LOCAL GOVERNMENT (OFFICIAL CONDUCT) AMENDMENT BILL 2005

Introduction and First Reading

Bill introduced, on motion by Mr J.J.M. Bowler (Minister for Local Government and Regional Development), and read a first time.

Explanatory memorandum presented by the minister.

Second Reading

MR J.J.M. BOWLER (Murchison-Eyre - Minister for Local Government and Regional Development) [12.31 pm]: I move -

That the bill be now read a second time.

The bill represents a new and welcome initiative for the local government sector. To date, when a local government has encountered operational problems that have been caused by an individual elected member or a small group of elected members, the state government's only recourse has been to use provisions in the Local Government Act 1995 that affect all council members. This bill provides for a new complaints system whereby the conduct of individual council members can be reviewed specifically. It means that if an individual elected member or a small group of elected members act inappropriately, their behaviour can be addressed specifically. Further, any punishment deemed necessary will impinge only on the member or members identified as causing the problem.

The bill establishes a statewide standards panel to deal with complaints about minor breaches. These are to be contraventions of a new code, or rules, of conduct. If the standards panel determines that there has been a contravention of the new code, it can impose penalties, including public censure, public apology or an order to undertake training. The bill also enables allegations of serious breaches - that is, a contravention of an act or regulations - to be referred to the Director General of the Department of Local Government and Regional Development. The director general will then determine whether to refer the matter to the State Administrative Tribunal, refer the matter to another enforcement agency or take direct prosecution action. SAT will be able to impose the same penalties as a standards panel on individual elected members. However, in addition, it will be able to suspend a council member for a period of not more than six months or disqualify a council

INTEGRITY COORDINATING GROUP

We are writing to you to advise that we, together with the Auditor General, have formed the Integrity Coordinating Group to promote and strengthen integrity within WA public bodies.

Apart from the Auditor General, we are responsible for various aspects of integrity in WA local government authorities, and we recognise a need for policy coherence and operational coordination between our organisations.

Individual and collective integrity is essential for public bodies to deliver their services effectively in accordance with legal requirements. However, we recognise that building and sustaining integrity within organisations is a complex task, which is why we are taking an integrated approach.

Each year, we will identify a number of key integrity themes as suitable for collaboration and will work together to deliver tools that will assist public bodies in promoting integrity. One of this year's key projects is the development of a conflict of interest toolkit to assist public bodies identify actual and perceived conflicts of interest. We will be developing a common understanding of the meaning of integrity and other key integrity terms, and will also be examining mechanisms for reporting improper conduct to our Offices to ensure that individuals who report this conduct within their organisations, and those who report this conduct to us, understand the processes involved.

The Group will also be undertaking coordinated communication and education strategies to ensure consistent messages about integrity are communicated by our organisations. Over time, we will also be conducting coordinated research, evaluation and monitoring of the implementation of integrity and accountability with a view to improving systems across the WA State and local government sectors.

We enclose a brochure about the Integrity Coordinating Group for your information, which includes information on our individual roles. We have written to the Chief Executive Officers of local and regional local government authorities separately. Integrity means earning and sustaining public trust by:

- · Serving the public interest
- Using powers responsibly
- · Acting with honesty and transparency
- Preventing and addressing improper conduct

This is demonstrated by employees who:

- Serve the public interest with integrity by avoiding real or apparent conflicts of interest and not allowing decisions or actions to be influenced by personal or sectional interests.
- Use powers for the purpose, and in the manner, for which they were intended.
- Act without bias, make decisions by following fair and objective decision-making processes and give reasons for decisions where required.
- Behave honestly and transparently, disclosing facts, not hiding or distorting them. This includes preventing, addressing and reporting corruption, fraud and other forms of improper conduct.

The Integrity Coordinating Group

has been formed to promote and strengthen integrity in WA public bodies. Individual and collective integrity is essential for these bodies to deliver their services effectively in accordance with legal requirements. The group is collaborating to support integrity in public bodies by encouraging coordinated research, evaluation and monitoring and fostering operational cooperation and consistency in communication and education.

