C) – One of the owners of Derry Nasura vineyard following Sir Arthur Stepney (FSS p104).
- **Currie** (Commander) – Explored along the Canning River in the new colony (FSS p8).
- **Davidson** (D J) – Blacksmith and wheelwright in Third Road, Armadale 1912 on (FSS p99).
- **Dawkins** (Muriel) – Lived above Leys Road. Related to C Y O’Connor.
- **Dempsey** – Horse trainer and breeder of trotters and pacers on a property on Wungong Road.
- **De Vos** – Lived on the corner of Forrest and Eleventh Roads.
- **Dickinson** ( R R) – Licensee of the Travellers Arms in late 1930s (FSS p137).
- **Donavon** (Engine driver) – on the Karragullen line c1912 (FSS p73).
- **Dorset** (Hostel).
- **Doyle** (Father) – Priest at St Francis Xavier c1938 (FSS p90).
- **D’Voretksy** (Samuel) – Farmer, dairyman, Roads Board member 1906 - 1908, owned first car in the district (De Dion in 1909) (FSS pp81, 104, 105, 119).
- **Dwall** (N) – Ploughing and carting contractor in Kelmscott in early 1900s (FSS p101).
- ~~**Edsell** (W E) – Grocer and produce merchant in Jull Street in early 1900s (FSS pp96, 97).~~
- **Eivers** (Mrs) – Ran a shop (located opposite a busy water trough in Albany Road) in Kelmscott in early 1900s (FSS p101). *MAY BE TOO SIMILAR TO IVES?*
- **Ethridge** (family) – Lived on Forrest Road. “Ten Pound Poms” who worked for Carl Rodgers on his poultry farm before buying their own property. Both worked at the Armadale Brickworks.
- **Excelsior** (Property) – Name of a poultry farm on Eleventh and (then) Seventh (now Wollaston).
- **Fairweather** (J W) – Farmer in the Champion Lakes complex area 1951 – 1954. Owner of Melody Farm.
- **Firman** (Mrs H) – General storekeeper in Kelmscott in the early 1900s (FSS p101).
- **Flindell** (Mr) – Bought Glosters’ shop (Kelmscott Emporium) in Kelmscott in the 1920s (FSS p101).
- **Fogerty** – Lived on Eleventh Road.
- ~~**Frogmore** (garage) – Bamlett’s garage in Kelmscott in early 1900s (FSS p120).~~
- **Gadd** (Bros) – Worked blue metal quarry near Narrogin Inne (now Pioneer Village School oval?) in 1920s (FSS p125).
- **Gladalan** (Nursery) – Now demolished nursery on Gray Road.
- **Grimaldi** (Rev H) – Rector at Guildford who rode over to Kelmscott periodically and conducted services in the kitchen at Poplar c1860 (FSS p42, 43).
- **Hack** (Colin) – Dairy farmer c1945 on property off Forrest Road.

- **Hamelin** (Captain) – French captain of the Naturaliste who visited Swan River in 1801 (FSS p3).
- **Hames** (W) – Played Father Christmas at East Jandakot (Forrestdale) Christmas tree fete c1911 (FSS p107).
- **Handcock** – Bootmaker in Armadale in the early 1900s (FSS p100).
- **Hardin** (Les) – State soccer player in the 1920s from Armadale (FSS p128).
- **Harper** (Charles MLA) – Partner of Thomas Price (Illawarra Orchard) in tree nursery business in East Guildford 1899 (FSS p 71).
- **Hawter** (J) – Nurseryman from Balingup who was fruit, vegetable and flower judge at first Kelmscott show and further shows 1897 on (FSS p 79).
- **Heathcote** (Midshipman) – In Captain Stirling’s party exploring the Swan River 1827 (FSS p4).
- **Hester** (Thomas) – Landowner in Kelmscott in 1830s (FSS pp12, 16).
- **Hickman** (J) – First teacher at Roleystone school (FSS p88).
- **Hillandale** (house) – Property in Roleystone. Home of the Parkers (FSS p 111).
- **Hodge** (orchard) - Karragullen area (FSS p72).
- **Hunter** (orchard) - Karragullen area (FSS p72).
- **Hynes** (Bob) – played banjo mandolin as part of a band at Muckross Tearooms in the late 1920s (FSS p132).
- **Inchagagin** (property) – Name of Haynes property on Eleventh Road.
- **Invermay** (orchard) - Karragullen area (FSS p72).
- **Jordan** – Lived on Moore Street, Wungong.
- **Joyce** (C) – Elected Member 1924 – 1925.
- **Keevil** – Owned a garage on the corner of Westfield and Seventh Roads.
- **Kerbey** (J Spencer & Mrs) – Licensee of the Narrogin Inn in 1933 at time of visit of the Duke of Gloucester FSS p 138. Mrs Kerbey leased the Muckross Tearooms in 1934 (FSS p132).
