## Including Everyone

People with disabilities, people with different cultural or language backgrounds need not be excluded from the benefits of being involved in your Club.

As members of the community, people with disabilities, their families and carers have the same rights as any other person to access all information, services and facilities provided by the Department of Sport and Recreation. These rights are built into State and Commonwealth legislation which makes it unlawful to discriminate against a person with a disability.

It will be of great social and educational value if your club encourages people of culturally diverse backgrounds to join and participate in your club. It is unlawful to discriminate against a person based upon race or place of origin.

Provide disability access and facilities—grants can be accessed to achieve this.

Educate your members about inclusivity and tolerance.

Clearly articulate your club's stance on no tolerance of abuse, particularly in relation to; sex, race, age, or disability.