The member bodies of the Integrity Coordinating Group also support integrity through their independent roles under their own legislation (as outlined in this brochure) and their specific roles to receive public interest disclosures under the *Public Interest Disclosure Act 2003.*

Our operating environment

WA public bodies include several hundred government departments, statutory authorities, local governments and other bodies, varying in size from those employing a few people to those employing many thousands. Together these bodies employ about 147 000 people. They generate a combined revenue and expenditure in excess of \$36 billion annually, in providing a range of services, and are responsible for assets valued at over \$70 billion.

Swan Alcoa Landcare Program 2006 Funding Allocations

Congratulations! The funding allocations from the Swan Alcoa Landcare Program (SALP) 2006 have been decided and groups in your area will receive in excess of \$ 40,000 funding towards a number of natural resource management (NRM) projects. Successful applicants will receive their cheques at a special funding ceremony at the Perth Zoo to be held on 8 February 2006. Your invitation to the event will follow shortly.

SALP provides funds for community groups, and local governments in partnership with community, for on-ground revegetation and rehabilitation projects within the Swan region.

The Program is managed by the Swan Catchment Council, and is jointly funded by Alcoa World Alumina Australia and the Swan River Trust. This year approximately 100 projects received in excess of \$550,000 in SALP funds. I have attached a list of projects that were successful in receiving SALP funding within your local government authority.

To achieve continuous improvement in the Program a reporting process was introduced in the 2004 funding round. Information gathered through the reporting process included information on the environmental impact of projects and the partnership contributions leveraged, through the program.

The 2004 reporting process has shown that the estimated funding support and in-kind contributions from Local Government in 2004 was approximately \$240,000. This is an impressive amount and therefore, for the first time, we will be presenting a special Local Government Recognition Award at the funding ceremony to be held in February.

REVIEW OF LOCAL ROADS GRANTS - SUBMISSION OUT EARLY JANUARY

As previously advised, the Commonwealth Grants Commission is undertaking a review of the interstate distribution of the *Local Road Grants* with initial submissions closing on **Sunday 15 January**.

The Association has been requested to coordinate a submission on behalf of Local Government. The submission is currently being prepared in conjunction with a small focus group of senior Local Government staff. It is intended that the submission will focus on maintaining the current 15.3% funding WA Councils receive from the Local Road Grants pool. Due to the short time frame for submissions, it will be necessary to send out the draft Association submission to Councils for feedback in early January, with a rapid response on what positions may need amending or issues that need to be added required by **Thursday 12 January**.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ENERGY PROJECT

<u>CARAVAN PARKS AND CAMPING GROUNDS ACT 1995 - SUBMISSION DEADLINE EXTENDED</u>

The Department of Local Government and Regional Development (DLGRD) are undertaking a review of the *Caravan Parks and Camping Grounds Act 1995*. Deadline for submission was Friday 23 December. A Discussion Paper has been prepared and can be downloaded from the Department's website at www.dlgrd.wa.gov.au.

On behalf of Members, the Association wrote to DLGRD requesting an extension for Council submissions. DLGRD responded and are prepared to accept submissions in January 2006.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT LEADING THE COMMUNITY ON WATER USE EFFICIENCY

In 2003, the State Water Strategy introduced the concept of water conservation plans linked to the water licensing process, as a tool for improving the efficiency of water users.

The Association, EMRC, the Cities of Stirling, Melville, and Mandurah, ICLEI and the Water and Rivers Commission have contracted Sports Turf Technology to develop a model water conservation plant.

It is intended that eventually all Councils with water licenses will adopt a water conservation plan to achieve water use efficiency targets and set an example for others to follow.

