Core IT Systems Implementation Status / Progress Report as at 25th June 2004

The following tables present the current status / progress for Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the Core IT Systems Implementation Project.

In essence what the tables show, is that both Phases of the implementation is proceeding in accordance with the timelines contained in the Project Management Plan with Phase 1 having a target "go-live" date of 1 July 2004. Scheduling of workshops and training for modules within Phases 2 and 3 is presently being arranged.

The implementation tasks mentioned in the following table are, in the main, common to all modules and are briefly explained as follows:

Overview:

The Overview or introductory task is open to all staff, its purpose being to raise general awareness of the concepts and functionality of each module. These sessions allow time for discussion of scenarios specific to the City and the related implications.

Administration:

The Administration training focuses on the detailed functionality and operation of the module. Accordingly, these sessions are attended by fewer staff who are generally either responsible for or directly involved with the set-up of the module and / or the ongoing system maintenance operation.

Set Up / Operation: This task is generally for officers that attend the Administration Training and involves the detailed design and establishment of parameters and codes in readiness for data entry or transfer of migrated data. It also covers the detailed operational aspects.

Data Migration:

This task is applicable when information from the City's legacy system (Administrator) is extracted, converted and transferred into the new Authority module. It should be noted that not all modules will entail data migration, the typical reason being there is no current equivalent system.

Testing:

The testing task is where staff are required to validate the data that was migrated from the legacy system (if applicable) and to also test the different functions within each module to ensure that the module operates effectively and meets the City's requirements. Key staff, (generally those that require use of the module) will be involved.

As was mentioned by the City's Project Manager at the recent Councillor's Implementation Briefing, the new system "go-live date" of 1st July 2004 is in effect a notional date given a number of applications are dependent on the import of year end balances from the current system which may take a week or so following the 1st July to reconcile.

In recent days difficulties have been experienced in migrating rating data across to the new system. This difficulty whilst considered manageable has in accordance with the Implementation Plan been recorded as a "risk" for if not resolved soon it may potentially compromise the targeted go-live date. Every effort by both council officers and the supplier is being made to rectify the difficulty and as mentioned above, the issue is at this stage still considered manageable. However, should it take longer than anticipated to resolve the difficulty, a further priority update will be provided to councillors explaining the consequential implications with the worst case scenario being perhaps a 2-4 week delay in the rates billing.



ISSUES UPDATE

MEETING WITH MINISTER JOHN KOBELKE

The Association's Deputy President and senior staff met with the Hon. John Kobelke, Minister for Indigenous Affairs, on **Thursday 10 June**. Issues discussed included the dissolution of ATSIC and the role of Local Government, the Tjurabalan Project, the rateability of Aboriginal Land and the creation of Indigenous Local Governments. The Minister was clear that this Government is not interested in a structural approach to Indigenous Affairs, preferring a local and regional approach, with a focus on outcomes. However, there is value in looking at the strategic and generic issues facing Local Government in relation to Aboriginal communities.

Dissolution of ATSIC

As a result of the dissolution of ATSIC, the State and Commonwealth Governments are developing a bilateral arrangement for Aboriginal funding. This will be discussed at COAG on **Friday 25 June**. ALGA will be representing Local Government at this meeting. There was agreement that Local Government has an important role to play with local partnerships between Aboriginal communities and Local Government, based on good information provision.

Tjurabalan Project

The Tjurabalan project, south of Halls Creek, is a COAG national demonstration project focusing on whole of Government service delivery arrangements to Aboriginal communities. The project has not been evaluated to date, but it is hoped that demonstration projects will illustrate a better way of Government engagement with communities.

Rateability of Aboriginal Land

The proposed new title for Aboriginal land and Local Government rating of Aboriginal community land was broadly discussed.

Creation of Indigenous Local Governments

The creation of Indigenous Local Governments has been discussed by communities and State Government as a potential solution to Aboriginal disadvantage. However, there are no immediate plans for the creation of new Local Governments.

ENERGY POLICY REFORM

This week, the Prime Minister announced reforms to the current Energy Credits Grants Scheme through an energy policy statement.

Earlier this year, the Local Government Tax Service wrote to the Federal Treasurer advocating eligibility for tax relief on plant used for road re-construction, for machines that weigh less than 20 tonnes GVM, and are not used for the on-road transport of goods or passengers. This issue has been addressed by the proposed Government reforms.

It was also noted that access to concessions for on-road users of diesel and other fuels, will be expanded with the inclusion of petrol and more alternative fuels, and the removal of metropolitan area boundaries. The Local Government Tax Service has determined that the new regime will introduce major benefits to Local Government. These areas have been outlined in the Tax Service newsletter distributed to service subscribers in this week's mailbag. Further details will follow as the white paper is implemented.

