





### **BACKGROUND**

At its meeting of 23 April 2001, Council resolved amongst other things to include the mine site known as Cole's Shaft, with associated mullock heap, in Council's Municipal Heritage Inventory.

The shaft lay on the boundary of lots 53 and 54 Summit View, Armadale. A recent subdivision has amended boundaries so the shaft is wholly included in new lot 67. This lot has been purchased by DOLA and created as Reserve 46948 – Historic Site.

### **DETAILS OF PROPOSAL**

DOLA requests that Council agree to undertake the management of the Reserve by accepting a Management Order. A draft Management Order has been forwarded for consideration and the conditions outlined are:

*To be utilised for the designated purpose of "Historic Site" only.*

1. *This land must be cared for, controlled and managed in a manner that aims to:
  - i. *take into account and to conserve the recreational, historic and cultural heritage value and significance of the land; and*
  - ii. *take into account and compliment the character and amenity of the surrounding land.**
2. *No construction or development of any kind, including but not limited to the development and/or construction of buildings, structures or other facilities may be carried out on this land without the prior approval of the Minister for Lands.*
3. *Any construction or development of this land should take into account, and should aim:
  - i. *to conserve the recreational, historic, and cultural heritage value and significance of this land*
  - ii. *to complement the character and amenity of the surrounding land.**

DOLA, in association with the Department of Conservation and Land Management, is arranging for the installation of a removable grate over the shaft at its cost. Once the draft design of the grate is prepared, DOLA will consult with both Council's Technical Services Directorate and the Heritage Council of Western Australia prior to installation. The grate will assist with safety and protection aspects at the, currently, open shaft.

## **COMMENT**

### Technical Services Directorate Comments

The Executive Director Technical Services supports acceptance of the Management Order. It is suggested that for the first several years there will be minimal costs associated with its upkeep. Initially these would be fire management and weed control issues which would be accommodated within the general Parks and Recreation Operating budget. A final cost of development has not been identified at this stage.

Further development of the site within the terms of the Management Order would be the subject of research and proposed within future Five Year Planning reviews. The site is not intended for, or likely to undergo, heavy or frequent usage but would be more of interest for low impact and infrequent geological study or educational research.

Acceptance of the Management Order should be upon the proviso, as agreed by DOLA, that a suitable safety grate be installed at DOLA's expense over the mouth of the mineshaft to provide safety and protection.

### Analysis

Cole's Shaft marks the beginnings of mineral exploration and the commencement of the mining industry in WA. The retention and promotion of the site is important in giving a physical dimension to Armadale's place in the State's history. The Heritage Council of WA commissioned a Geological Survey of the mine as part of its consideration on whether it should be included in the State Register of Heritage Places.

DOLA has purchased the site and created a reserve to preserve the historic and heritage value, indicating the State Government's interest, and Council is offered the opportunity to oversee and manage this important part of the State's history.

The site has remained for many years with minimal maintenance and, with the safety grill soon to be in place, this can continue for the time being. Further consideration can be given to appropriate development of the site and a specific budgeting framework in the future. The mine site is not visible from the road and is in a quiet, hilly area so it is not envisaged that there will be a great many tourist type visitors. The road layout and gradient make it unsuitable for buses to visit. Any visitors by car will be able to park on the sealed access.

Council's liability insurer has visited the site and indicates that, with the safety grill in place, acceptance of the Management Order by Council will not have an adverse effect on the insurance cover.

### **Options**

Council appears to have three options

1. Refuse to accept the Management of the Reserve.
2. Accept the management of the reserve under the conditions in the draft Management Order.
3. Accept the management of the reserve upon a variation of the conditions of the draft Management Order.

### **CONCLUSION**

The mine is an important part of WA's history and has been purchased by DOLA to preserve that heritage importance. The conditions outlined in the draft Management Order appear reasonable to preserve the value and significance of the site and the amenity of the surrounding low density residential area. It is recommended that Council accept the management of the reserve upon the proviso that a suitable safety grate be installed at DOLA's expense over the mouth of the mineshaft.

### **RECOMMEND**

1. **That Council accept management of Reserve 46948, containing Cole's Shaft, under the conditions outlined in the draft Management Order, once a suitable safety grill is fitted at the expense of the Department of Land Administration to the satisfaction of the Executive Director Technical Services and that the Department of Land Administration be advised accordingly.**
2. **That appropriate development of the site in accordance with the conditions of the Management Order be undertaken for inclusion in future Five Year Planning.**

**BACKGROUND**

The following extracts from correspondence received on 19 December 2002 from the WA Electoral Commission explains:

*"The Western Australian Electoral Distribution Commissioners have announced that an electoral distribution will be carried out shortly to determine the electorates for the next State General Election. The six-month process will commence on 5 February 2003, with the final boundaries being determined on 4 August 2003.*

*The Commissioners are required to create electorates in which the number of electors is within plus or minus 15% of the quotient. The quotient for the metropolitan area is 26,454 electors and the quotient for the country areas is 13,735 electors. In determining where to place the electoral boundaries the Commissioners are required to consider a number of factors such as:*

- ? *Community of interest*
- ? *Means of communication and distance from the capital*
- ? *Physical features*
- ? *Existing boundaries of regions and districts*
- ? *Existing local government boundaries*
- ? *The trend of demographic change.*

*Should you decide to make a written suggestion as to how the State electoral boundaries should be drawn or for the naming of the electorate, an information kit to assist in the preparation of written suggestions will be available in the new year on the Electoral Distribution website: [www.boundarieswa.com](http://www.boundarieswa.com). The information kit will also be available, on request, in hardcopy and CD format.”*

With regard to the Information Kit mentioned, presented as an attachment are copy extracts from the kit (selected pages only to provide an initial insight). (**Refer to Attachment “A-1” – Summary of Attachments – buff page.**) Included in this attachment is a timetable indicating that the submission period close date is Friday, 7 March 2003.