Cities set for rapid growth

Another 2.5m people may need to be squeezed into Australia's capital cities over the 15 years, according to modelling undertaken by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. Currently, 12.8m people live in the capitals, but based on moderate assumptions about population and immigrant growth, Sydney will have a population in excess of 5m by 2025 with Melbourne exceeding this figure by 2049. Brisbane is expected to grow at least 35% to 2.4 million by 2050 while Perth will be almost 30% larger with 1.9 million residents. In contrast, Hobart's population is expected to peak at 226,000

Ruddock's \$14m for emergency services

Federal Attorney-General Philip Ruddock yesterday announced \$14m in grants for more than 400 projects under the Working Together to Manage Emergencies program. The funding was shared across the two key components of the program council projects and projects run by emergency service volunteers. The Australian Government has committed a total of \$16m for volunteer projects and \$30m for council projects over four years. A full list of successful projects has been posted to the Attorney-General's website. Applications for the 2006-07 round will open this month and are due by 3 March next year.

GA set for Darwin 2007

The ALGA Board yesterday decided to hold the 2007 National General Assembly of Local Government in Darwin. The decision came in the wake of a strong campaign by the Lord Mayor of Darwin, Peter Adamson, with the support of the Local Government Association of the Northern Territory. The 2006 National Local Roads and Transport Congress will be held in Alice Springs to mark the second 'Year of the Outback'.

Low allowances a barrier to participation

The low level of councillor allowances in South Australia was a barrier to greater diversity among local government candidates, the President of the SA Local Government Association Mayor John Rich, said this week. He wants to see allowances increased in the lead up to the November 2006 council elections. A study by Professor Dean Jaensch of Flinders University shows councillors put in an average of 73 hours a month on council duties, but the current maximum allowance is the equivalent of \$8.31 an hour or less than half pay rates for adult casual staff at McDonalds.

Macklin backs fair funding

The text of the closing address to the National General Assembly - delivered by Deputy Leader of the Opposition Jenny Macklin - has now been posted to ALGA's website. Until now, only an audio file had been available. Ms Macklin's address has been in some demand, not least for her comments on fair funding. "Labor backs your call for fair funding because we understand the importance of local government and local services," she told Assembly delegates on 10 November.

ALGA launches age-friendly built environment resource paper

ALGA has today launched a new resource paper, Agefriendly built environments: Opportunities for local government. It contains case studies and six fact sheets, which cover a range of age-friendly built environment issues of relevance to councils. ALGA places a high priority on promoting ageing issues and is supporting the Australian Government's National Speakers Series, 'A Community for All Ages – Building the Future'. The paper is an initiative of the Australian Local Government Population Ageing Action Plan , which aims to build the capacity of local government to respond to ageing communities.



From the President

Without doubt, 2005 has been a good one for ALGA and local government at the national level. Our lobbying work has not gone unrewarded.

April: The Australian Government releases council-friendly guidelines for accessing the \$1.6bn Water Smart grant program.



May: The Australian Government delivered on its election commitments to local government. And it delivered in full, bringing benefits worth hundreds of millions of dollars to councils and communities across the country.

June: Jim Lloyd responded - after lengthy deliberation - to the Fair Share report. There were four big commitments. An intergovernmental agreement to counter cost shifting would be developed. Local government would be recognised by Federal Parliament. The Productivity Commission would review barriers to council revenue. And the Commonwealth Grants Commission would examine the interstate distribution of the roads component of financial assistance grants.

July: Roads to Recovery Mark II got underway, a program now worth \$1.45bn to local government over the next four years:

November: Jim Lloyd committed a further \$100m to the regional roads component of the Roads to Recovery/AusLink program, with Deputy PM Mark Vaile suggesting more funding will follow.

December: Labor offered the prospect of a new funding deal for local government, suggesting major reform to financial assistance grants and a focus on increasing the quantum available to local government.

This is all good news. But the big battles still lie ahead. Our goals for 2006 are clear. We must vigorously pursue our campaign for fair funding, fair treatment and formal recognition. To achieve fair funding, we will commission an economic consultancy to

Editorial

2005 has seen a number of legislative changes affecting Local Governments. The start of the year saw the commencement of the State Administrative Tribunal, replacing the Town Planning Appeal Tribunal and various appeals to the Minister for Local Government under the Local Government Act. In May the Local Court and the Court of Petty Sessions were replaced by the Magistrates Court, resulting in many changes to the procedures in the Court most commonly used by Local Government. There have also been amendments to the Local Government Act. Previous issues of the Local Government Bulletin have covered each of these.