Yarra Yarra gets another grant for drainage

The Yarra Yarra Catchments Council (which covers parts of the Shires of Dalwallinu, Carnamah, Perenjori, Morawa and Three Springs) has been awarded \$137,450 from the National Landcare Program. The project starts in July and will address the issue of rapidly developing valley floor salinity. The funds will provide for an integrated drainage and land management system to effectively utilise salinised land, while rehabilitating a lake in the Shire of Perenjori that can be used as a recreational and scientific facility. The project intends to demonstrate a best practice, valley-floor channel drainage system with safe disposal of water into a terminal saline lake. The system will be integrated with a biodiversity management program to protect and enhance the vegetation in the Yarra Yarra catchment and around the lake, and provide improved habitat opportunities for wildlife. It is hoped the project will serve as a best practice model for other catchments to follow.

The Australian Natural Resources Atlas is a web-based community interface to information prepared by the National Land and Water Resources Audit. Groundwater Guidelines

Dr. Steve Appleyard has prepared a set of draft guidelines on managing groundwater in acid sulphate soil risk areas for WA. The guidelines will address immediate concerns on the common practice of de-watering soils as part of construction and development activities on the Swan Coastal Plain. Concerns about excessive drawdowns from de-watering spears have in some instances affected the water quality of the domestic bore users and threatening long term acidification. Energy white paper in a nutshell

The Prime Minister, Mr. Howard, this week released an energy white paper — Securing Australia's Energy Future — providing significant benefits to Local Government through changes to fuel taxation arrangements. There is also an opportunity for councils to bid for participation in a solar energy trial program. The key features of the white paper includes:

- Overhaul of fuel excise system, reducing costs to business, consumers, State and Local Government by \$1.5 billion by 2012 – 2013
- \$75 million for 'Solar Cities' trails
- \$500 million fund to drive investment in new technologies for greenhouse gas reduction
- \$134 million to make renewable technologies cost efficient
- Big energy users required to undertake regular energy efficiency assessments
- Big energy projects required to manage emissions through membership of Greenhouse Challenge Program

ALGA welcomes fuel excise reform

The fuel tax changes announced this week as part of the energy white paper address many recommendations made by ALGA in its submission to the Fuel Taxation Inquiry in 2001. "Though some time coming, these changes are significant and will help ease the financial pressure on Local Government," ALGA President, Cr Mike Montgomery, said this week. Local Government will benefit from the extension of full credit to include Government vehicles in metropolitan areas with a gross vehicle mass between 4.5 and 20 tonnes, including petrol buses. Off-road commercial and Government users of diesel and like fuels will benefit from fuel credit when undertaking local public works activities including road construction and maintenance, water, sewage and drainage works, and other infrastructure construction works carried out on behalf of councils. The Local Government Association of Queensland has also welcomed the changes, saying they could save councils in that State around \$6 million a year.

Excise reforms tied to environmental initiatives

The energy white paper seeks to integrate environmental criteria into the fuel excise reforms. The purpose of new arrangements is to encourage the owners and operators of high emitting heavy diesel vehicles to reduce exhaust emissions of particulates, smoke and smog-forming pollutants to acceptable levels. Starting from July 2006, eligibility for excise will depend on Local Governments meeting appropriate environmental safeguards including heavy on-road vehicles meeting one of five emissions-performance criteria designed to show they are not in a high polluter. Further details are obtained in the Fuel Excise Reform chapter of the energy white paper. These reforms augment the measures for alternative fuels announced by the Australian Government in December last year.

Councils, states big winners, says Howard

Local and State Governments are the big winners from this week's energy white paper, according to the Prime Minister, John Howard. So much so, that he has called on "those Governments to pass the benefits through via lower rates and State charges." Speaking at the National Press Club on Tuesday, Mr. Howard said the reforms would save business and households more than \$1.5 billion between now and 2012 - 2013. "These reforms build on the alternative fuels excise arrangements announced last year and on the AusLink White Paper launched last week. Local and State Governments will be big winners and I call on those Governments to pass the benefits through via lower rates and State charges," he said.

Councils encouraged to bid for 'solar city' trials

The Australian Government is encouraging State, Local Government and industry to develop proposals to host a 'solar city' trail program. The Prime Minister said centres in Adelaide and Sydney would be prime locations for the trials, announced as part of this week's energy white paper. The Government will provide \$75 million for the trials to test a new energy scenario where solar power, energy efficiency and market reforms combine to provide communities with a more sustainable future. These 'Solar Cities' trails will place a proper market value on the role solar energy can play in meeting peak demand and reducing the need for transmission and distribution investments. Mr. Howard said that this was about "doing things smarter" with solar panels, better insulation, energy efficient appliances and smart meters that allow households to sell excess electricity back into the grid at peak times. The trials will be held in two or three urban centres and will require support from industry, State and Local Governments.

Support for renewable energy

Under the white paper, renewable energy sources will receive support of a further \$100 million for research, development, demonstration and commercialisation. The Government will also spend \$34 million to improve wind forecasting and develop options to store electricity – targeting impediments to the uptake of solar and wind-based electricity. The Government will also retain and improve the existing Mandatory Renewable Energy Target (MRET) scheme. The Prime Minister said that the Government's \$500 million Low Emission Technology Fund, plus more than \$200 million in funding for renewable energy technologies, would "prepare Australia to respond to potential long-term emissions constraints".