- **Kieley** (James) – Teamster for the Kelmscott Roads Board who left on 7 December 1896 (FSS p82).
- **Kitley** (S) – Chemist with English qualifications who ran chemist shop on corner of Third Road and Jull Street for about 7 years from 1913 (FSS p100).
- **Knight** – Bootmaker on Jull street in early 1900s occupying premises previously used by Mrs Caldwell (FSS p98).
- **Laming** (family) – Pioneers of the Urch Road valley around the 1910s/20s (FSS p129).
- ~~**Lannam** – Orchardist on Ninth Road.~~
- **Laufer** (orchardist) – An orchardist from Mundaring who planted the first trees at Illawarra orchard for the then owners (FSS p71).
- **Laverick** (F) – Commenced Rokewood Orchard in the Karragullen district in partnership with Sidney Smailes (FSS p72).
- **Lillyman** – Lived on the Wongong in the vicinity of McNeill Road.
- **Livingstone** (Miss) – Sold home-grown vegetables from her family’s property near Waterwheel Road, Bedforddale late 1800s/early 1900s (FSS p101).
- **Longyear** (George) – Poultry farmer and orchardist 1947 – 1967 on a property named “Anembo” off Forrest Road.
- **Mack** (family) – Farmers in the upper Wongong Brook area in the late 1800s (FSS p51). *TOO SIMILAR TO MACKIE.*
- ~~**MacKinnon** (Nurse) – Midwife operating west of the railway line in the early 1900s (FSS p117).~~

- **Maloney** (Private Edward) – One of the soldiers manning the Kelmscott army post in 1830. A landholder in Kelmscott and died in 1831 (FSS p13).
- **Markwell** (Miss) – Teacher in Kelmscott in 1880s (FSS p51).
- **McKimmie** (Nurse Scott nee McKimmie) – Provided basic medical care in the Armadale area in the early 1900s.
- **Menner** (H) – Baker in Kelmscott in early 1900s (FSS p101).
- **Mercer** - Baker in Kelmscott in early 1900s (FSS p101).
- **Miaweeroona** (orchard) – Orchard in the Karragullen area early 1900s (FSS p72).
- **Montgomery** – Cattle farmer living on Eleventh Road.
- **Moraba** (farm) – Thomas Buckingham and Son’s farm near Gingin which they leased to Francis Compton around 1860 before moving to Roleystone (FSS pp35, 36, 37, 39).
- ~~**Morel** (N) – Manager of Bank of New South Wales in Armadale in 1926 (FSS p125).~~
- **Mosley** (I L) – Landholder in Kelmscott in 1830 (FSS p12).
- **Muckross** (tearooms) – Built by Kate Wilkinson in 1927 (FSS p132).
- **McGillicuddy** (Father John) – First parish priest in 1946 of the separate St Francis Xavier parish (FSS p90).
- **McKinlay** – Baker in Jull Street in early 1900s (FSS p100).
- **McPhail** (A W “Andy”) –Member of the Armadale Kelmscott Roads Board 1956-159 and Chairman 1958-1959.
- **Nairn** (Major) – Kelmscott landholder in the early days who grew potatoes and shipped them to the Calcutta markets (FSS p23).
- **Needham** (Rev H S) – Anglican minister in Armadale in the early 1900s (FSS p89).
- **Nesbit** (Hugh) – a discharged soldier who was killed in a spear attack (one of the factors probably leading up to the battle of Pinjarra) (FSS p17).
- **Newman** (Mrs) – Involved in the Roleystone Country Women’s Association in the 1940s (FSS p141).
- **Nicholl** (Mr) – Licensee of the Railway Hotel in early 1900s (FSS p95).
- ~~**Nugent** (William Lavallin) – Original landowner of Canning Location 30A and being Lot 8 on DP2706 (Lot 8 Buckingham Rd, Kelmscott CT 463/45). Worked for the Lands & Mines Dept with A W Canning (Surveyor). Transferred land title to Horace Hugh Cockram on 30 January 1919.~~
- **Pailthorpe** (John) – Farmer on Wungong Road (formerly Rowley Road).
- **Pegus** (Captain Peter) – Landowner in Kelmscott in 1830s (FSS p16).
- **Pennyroyal** (Dairy) – Dairy in Kelmscott run by Frederick Buckingham (MHI). Thomas Buckingham called the slopes opposite Poplar “the Pennyroyals” a common name given to the blue-mauve plant species menthe spicata in his native England (FSS p75).
- **Pocock** (Saxon) – A pioneer in the Urch Road valley in the early 1900s (FSS p129).
- **Polain** (Miss Ethel) – Monitor in Roleystone’s first school around 1905 (FSS p88).
- **Porter** (Jack) – Played piano in the Canning Dam Band at Muckross Tearooms in the early 1930s (FSS p132).