Parliament has now added the *Planning and Development Act 2005*, which was assented to on 12 December 2005, and the *Defamation Act 2005*, which becomes operative on 1 January 2006. Still in the wings are the *Local Government (Official Conduct)* Amendment Bill 2005 and the *Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions)* Amendment Bill 2005, plus the prospect of the new Public Health Bill some time in 2006.

Finally, after what is probably the longest gestation of any recent legislation, the Contaminated Sites Act may come into force shortly, once the Contaminated Sites Regulations are finalised and gazetted.

This issue of the Local Government Bulletin includes brief notes on most of the above, as well as a follow-up article on matters arising from the Recommendations of the Inquiry into the City of Joondalup and a review of a recent decision of the Supreme Court dealing with the tendering process.

I and the other members of the Local Government team at Jackson McDonald wish all of you a very merry Christmas, a relaxing break and a happy and fulfilling year in 2006. We look forward to a continued association with you next year.

Update on matters from the Joondalup Inquiry

On 2 December 2005 the Inquiry into the City Of Joondalup under the Local Government Act 1995 reached its conclusion, with the Minister for Local Government doing what was almost universally anticipated – dismissing the Council of the City of Joondalup in accordance with Recommendation 1 of the Report. In a Statement released on 2 December 2005 the Minister also confirmed his rejection of Recommendation 2, which raised the possibility of all elected Councils being replaced with appointed Commissioners, and said of the remaining Recommendations –

Planning and Development Act 2005

The previous Planning and Development Bill 2004 was introduced into the Legislative Assembly on 30 June 2004, but lapsed on 23 January 2005. The Planning and Development Bill 2005 was introduced into the Legislative Assembly on 7 April 2005 and received the assent of Parliament on 12 December 2005, together with the Planning and Development (Consequential and Transitional Provisions) Act 2005. Both will come into operation on a date to be proclaimed.

The Planning and Development Act is intended primarily to consolidate Western Australia's three main pieces of planning legislation – the Western Australian Planning Commission Act 1985, the Metropolitan Region Town Planning Scheme Act 1959 and the Town Planning and Development Act 1928. As set out in the Explanatory Memorandum for the Bill, however, the consolidation also presented the opportunity to make several amendments to the planning system.

- Greater effectiveness in achieving Government policy objectives by requiring the WAPC to prepare a written statement setting out the planning objectives of a region scheme or amendment and requiring a local government to have due regard to the written statement of planning objectives in preparing a consequential amendments to its local scheme;
- Promoting sustainability by including sustainable land use and development as a fundamental and underlying purpose of
 the planning legislation; expanding the functions of the WAPC to include advising on sustainable land use and development;
 expanding the membership of the WAPC to include the Directors General of the Department of Industry and Resources and
 Department of Housing and Works; and providing that planning schemes can include provisions for promoting sustainable
 land use and development;
- Streamlining planning procedures in respect of region scheme processes, the review of local government schemes and for the subdivision of land;
- Providing greater certainty and consistency particularly in the relationship between subdivision and local government schemes; exemption of subdivision works from development approvals; common compensation provisions; and common enforcement provisions, including the introduction of infringement notices for minor offences;
- Providing equity and fairness by expanding the current arrangements for consultation on Statements of Planning Policy and region schemes, and expanding the right to apply for an application for review by introducing a right to apply for a review of the decision of a local government on the characterisation of a use under a scheme.

It remains to be seen of course whether the Act will achieve these aims and, if it does, what impact it has on town planning practice. One particular area of interest is the right to apply for review a decision of a Local Government as to the characterisation of a use under a town planning scheme. This provision of the Act effectively reverses a principle dating back to MMF Holdings Pty Ltd v Town of Claremant (Unreported; Town Planning Court of Western Australia; 13 March 1977) and endorsed by the Supreme Court of Western Australia in several decisions, including most recently in City of Swan v Taylor [2005] WASCA 88. It appears, however, that the right of review will only apply to this characterisation issue and will not also extend to allow review of other "jurisdictional facts" discussed in the Taylor decision and by the State Administrative Tribunal in O'Connor v Town of Victoria Park [2005] WASAT 161. We will report in more detail on this and other issues under the Planning and Development Act in future editions of the Local Government Bulletin.