ALGA ready for early election

Talk of an early election is again in the air following the Australian Government's quick fire series of well-funded statements on issues ranging from transport and tourism to energy and childcare, and with some positive opinion polls for the Coalition, Canberra's political pundits are pointing to a 7 August election, the earliest date for a standard election for the House of Representatives and half the Senate. The last possible date for the election is 16 April next year, but the Prime Minister has ruled out a poll early next year, saying it would not be 'normal'. He has also ruled out December and the football final weekends in late September and early October. When school holidays and the Olympics are taken into account, a poll could be expected in one of three election 'windows' – early August, mid-to-late October and November. ALGA will shortly release a list of key Local Government issues which need to be addressed by the major parties during the course of the campaign.

In Other News...

Water, security head COAG agenda

ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, will represent Local Government at next Friday's meeting of the Council of Australian Governments. The main agenda item will be the development of an intergovernmental agreement on the national water initiative. It is also expected to consider domestic security issues and the development of new arrangements to address Indigenous disadvantage across all levels of Government. ALGA has recently written to other COAG members flagging our intention to seek consideration at a future meeting of a high level agreement on intergovernmental arrangements, as recommended by the Fair Share Report on cost shifting and Local Government financing.

ALGA welcomes further talks on PPP tax proposals

As foreshadowed last week by Federal Local Government Minister, Ian Campbell, the Australian Government has deferred the introduction of the Taxable Entities (Asset Financing) Bill until September to allow more time for consultation with Local Government. In a welcome move, the Commonwealth Treasury has written to ALGA seeking comments on the latest version of the legislation as well as parts of the Bill's explanatory mcmorandum. State Local Government Associations have received copies of the drafts for comment. The Treasury is now seeking a response by 5 July. ALGA and State Associations raised concerns about the impact the legislation will have on Local Government PPP arrangements at a roundtable meeting with Senator Campbell last week.

Nearly 500 registered for Roads Congress

ALGA's National Local Roads Congress (Barossa Valley, 11-13 July) will be the first opportunity to hear and question the key players on AusLink and the operation of the renewed Roads to Recovery program. Federal Local Government and Roads Minister, Ian Campbell, and Senior staff from the Department of Transport and Regional Services will outline the latest details on the implementation of AusLink and R2R2. Shadow Transport Minister, Martin Ferguson, will provide an insight into Labor's alternative position. Nearly 500 delegates have now registered for this important Congress.

Telephone towers: ALGA on code review committee

The Australian Communications Industry Forum (ACIF) (www.acif.org.au) has convened a committee to revise the industry code governing the deployment of radio communications infrastructure. The committee comprises representatives from the telecommunications carriers, ACIF, the Australian Communications Authority (ACA), the community and ALGA. The revision of the code aims to 'strengthen and clarify' ambiguities and improve consultation with councils and the community in the construction of radio communications infrastructure. A draft of the revised code will be released for public comment in August. Comment sought on telecom service for remote communities

The Australian Communications Authority (ACA) seeks comment on its proposal for monitoring and reporting provision of telecommunications services to remote Indigenous communities. The ACA is looking at how the performance of standard telephone services in these communities measure up against those in other communities. A discussion paper, Monitoring and Reporting on Telecommunications Services for Remote Indigenous Communities, has been developed by the ACA in response to the Regional Telecommunications Inquiry (Estens Inquiry). Submissions are requested by 9 July.

Traffic safety workshops for council engineers

ARRB Transport Research (www.arrb.org.au) is holding a series of workshops on the new Austroads Guide to traffic engineering practice on treatment of crash locations. The workshops are tailored for council traffic engineers and will be held in the capital cities and regional centres over the next two months, commencing in Wagga Wagga on 22 – 23 June. Workshops will be held in the Hunter Valley, Canberra, Sydney, Adelaide and Melbourne.

New estuaries book will appeal to coastal councils

The Coastal Cooperative Research Centre has published a new colour 288-page book, 'Where River Meets Sea: Exploring Australia's Estuaries', describing the value and status of Australia's 974 estuaries. It describes the health, geography, science, management and ecological functions of these unique coastal waterways. Chapters on natural history, coastal science and management give an understanding of Australia's network of pristine and heavily modified estuaries. Other chapters show how people use and value coastal catchments and waterways. The impacts of human development on natural ecosystems, and how estuaries can be better managed in future. It was compiled by leading researchers, managers and educators from around Australia. It is available at \$49.95 from CSIRO Publishing (www.publish.csiro.au).