## **DETAILS OF PROPOSAL**

The purpose of this report is essentially threefold, i.e.

- to inform Council of the review;
- to ascertain whether Council does or does not wish to make a submission and if it does; then
- to seek initial suggestions/directions from Council as to a process for preparing a submission.

## **COMMENTS**

Should Council wish to make a submission then the suggested options for Committee’s consideration/discussion could be:

- to forward to Councillors the Information Kit, seeking their views and based on that input, officers develop a recommendation to the February 2003 City Strategy Committee reflecting the consensus of views received;
- to establish an informal working group of say 4 or 5 Councillors to workshop a submission response for Council’s consideration;
- appoint an external consultant to assist Council in preparing its submission.

**In Brief:-**

- ✍ Council was advised at its meeting on 21 October 2002 that negotiations with Reading had been effectively terminated and negotiations commenced with the next preferred Tenderer, Grand Cinemas.
- ✍ Grand cinemas reviewed their original tender and submitted a modified proposal which was considered by the Cinema Working Party on 10 Dec 02.
- ✍ The proposal includes a 4-screen cinema configuration with a full range of ancillary commercial tenancies.
- ✍ Council at its meeting on 16 December 2002 approved a variation to Tender 19/01 to entertain a 4 screen cinema complex, with capacity to expand to a 6 to 8 screen cinema complex.
- ✍ Grand have now submitted a variation to its tender based on 4 screens which is to be considered by the Cinema Working Group on Monday, 13<sup>th</sup> January 2003 prior to a report to City Strategy Committee and Council.

### **Background**

At the Council meeting on 21<sup>st</sup> October it was advised that negotiations with Reading had not been able to achieve a satisfactory outcome within Tender expectations or Council's set parameters. Accordingly, negotiations had commenced with the next preferred tenderer, Grand Cinemas.

Grand Cinemas had agreed to review their original tender to assess their capacity to progress within Council's parameters. A revised proposal from Grand was considered by Council at its meeting on 16<sup>th</sup> December where it was agreed to approve a variation to Tender 19/01 to entertain a 4 screen cinema complex, with capacity to expand to a 6 to 8 screen cinema complex.

The Cinema Working Party will be meeting on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> January 2003 to discuss the revised Grand Theatre Co. tender and a report on the outcome of the discussions will be submitted as a late item for Committee consideration.

### Who may make a written submission?

### How can I take part in the electoral distribution process?

There are three opportunities to contribute.

1. In the first stage of the process the public is given 30 days to lodge written suggestions.
2. The written suggestions are then made available for public perusal. The public has 14 days to make written comments on these suggestions.
3. When the Electoral Distribution Commissioners publish the proposed boundaries the public has 30 days to lodge written objections.

### What should I consider in my submission?

A submission may contain suggestions as to the placement of district and region boundaries. Suggestions may also include the name to be given to a district. Region names are prescribed within the legislation and cannot be altered.

The *Electoral Distribution Act 1947* provides the basis for the conduct of an electoral distribution and outlines the constraints under which the Electoral Distribution Commissioners will operate when conducting the 2003 Electoral Distribution.

In particular:

- you should have regard for the "quotients" for the State, provided in section 6 of the Act, as this will determine the minimum and maximum number of electors permitted in each electoral district that you propose.
- you should give consideration to the following matters, pursuant to section 7 of the *Electoral Distribution Act 1947*:
  - community of interest
  - means of communication and distance from the capital
  - physical features
  - existing boundaries of regions and districts
  - existing local government boundaries
  - the trend of demographic changes

Your submission should refer to the criteria for the electoral distribution, listed above, and electoral enrolment figures either displayed on the website or available for download to support any arguments that you have for changes.

This website will play a significant role in the provision of information about the electoral distribution. Information will be updated regularly. **How do I make a submission?**

If you wish to make suggestions about proposed electoral boundaries, comments on written suggestions about the proposed electoral boundaries or object to the proposed boundaries determined by the Electoral Distribution Commissioners, you may write to:

Provision of an electronic version on 3-½ inch diskette or CD would also be appreciated. The preferred electronic formats are Microsoft Word and Adobe Acrobat (PDF, portable document format). We encourage you to provide an electronic version so that we can keep file sizes to a minimum. If we have to scan documents the file sizes will be much larger.

It is important that you provide contact details in your submission, including your full name, postal address, daytime telephone number, mobile telephone number, email address and fax number. This will enable us to acknowledge your submission and contact you if we require further information.



## EAST METROPOLITAN REGION




This map represents the boundaries of the district as determined by the Electoral Distribution Commissioners and published in the Government Gazette on 28 November 1994.

**Armadale**




This map represents the boundaries of the district as determined by the Electoral Distribution Commissioners and published in the Government Gazette on 28 November 1994.