Defamation Act 2005

25 years ago, the Australian Law Reform Commission and the Law Reform of Western Australia published reports recommending widespread reform of defamation law in Australia, and in March 2005 the Standing Committee of Attorneys General agreed to finally implement model uniform defamation legislation across all States and Territories. As part of this process the Defamation Bill 2005 was introduced into the Legislative Assembly on 17 August 2005, following the introduction of identical Bills in South Australia, Victoria and New South Wales. The Bill was referred to the Standing Committee on Uniform Legislation and Statutes Review and on 1 December 2005 the Legislative Assembly agreed to amendments to the Bill. The uniform legislation has now been passed by all 6 States.

The Defamation Act 2005 comes into operation on 1 January 2006, avoiding the Federal Government's threat to introduce its own over-riding legislation if this deadline was not achieved.

The main features of the Act, set out in the Explanatory Memorandum, are as follows:

the retention, with some modifications, of the common law of defamation to determine civil liability for defamation;

New Public Health Act

The "New Public Health Act – A Discussion Paper," released in June 2005, represents the first major step in a comprehensive review of the *Health Act* and reform of public health laws in Western Australia. The consultation period on the Discussion Paper, which was extended by 2 months, closed on 30 November 2005.

The Department of Health has said that submissions on the Discussion Paper will be used to guide the drafting of the future Bill, which will also then be released for public comment.

Any detailed consideration of the content of the Discussion Paper is beyond the scope of this article, but in summary it describes the operation of the *Health Act* under a number of headings, identifies the limitations of the current laws and suggests options and approaches for new legislation.

One of the principal changes foreshadowed by the Discussion Paper is a shift from a "reactive" to a "proactive" system of the management of risks to public health. An underpinning statutory duty is proposed as follows -

A person must not undertake any activity that may result in harm to health unless the person takes all reasonable and practical measures to eliminate the possibility of that harm occurring.

The final scope of this statutory duty, the measures available to health officers to ensure compliance through abatement of activities and the means to prosecute or otherwise enforce breaches of the duty are all matters that require, and deserve, careful consideration.

Another matter raised by the Discussion Paper and worthy of highlighting is the continuing role of Local Government in health matters. In particular, the Discussion Paper asks whether the public health powers, functions and responsibilities of Local Government should be spelt out in the new legislation in more detail than currently exists, and reference is made to examples in the Tasmanian and South Australian health legislation. This would appear to be a desirable objective – as would a similar specification of the powers of the Minister for Health and the Executive Director, Public Health.

The Discussion Paper also indicates that any new health legislation will expressly bind the State and its agencies and instrumentalities. This is a welcome clarification, as the current Health Act predates the modern drafting practice of specifically providing whether legislation binds the Crown, and addresses the situation which has arisen in cases such as Atyeo v Aboriginal Lands Trust (1996) 93 LGERA 57, referred to in the Discussion Paper, in which the Supreme Court found that at least certain provisions of the Health Act did not apply to Crown agencies.

Other significant issues from a legal perspective include the licensing of places, products and activities, provisions of the creation and enforcement of Local Laws and the proposal for a "health impact assessment" as part of non-health-related decision-making.

As indicated above, a detailed consideration of the content of the Discussion paper is not possible in this article, but future issues of the Bulletin will provide comments on aspects of the draft Bill when it is released in 2006.

Other pending legislative changes affecting Local Government

Amongst the legislation still before the Parliament are two Bills to amend provisions of the Local Government Act 1995 and the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1960.

The Local Government (Official Conduct) Amendment Bill 2005 was introduced in the Legislative Assembly and had its Second Reading on 16 November 2005. It contains long-awaited provisions to introduce a new system for the review of the conduct of elected Council members. As part of the Second Reading speech, the Minister for Local Government described the Bill as follows -

This bill provides for a new complaints system whereby the conduct of individual council members can be reviewed specifically. It means that if an individual elected member or a small group of elected members act inappropriately, their behaviour can be addressed specifically. Further, any punishment deemed necessary will impinge only on the member or members identified as causina the problem.