Don't give in to developers, warns ALGA

This week's Productivity Commission report on first home ownership fell short of backing developers' demands to strip councillors of their fundamental right to make decisions on development applications. ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, warned, "Any such move would constitute an assault on the principles of local democracy and a kick in the guts for communities". The Commission recommended that State and Local Government "need to give priority to the scope to achieve greater separation of policy making and administration". It acknowledged the controversial nature of the proposal, saying: "There are no single or uncontentious solutions in these areas. In each of them, a core issue is the extent to which clear rules, with broad community support, can be established". This is hardly a ringing endorsement of the controversial 'separation of roles' proposal contained in the draft 'leading model' for development assessment, now due out for public consultation. The Commission recommended that priority should also be given to reduce delays in appeals 'while maintaining the protections of due process' and improve or expand 'as of right' development provisions 'without detracting unduly from the property rights of existing residents'.

Commission gets it wrong on DAF

ALGA will write to the Productivity Commission pointing out a serious error in its first home ownership report. The report states that the development assessment model contains proposals that have been recommended by the Development Assessment Forum. In fact, the Forum has not endorsed any part of the DA model. The model has been released for public consultation and will be considered by the Forum and, subsequently, the Local Government and Planning Minister' Council (LGPMC) later this year. ALGA will ask that the report be corrected. The Development Assessment Forum reports to LGMPC and includes representatives of the three spheres of Government, industry and professional groups.

Infrastructure charges endorsed in principle

The first home ownership report has effectively endorsed the principle of council infrastructure charges, a move welcomed by ALGA. It states that there 'is a strong case for users of infrastructure services paying for costs attributable to them'. It also notes that developer charges have generally increased less than house prices and that any subsidised provision of new infrastructure would 'primarily benefit land owners or developers rather than house purchasers'. This will be disappointing to industry groups that have been pushing for the charges to be abolished and replaced with State Government-run infrastructure funds. However, the report says developer charges, and charging for infrastructure generally, should be 'necessary, efficient and equitable' and should follow guidelines based on these principles. It says councils should be open to proposals for alternative infrastructure arrangements and allows appeals on the amount charged or their coverage. Councils should also be accountable for how the money raised from charges is spent. ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, said he was sceptical of the need for any change.

Costello calls on others act

Federal Treasurer, Peter Costello, has rejected three key recommendations for Commonwealth action contained in the first home ownership report. These call for reviews of capital gains tax, a national inquiry into the housing needs of low-income households and changes to the first homeowner scheme to exclude the purchase of more expensive properties. Instead, the Treasurer has — in his formal response to the report — supported other recommendations, which require action by State and Local Governments. He encourages "all levels of Government to work co-operatively to resolve many of the impediments and inefficiencies identified by the Commission". The Australian Government, he said, "will facilitate dialogue through the Local Government and Planning Ministers' Council".

ALGA to showcase council initiatives at housing summit

ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, will showcase council involvement in community housing projects at next week's National Summit on Housing Affordability. The summit is co-hosted by ALGA, the Australian Council of Trade Unions, the Australian Council of Social Services and the Housing Industry Association. It will be chaired by Professor Julian Disney of he University of NSW. The summit will be held at Parliament House in Canberra from 27-29 June. Cr Montgomery will also examine issues raised in this week's first home ownership report and outline Local Government's strong objection to any move to diminish the role of democratically elected community representatives in the planning process.

ALGA presses case for structural adjustment at COAG

ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, will continue to press the case for community based structural adjustment arrangements to be included in the National Water Initiative when the leaders of Australia's three spheres of Government convene at today's meeting of the Council of Australian Governments. Cr Montgomery said he was hopeful that Government Leaders would commit themselves to address the needs of communities that may be adversely affected by the introduction of a water market. COAG will today consider the wording of an intergovernmental agreement on the National Water Initiative. ALGA will also seek to have Local Government more closely involved in emerging COAG work on Indigenous reconciliation and service delivery. Cr Montgomery will also outline the need to enhance the capacity of Local Government in emergency management as part of the national security effort. A communiqué is expected after the meeting, which will be posted to the ALGA Newsroom.

ALGA seeks support for emergency management

ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, met yesterday with Senior Australian Government Officials to discuss Local Government's involvement in national security issues. The move follows a commitment by the Prime Minister, Mr. Howard, at last year's National General Assembly of Local Government to explore these issues further with Local Government. ALGA has argued that the Australian Government should help enhance Local Government's broad emergency management capacity as a way of preparing for any future terrorist attack. The meeting came as the Australian Government released a report on policy arrangements to protect Australia against terrorism. Key initiatives include counter terrorism legislation, intelligence, law enforcement, protecting Australians and Australia's national infrastructure, transport security and science and technology support. In other security news, senior business leaders and ALGA representatives met this week with the Prime Minister, Attorney General and Senior Australian Government Officials to discuss the risk of terrorist attacks on critical infrastructure. A smaller body of around 10 Chief Executive Officers from key sectors is to meet with Senior Government Ministers two or three times a year.