- ~~**Prickly Bark** – Common name of the Tuditana eucalypt tree (found in Forrestdale Business Park).~~
- **Pyke** (Harold Frank “Jim”) – worked at the Yard (Water Corp depot) in Kelmscott for many years and oversaw many water infrastructure projects in the Armadale district.
- **Radley** (P C) – noted as guard on the mail coach from Albany on 21 April 1886 (FSS p47).
- **Ramillies** (ship) – Convict ship in 1854. Set sail from London on 20 May 1854 arriving Fremantle 7 August 1854. Convict Charles Fancote arrived on this ship. Fancote came to Kelmscott in 1872.

- **Ranson** (Frederick) – First headmaster in new Kelmscott school premises in the Kelmscott hall in 1892. Received the keys for the later purpose-built school premises in 1898 (FSS pp51, 77).
- ~~**Redheart** – Common name for the Eucalyptus decipiens (a rare tree in the Forrestdale Business park area).~~
- **Rhone** – Had a dairy farm of 120 acres at the end of Ranford Road in the vicinity of Anstey Road in the 1920s.
- **Rickett** – Property on Ranford Road.
- **Ritter** (Paul) – Kelmscott resident and town planner (FSS p 156).
- **Roper** (John) – Kelmscott resident in 1833 willing to join the proposed yeomanry corps (FSS p16).
- **Rose** – A builder who erected a school building in 1900 on Third Road, Armadale on land donated by Thomas Saw (FSS p88).
- **Runnymede** (orchard) – founded by Ben Cross along the slopes of the Neerigen Brook. Mr Cross arrived at Bedfordale in 1885 (FSS p51).
- ~~**Ryniker** (family) – Early settlers on the King George Sound Road in the late 1800s (FSS p51).~~
- **Saggers** (butchers) - A butcher in Jull Street, Armadale early 1900s (FSS p99).
- **Schonell** (Edward) – Headmaster at Armadale school in early 1900s (FSS p88).
- **Slavonian** – Vineyard started by Anton Marian in 1901 along the Bunbury Road (later became the Richon Vineyard) (FSS pp101, 102).
- **Steffan** (J) – Veteran of the Franco Prussian War who owned the land in Karragullen on which Miaweeroona orchard was started (FSS p 72).
- **Sturrock** – Teacher at the (old) Westfield Primary School in the 1940s.
- **Sullivan** (Louis) – First recorded licensee of the Travellers Arms in early 1900s. Carted his beer and ice from Armadale station by horse and cart (FSS p101).
- **Swales** – Family lived on Seventh Road. Mr Swales was a prisoner of war.
- **Sweeting** (Rev G) – Clergyman who visited Kelmscott (perhaps bi-monthly) to hold services at St Mary's Church which had no resident clergyman (FSS p 43).
- **Toditiana** – Eucalyptus tree specimens, some of which have been retained in the Forrestdale Business Park.
- **Torridge** – Town site near Kelmscott but not used (FSS p109 and maps).
- **Trusty** (ship) – Set sail from London on 1 June 1848 and arrived at Fremantle on 11 August 1848 with 22 passengers. Thomas Saw and family arrived on this ship (FSS p33).
- **Ullman** (J H) – Manager at Derry Nasura vineyard from 1906 who lifted wine production to 30,000 gallons by the time he retired in 1928 (FSS pp104, 126).
- **Uren** (Nicholas, Grace and family) – Poultry farmer in Kelmscott and prominent in the affairs of the Congregational Church where he was a lay preacher.
- **Wainwright** – Elderly couple who lived on Eleventh Road.
- **Wall** (Mrs) – Ran a boarding house down by the railway line in Armadale in early 1900s (FSS p100).
- **Wallis** (J L) – Elected Member 1928 – 1932.
- **Wattlebank** – Farm homestead built by Mont Taylor in the Forrestdale area around 1894 (near present day Taylor Road) (FSS p54).
- **Webb** (Bill) – Owned saddlery shop on Jull Street in early 1900s (FSS p99).
- **Welbourne** (J) – Drew up the plans for the first St Mary's Church in Kelmscott. Lived in Guildford (FSS p43).
- **White** (L white and J S White) – L White was an elected Member in 1899. J S White was an elected Member 1904 – 1906.

- ~~**Whiting** (J) — One of the original owners of the Armadale Brickworks, c 1902, bought out two years later by another owner, Sir Thomas Coombe (FSS p91).~~
- ~~**Wileockson** (E “Tuck”) — Electrician who wired up Bedfordale for its electricity supply in 1955 (FSS p146).~~
- **Wilkinson** (Kate) – Owner at one stage of the Narrogin Inne and, in 1927, the Muckcross Tearooms. Donated land for St Francis Xavier Church construction (FSS pp90, 132).
- **Yarraville** – Name of a property on Forrest Road.