Significant points that emerge from the case

The Authority invited Westpoint to tender but Dockpride, a subsidiary of Westpoint, submitted the tender. The Authority tried, unsuccessfully, to argue that it had not invited Dockpride to tender and that it had no agreement with Dockpride in respect of the tender. Nevertheless the Court held that on the basis of the terms in the tender documents and by Dockpride's and the Authority's conduct, it was to be inferred that they intended to enter into a preliminary or process contract, into which terms can be implied. For example, it was implied into the process contract that the Authority must evaluate tenders against the Guidelines, treat tenderers fairly and act in good faith.

Did the Authority breach an implied contractual term?

The plaintiffs argued that the Authority breached implied contractual terms, as the Authority did not adhere strictly to the Guidelines and did not act fairly and in good faith.

The Court decided that the Guidelines were not a series of mandatory requirements, compliance with which was a pre-condition to the Authority considering or accepting a tender. Rather, the Guidelines provided the Authority with a significant amount of discretion in determining what in its opinion constituted acceptable variances from the principles and requirements in the Guidelines. In addition, although Blackburne did not strictly conform with the Guidelines, clause 6 of the Conditions of Tender provided that the Authority was not obliged to accept the highest or any tender, nor was it precluded from accepting a tender which did not strictly conform with the terms of the tender documents.

Clause 6 prohibited the Authority from accepting tenders, which were completely unresponsive to the Guidelines but nevertheless provided the Authority with the option of considering tenders that were not in strict conformity. Although Blackburne's design did not correspond exactly with the Guidelines, its tender was not unresponsive to the Guidelines, notwithstanding the variances.

The plaintiffs also asserted that the Authority failed to act fairly and in good faith towards it, as the Authority did not communicate to the plaintiffs that it was considering Blackburne's tender which did not strictly comply with the guidelines. Furthermore, the Authority communicated information to Blackburne with respect to one of the Guidelines, which was not communicated to the plaintiffs. The court held that the Authority had no obligation to communicate this information to the plaintiffs and if it had done so would have breached its duty of confidentiality and its duty to act fairly.

Did the Authority engage in misleading and deceptive conduct?

The plaintiffs also claimed that the Authority had breached section 52 of the *Trade Practices Act 1974* ("TPA") and section 10 of the *Fair Trading Act 1987* ("FTA"). The plaintiffs tried to establish that the Authority had made various written, character, oral, and implied representations, which amounted to deceptive and misleading conduct.

The Court found that the Authority had made some of the representations asserted by the plaintiffs in relation to the tender and that the Authority's conduct was in trade or commerce. However, the Court held that the Authority did not breach any of these representations and had not engaged in deceptive and misleading conduct, as a reasonable person in the same position as the plaintiffs would not have acted as the plaintiffs did. For example, the plaintiffs falsely believed that the Authority would only accept tenders that strictly complied with the Guidelines, which was not in fact the case.

Comments

The case highlights the following:

- · Principals and parties submitting tenders may enter into a process contract, which can have terms implied into it.
- When preparing a request for tender, ensure that you give careful consideration to whether the requirements are intended to be mandatory and whether strict compliance or conformity with any criteria is required.
- \cdot $\,$ Be aware of the possible impact that the TPA and FTA can have upon tendering.

Minister dismisses Joondalup Council

The councillors of the City of Joondalup were today dismissed by Local Government and Regional Development Minister John Bowler.

The dismissal was the main recommendation of the Inquiry into the City of Joondalup, prepared by Mr Greg McIntyre SC.

Mr Bowler said the 625-page report concluded that the council failed to provide good government by making decisions that were not rational or ethically sound.

The dismissal of the council provided an opportunity for the Joondalup community to elect fresh representation.

"While under the Act the dismissed councillors are allowed to again stand for election, I would hope there would be a clean break from the long-running situation and enable the City of Joondalup to re-establish itself as a quality local government," the Minister said

Mr Bowler said election of new councillors for the City of Joondalup would be held on May 6, 2006.