Cost shifting focus for report on Indigenous capacity building

A new report on building capacity in Indigenous communities has called on the Council of Australian Governments to convene a roundtable to clarify the roles and responsibilities of the key stakeholders – including the three spheres of Government – and address issues of cost shifting. The report – *Many Ways Forward* – was tabled in the House of Representatives, this week by the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders Affairs, Barry Wakelin. The report also calls on the three spheres of Government, in consultation with Indigenous representatives, to implement a range of measure to ensure a whole Government approach to the provision of services to Indigenous communities. It also calls on the Australian Government to take a leadership role in encouraging partnerships such as *Indigenous Community Volunteers* to enhance mentoring and skills development in Indigenous communities and organisations.

LGAT hails Jim Bacon's Local Government legacy

Local Government Association of Tasmania President, Cr Lynn Mason, has expressed her sorrow at the death of Jim Bacon, and her sympathy for his wife and family. Cr Mason recalled the strong ties which Jim Bacon built with Local Government during his term as Premier. "His program of partnership with Local Government was one of the best and most progressive initiatives this country has seen. He created an environment of trust, which enabled both levels of Government to work for the betterment of our Tasmanian community

- working together, not against each other," Cr Mason said. "His legacy is a stronger, more prosperous state, and much stronger ties between the two levels of Government."

ALGA joins National Immunisation Committee

ALGA has become an observer member of the National Immunisation Committee, a body that operates under the auspices of the National Public Health Partnership through the Communicable Diseases Network Australia. The Committee provides advice on immunisation policy and oversees the implementation and delivery of the National Immunisation Program. This inclusion of a Local Government observer is seen as an important expansion of this Committee, given the role of councils in the national immunisation effort. Ageing population inquiry to help Local Government

The Federal Treasurer, Peter Costello, yesterday asked the Productivity Commission to undertake a research study into the economic and fiscal implications of the future ageing of Australia's population. The study, endorsed by the Council of Australian Governments, will help Governments – including Local Government – to improve their understanding of the challenges and opportunities arising from the projected ageing of Australia's population. The research will complement other initiatives, which have been undertaken by the Australian Government on demographic change. These initiatives include the Intergenerational Report, released as part of the 2002 – 2003 Budget, and the discussion paper, Australia's Demographic Challenges, which was released in February 2004 to encourage community debate on these issues. ALGA is working in partnership with the Australian Government to address issues presented by an ageing population.

National road safety report released

A new report on road safety has supported three broad themes of safer drivers, safer roads and safer vehicles. The report – Eyes on the Road Ahead – was tabled in Federal Parliament this week. Issues addressed include the road environment, black spots and vulnerable and high-risk road users. The recommendations support the thrust of the Safer Roads initiative being run by the Australian Automobile Association, ALGA, the Australian Trucking Association and the Australian College of Road Safety.

Aircraft noise annoying your residents? DoTaRS is here to help

The Department of Transport and Regional Services (DoTaRS) is working to develop better information for councils and the aviation industry on noise levels around small airports and the interaction between land use and aircraft circuit patterns. They have now produced a simple CD-ROM, which gives non-experts basic details on aircraft noise exposure forecasts and use of noise contours. The Perth Biodiversity Project (PBP) will launch the Local Government Biodiversity Planning Guidelines for the Perth Metropolitan Region at 10.00 am on Tuesday 29 June 2004 at Kings Park Function Centre, Fraser Avenue, West Perth. The Guidelines will assist Local Governments to strategically plan for the retention, protection and management of Perth's bushland, wetlands and other natural areas. The Guidelines contain statistics, policies, tools and templates for Local Government to prepare Local Biodiversity Strategies.

A Local Biodiversity Strategy will assist Local Governments with significant areas of bushland, wetlands and other natural areas, as well as high rates of land development to create a more sustainable, liveable community and clearer pathways for future development.

Iris - Looking to the Future of Waste Management

The Western Australian Local Government Association's Municipal Waste Advisory Council (MWAC) this week released **iris**, a software package to assist Local Government explore waste management options. MWAC developed **iris** as a support tool to assist Local Government make informed, transparent and consultative waste management systems choices.

Iris is a software-based tool for assessing alternative waste management systems. It creates a detailed model of the existing waste management system used by either an individual or group of Councils. Generally, current waste management systems include a collection network, infrastructure for processing waste, recycling systems and a final disposal route such as landfill. Iris helps the user to identify and compare alternative waste management systems, such as a better recycling system or a new composting facility. An important aspect of iris is the diverse information used to compare systems, allowing systems to be compared in financial, technical, social and environmental terms. Stakeholder input is used to determine how the options should be assessed. Once all this information is input, iris goes to work to assess and rank the systems based on the priorities identified by the stakeholders.

In recent years, increased pressure on Local Government waste management practices has resulted in many communities pushing for greater diversion from landfill, while the State Government's Waste 2020 Strategy established the vision of moving towards zero waste. Local Government is responding to this pressure by considering where improvements can be made. However, determining which system will be right for a specific Council remains a challenge.

Chair of the Municipal Waste Advisory Council, Cr Deb Hopper pointed out that with iris, Councils can tailor their data and their options to best reflect local circumstances.

Cr Hopper said, "Local Governments are expected to incorporate a great variety of considerations when making waste management choices for their region and yet many have traditionally been poorly resourced to do so. **Iris** provides tools to integrate these considerations into the investigation process and it does this at low cost."

Mindarie Regional Council's Chief Executive, Mr. Kevin Poynton, said that the MRC recognised the importance of community engagement and consultation early in its process to develop a Resource Recovery facility in the Region.

Mr. Poynton said, "I believe the project would not have advanced this far if the Council had considered only financial factors in its decision-making process. The community clearly indicated it wanted input to this project, and we would have been foolhardy not to respect its wishes".

SCRIPT Re-writes Future of South Coast

A local group has broken new ground with the release of a draft strategic plan, which will set a course for the future of around 6 million hectares along the South Coast Region.

The South Coast Regional Initiative Planning Team (SCRIPT) has been developing the plan for more than 18 months, the first comprehensive Natural Resource Management (NRM) strategy of its kind for the region.

The plan will determine how more than \$48 million will be spent on NRM in 6 major catchment sub-regions ranging from Walpole in the west to east of Esperance and 200km inland from Broomehill to 3 nautical miles out to sea.

SCRIPT chairman Jean Webb said an enormous amount of information had been gathered from across the South Coast in preparing the draft document.

"This comprehensive strategy covers land, water, coasts and marine, biodiversity, cultural heritage and community themes," she said.

"It has been an extremely ambitious project which required the integration of purpose and effort of more than 20 community groups and organisations, plus dozens of volunteers."

"We are very proud of this draft strategy and the huge effort made by residents of this beautiful coastal region."

"Now it's time for local communities at large and anyone who lives or has an interest here to have their say and give us their input to finalise the document."

Mrs Webb said the South Coast Region had the potential to be recognised around the world for its biodiversity, sustainable primary production, respect for cultural values and strong stewardship of its natural resources.

The strategy will act as a roadmap for the allocation of Government and community investment in the regions natural resource management for the next 5 years and beyond.

"We want people to be a part of that vision by taking part in the consultation process," she said.

"This is an excellent opportunity for people to have a say in the priorities, actions and end goals that will shape the future of the South Coast."

A series of public forums will be held in July to facilitate community feedback and input.

The strategy was launched this week and is open for public comment for six weeks. Visit the website (www.script.asn.au) for more details.

LOCAL LAWS - FEEDING OF WILD BIRDS

Development Services Committee and some Councillors have, several times in recent years, expressed an interest in the development of local laws prohibiting the feeding of wild birds as a means towards minimising the noise nuisance caused to other community members by this activity. Advice provided to Council to date has been to the effect that there are a number of obstacles to this approach, including likely disallowance by the Parliamentary Joint Standing Committee on Delegated Legislation.

The Town of Victoria Park promulgated its Health Local Laws 2003 in *Government Gazette Nº 66* of 19th April 2004. Clause 78 of those local laws prohibits the feeding of sea gulls, pigeons, doves or other specified wild birds within the district, or part or parts of the district, as determined by resolution of the Council.

The Joint Standing Committee subsequently disallowed Clause 78, and so the Town will need to now amend its local laws by repealing that Clause.

#### **OPENING AND WELCOME**

Terry Holton opened the Meeting and welcomed those present.

#### MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

The Minutes of the Meeting on 19 February 2004 were confirmed.

#### **BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES**

There was discussion on the ownership of the material resulting from the dismantling of the winding gear at Dale Cottages. It was agreed that Council should write to Dale Cottages enquiring whether they have plans for the removed material and perhaps suggesting that Council hold the material in trust until a decision is made on the future of the winding gear. Mr Fouché advised that there were certain development conditions to be met by Dale Cottages as part of the approval for the dismantling.

#### **GENERAL BUSINESS**

### 1. Resignation of Dot Croft from Position of Minute Secretary

The resignation was received with regret and it was agreed that a letter should be sent to Dot Croft thanking her for her sterling contribution to CHAC over the last two years.

The Minute Secretary position was to be recommitted to the next meeting for consideration and suggestions of a possible candidate from Committee Members.

#### 2. Application for Oversize Ancillary Accommodation at Lot 11 (No 3157) Albany Highway, Armadale (Tognolini Residence A33 in MIII)

The plans for ancillary accommodation were discussed. It was agreed that the committee had no objection to the development.

### MINUTES - COMMUNITY HERITAGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING cont'd...

#### 3. Original Chimney Pot from the Armadale Primary School

Mr Carder advised that the original (supposedly) chimney pot from the Armadale Primary School had been unearthed and the question had been asked about what to do with it. The matter was discussed and it was agreed that it was probably best kept in the museum. However it was suggested that officers investigate to ascertain whether the chimney pot can be replaced on the school chimney.