The Minister previously reaffirmed the Government was committed to maintaining a system of democratically elected councils and rejected the report's second recommendation that proposed replacing democratically elected councillors with permanent commissioners.

The report is damning of a number of individual councillors who, Mr McIntyre believed, engaged in conduct that was unreasonable, inappropriate and otherwise unethical. This conduct contributed to the poor relationships within the council and to its eventual dysfunction.

Mr McIntyre is also damning of the conduct of Mr Denis Smith, the former CEO of the City of Joondalup. Thirteen of the 72 specific conclusions were adverse to Mr Smith.

"Several of the recommendations by Mr McIntyre promote good practice by local government in general and will be considered," Mr Bowler said.

"Already we have dramatically tightened the way chief executive officers are appointed to present a repetition of the Smith fiasco, plus I have introduced into Parliament the Local Government Official Conduct Bill."

The inquiry was established following the suspension of the City of Joondalup Council in December 2003 by the then Minister for Local Government and Regional

Container Deposit Plan Could Cut Council Costs

Rate rises as a consequence of increasing demands on Council rubbish collection services could be avoided under a proposed new plan to provide refunds on recyclable drink containers.

WA Local Government Association President Cr Bill Mitchell said it was highly unlikely that Councils would gain a "significant revenue stream" as a consequence of the plan, though it could facilitate savings in collection costs.

Environment Minister Dr Judy Edwards yesterday announced her support for phasing in the deposit system to encourage the return of containers for recycling.

Cr Mitchell said a survey of 110 Local Governments in WA had found 80% support for the introduction of a container deposit scheme – with support by country Councils higher than those in the metropolitan area.

"Providing a refundable deposit for containers is something that Local Government in Western Australia has been campaigning for," Cr Mitchell said.

"It is highly unlikely that the plan would provide a significant income stream however for Councils not to have to collect the containers would provide tremendous operational savings.

"Currently there are Councils facing the prospect of having to increase the kerbside collection of recyclable material from fortnightly to weekly which is a cost that would eventually be passed onto ratepayers."

He said the anticipated cost savings from users returning containers, rather than being collected by Councils, would enable many country Councils to start recycling schemes – creating an estimated 300 jobs across the State.

"Anything that can be done to continue to encourage householders to recycle and at the same time reduce the financial burden on Local Government has to be a positive initiative."

Common Sense in Joondalup Decision

Local Government across the State should view today's dismissal of the City of Joondalup Council as the most acceptable option from those available to the Minister.

WA Local Government Association President Cr Bill Mitchell said while the Association did not support the dismissal of Elected Members, there had been far more unpalatable options before the Minister in response to the recommendations of the Joondalup Inquiry.

Cr Mitchell said the most severe option that had been before Local Government Minister John Bowler was the dismissal of all Elected Members in all Councils in WA to be replaced with appointed Commissioners.

"I am glad that common sense has prevailed and that the Minister has not decided to take this option and not punish all Councils in WA," Cr Mitchell said.

"Certainly the Association is disappointed that the Elected Members at Joondalup have been dismissed and we look forward to when a democratically elected Council is returned to Joondalup.

"Those Members who have been dismissed by the Minister will have the opportunity to contest their positions at the elections in May next year and give the community of Joondalup the opportunity to demonstrate their views on the issues."

Cr Mitchell said the Association had remained committed to having good governance for all Councils in WA and reiterates its offer to assist in any way to facilitate the return of an Elected Council to the City of Joondalup.

"It is timely that there has now been the second reading in Parliament of the Official Conduct Bill which will hold individual Councillors responsible for their actions rather than all Members of a Council," Cr Mitchell said.

Association Backed Project to Cut Building Costs

Almost \$5m is expected to be cut from building compliancy costs annually across the State under a new online application process championed by the WA Local Government Association, as part of a consortium that also involved the City of Swan, Water Corporation, and the Housing Industry Association.

Awarded \$495,810 in Federal Government funding, the Building Applications Lodgement Integration Project (BALIP) will establish an online portal as a single point for builders to submit building license applications and water connection applications at the same time by leveraging the Water Corporation's BuilderNet® program.