#### 4. Update on Morrison Park Displaced Persons Camp Project

Cr Zelones advised that the Kelmscott Migrant Camps History Group favoured the name "Migrant Park" for Reserve 2121 (currently known as Morrison Park). There is to be an open day for former residents at the site on Saturday 2 May 2004 and the original occupants would have the opportunity to suggest a suitable name.

#### 5. Road Naming Criteria for Consideration

The Geographic Names Committee criteria for road naming had been provided to Committee Members. It was agreed that Committee Members gather suitable names for use on streets and reserves. Mr Carder was asked to circulate a list of the names already held by the City to Committee Members. Any names provided were to come with a brief history. It was suggested that this could be promoted to the community seeking fresh names for consideration.

#### 6. Review of the Municipal Heritage Inventory

Mr Fouché advised that Hugh Carder would be contacting other Councils to ascertain whether they had undertaken a review of their MHI and who had been appointed to undertake the review. A brief for the review would be would be drafted.

### 7. Town Planning Scheme No 4

Mr Fouché advised that TPS No 4 had been advertised for public comment and the submission period would close on 28 June 2004. A copy of the text had previously been tabled and comments were sought.

#### 8. Canning Contour Channel

Mr Carder provided a copy of a letter from the Heritage Council of Western Australia (HCWA) advising that the portion of the Canning Contour Channel passing through the Regional Reserves had been placed in the State's Register of Heritage Places. It was agreed the listing was welcome.

#### 9. Armadale Shale Quarry

Mr Carder provided a copy of a letter from the HCWA advising that they were considering the Quarry for entry in the State's Register of Heritage Places and were seeking comments. It was agreed that the Committee had a preference for the Quarry to be listed but in view of a number of issues, including safety, it was thought that the matter should be put to the Development Services Committee to consider the implications of listing. It was suggested that the City write to HCWA suggesting the proposal had merit but seeking that the consideration be deferred until further enquiries had been made. It was also suggested that Council may like to consider the possibility of offering ownership of the Quarry to a body that could make more use of it.

#### 10. Reserve Names

Mr Carder provided a list of the named reserves within the City of Armadale (requested at the CHAC meeting on 18 December 2003) with the request that any history that was known on the names of the reserves be written down and submitted to him for information.

#### **NEXT MEETING**

The next meeting is to be held at 7.00pm on Thursday 17 June 2004 in Council's Committee Room.

With no further business, the Meeting was closed at 8.10p.m.

# METROPOLITAN REGION SCHEME AMENDMENT NO. 1092/33 – FORRESTDALE, CORNER NICHOLSON AND ARMADALE ROADS

The proposed Metropolitan Region Scheme (MRS) Amendment No 1092/33 was advertised on 1 June 2004. The amendment relates to four (4) lots at the corner of Nicholson and Armadale Roads, Forrestdale (Lot 334 Armadale Road, Lot 21 Nicholson Road, Lot 22 Nicholson Road and Lot 2 Skeet Road). Details relating to the amendment are included in the following pages.

The City generally supports the proposal (D215/12/03 refers). However, a currently non-working poultry farm located on Lot 22 Nicholson Road and an operating poultry farm on lot 21 Nicholson Road will be subject to the Urban zone proposed under MRS 1092/33.

Should the Urban zone go ahead, the City's Town Planning Scheme will require amendment to a Residential zone or similar. Ensuing subdivision and development could then create the potential for conflict between the poultry farms and residents, if the farms recommence or remain in operation.

It is suggested that the landowners should enter into a legal agreement to not recommence operations on the non-operating poultry farm and to discontinue operations on the currently operating poultry farm when urban development proceeds.

The Executive Director Development Services will make a submission to the WAPC on the above lines. Any comments Councillors may have on the proposal should be forwarded to EDDS by Monday 23 August 2004 to ensure the submission can be forwarded to the WAPC by Friday 3 September 2004.

# FORRESTDALE, CORNER NICHOLSON AND ARMADALE ROADS

# AMENDMENT NO. 1092/33 TO THE METROPOLITAN REGION SCHEME FORRESTDALE, CORNER NICHOLSON AND ARMADALE ROADS

#### 1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this amendment to the Metropolitan Region Scheme (MRS) is to transfer approximately 102ha of Rural zoned land in the locality of Forrestdale on the corner of Armadale Road and Nicholson Road to the Urban zone as shown on Figure 1 in this report. The properties included in the proposed amendment are Pt Lot 2 and Lots 21 and 22 Nicholson Road, and Lot 334 Armadale Road.

#### 2. BACKGROUND

The "Southern River Forrestdale Brookdale Wungong District Structure Plan" 2001 (the "DSP") prepared by the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC), includes potential development areas, road networks, major community facilities, conservation and Bush Forever areas and a neighbourhood structure plan for the localities in this amendment. As such, the DSP provides a guide for future MRS and Local Government district zoning scheme amendments, local structure plans, subdivisions and development.