Association President, Cr Bill Mitchell said the Federal Government funding had been secured through cooperation between the Association, the City of Swan and the Water Corporation.

"The Association identified the potential to fast track the project, but as a condition of application for the Federal funding required the involvement of a lead Council," Cr Mitchell said. "Fortunately the City of Swan also had the foresight to realise the potential in the project and worked closely with Association staff to secure the funding."

The project will commence as a pilot application involving five WA Councils - Cities of Swan, Cockburn, Rockingham, Stirling and Wanneroo.

Cr Mitchell said it was intended that in just over 12 months the portal would be applied across Local Government in Western Australia with an estimated \$4.8m in cost savings to builders as a result of spending less time on compliance.

"This project has the potential to benefit the entire community by ensuring that builders will not have to add in the cost of non construction time normally required for submitting applications to Councils," Cr Mitchell said.

"The result should be a quicker approval process at a lower cost with arguably greater transparency as to the progress of applications."


The Building Applications project was one of four WA projects awarded a total of \$1.1m as part of the Federal Government's \$50m Regulation Reduction Incentive Fund. The other WA projects were:

- City of Albany: \$417,000 to allow local businesses to lodge health and building applications online. To also incorporate: Shire of Augusta-Margaret River, Shire of Broome, City of Geraldton, City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder.
- City of Stirling: \$187,000 for a package of improvements for local businesses including an online regulation manual, free development information, tracking of development applications, online registration and licence applications, an information kiosk and amendments to local laws to help cut red tape.
- Shire of Manjimup: \$46,000 to provide an online communication system for local businesses to provide for greater convenience and expedite application processes.


"Adding to the impact of the divergence in advertising budgets is the reality that local Councils are not unified in their campaigns as with State and Federal Governments."

The community survey comprised a random sample of 808 individuals, stratified over the four geographic regions defined as metropolitan areas, outer metropolitan areas, regional centres and rural and remote communities. Respondents were asked to rank the sectors of Government from 1 to 3 (with 1 being first) for both levels of trust and knowledge of each sector. As shown below, the results for trust rankings are converse to those for how informed the community is to each sector. (Note: some results involve equal rankings assigned by respondents).





COMMENT PROVIDED BY OFFICERS WITHOUT PRIOR CONSIDERATION OF COUNCIL

1. Draft Champion Drive Precinct Local Structure Plan - Armadale Redevelopment Authority

The Armadale Redevelopment Authority has prepared a draft Local Structure Plan over a portion of the City's Urban Unit A14 Structure Plan area that is now under the Armadale Redevelopment Authority's jurisdiction. The draft Local Structure Plan is a comprehensive document that has developed a plan for subdivision based on consideration of the site and its context, activity centres and employment, climate responsive design, traffic management, public open space, urban stormwater management, servicing and the need for a developer contribution plan.

The City's comments on the draft Local Structure Plan were predominantly technical in nature. However the following matters are notable:

- Agreement has now been reached at an officer level on the methodology and outcome of
 the calculations regarding public open space. These calculations show the City's Public
 Open Space Trust Fund will be in deficit 0.2168ha as a result of removing the Champion
 Drive Precinct from the A14 Structure Plan area. Discussions are still taking place on
 this matter.
- The City's A14 Structure Plan will need to be amended as a result of the proposed Local Structure Plan road layout pattern. This directly affects Lot 80 Lake Road, and probably affects Lot 50 to the south if an optimal road pattern is to be achieved for the area. The landholder of Lot 80 Lake Road has agreed to the road layout pattern for the Champion Drive Precinct and is in the process of discussing an amendment to the A14 Structure Plan with City officers.
- Technical matters raised included the need for upgrades to various roads surrounding the Structure Plan area, road widths at the primary school to cater for parking, questioning the proposition that Lake Road include a roundabout at a new precinct road, the longterm feasibility of swales in road reserves, and batter slope criteria.
- Concern was expressed regarding the clarity of plans provided regarding development of public open space.