The DSP was prepared in response to increasing development pressure over a number of years and the consequent need for the WAPC to address significant constraints to urban development in the DSP area prior to further subdivision and development occurring. Important issues and constraints to development are the high water table through much of the area, the need for appropriate nutrient, drainage and water resource management, wetland conservation, poultry farms, kennel zones and multiple land ownership.

Preparation of the DSP involved extensive community consultation, technical data collection and review and the advice of Local Government and State Government agencies. Community input to the DSP was sought at each of the major stages in preparation of the plan, these being identification of issues and objectives, discussion and evaluation of options, adoption of a preferred option and review of the draft DSP.

The DSP describes its "vision" as comprising three components:

- i) "The context: The study area is not a self-contained entity; it is an extension of the existing and abutting communities."
- ii) "Image: A balance is sought between maintaining areas of high conservation value and facilitating development."
- "Implementing the Vision: Close consultation with the community established an overriding vision to promote fair and equitable outcomes for all parties with transparent decision-making and clear responsibilities."

Principal components of the DSP are as follows:

 Urban areas - four urban areas are identified at Southern River (north of Ranford Road), Forrestdale (Ranford Road to Armadale Road), Forrestdale

Lake (north of Forrestdale Road) and Brookdale/Wungong (south of Armadale);

- Retail centres- local neighbourhood shopping centres are proposed in five new town or village centres located within clusters of neighbourhoods proposed in the DSP (the new urban areas can be serviced by existing regional shopping facilities at Canning Vale, Maddington, Gosnells and Armadale);
- iii) Industry a major industrial area is proposed at the junction of Ranford Road, Armadale Road and the future Tonkin Highway;
- iv) Rural areas remaining rural areas are located south of Forrestdale Lake and north of Armadale Road in Forrestdale;
- Conservation significant Environmental Protection Policy (EPP) Wetlands, Conservation Category Wetlands and conservation areas and multiple use corridors are shown on the DSP;
- vi) Bush Forever Sites these are identified in the DSP;
- vii) Kennel zones the DSP does not recommend retaining the Forrestdale kennel zone on the corner of Ranford and Wright Roads. The Southern River Kennel zone on the corner of Ranford Road and Matison Street is recommended to remain;
- viii) Drainage major drainage routes are shown in the DSP within multiple use corridors. The actual width of these corridors is dependant on drainage requirements, natural topography, suitability for open space, conservation and landscape value to be determined during preparation of the local structure plan for the subject land. It will be prepared by the City of Armadale in consultation with the Water and Rivers Commission, Water Corporation, Department of Environment and Department for Planning and Infrastructure;
- ix) Transportation the existing MRS road network in the DSP area remains;
- School sites several school site areas have been proposed in the DSP in accordance with WAPC policy;
- xi) Open space Parks and Recreation reservations (existing and proposed) and other open space proposals are shown on the DSP. Other open spaces include drainage routes, significant conservation and EPP wetlands, golf course buffers and multiple use corridors all subject to the appropriate detailed planning during structure planning and preparation of the local scheme amendment for the subject land.

The EPA's approval of the DSP was subject to preparation of an *Urban Water Management Strategy* (UWMS) for the DSP area to deal with issues such as nutrient and drainage management and potential impacts on wetlands, groundwater and the Swan and Canning Rivers.

Within the DSP, only the northern half of the subject land is zoned urban. The southern portion is below a line designating the Forrestdale Lakes Environmental Area and is designated as part of an area of "possible future urban development subject to study for refinement of (the) Environmental Management Area".

The Environmental Protection Authority has agreed to amend the Environmental Management Area by moving the current boundary to Armadale Road with the proviso that appropriate drainage measures be taken to divert surface run-off water from entering Lake Forrestdale.

Given the above proviso by the EPA, the Commission considers it to be acceptable for the Urban zoning to extend to Armadale Road.

#### 3. SCOPE AND CONTENT OF THE AMENDMENT

This amendment includes approximately 102ha of land in the locality of Forrestdale as shown on Figure 1. The amendment proposes to rezone the land to the Urban zone.

The land is zoned General Rural in the City of Armadale District Zoning Scheme and an appropriate amendment to that scheme will be required if this MRS amendment is finalised.

The area consists of all or portions of 4 properties: The owners have grouped their properties together for the purpose of obtaining endorsement from the City of Armadale and requesting the WAPC to initiate this amendment. This grouping will assist the WAPC and City of Armadale in assessing the proposal by providing a comprehensive and co-ordinated proposal.

### 4. DISCUSSION

The proposal was requested by the City of Armadale and is supported by the landowners. The City considers that development of the North Forrestdale area (including the subject land of this proposal and the area to the north which is subject to MRS amendment No. 1072/33) is important to the City in establishing a new urban area and assisting the Armadale Strategic Regional Centre by capturing additional population.

The WAPC seeks to ensure that Urban zoned land exists in a wide variety of locations throughout the South East Corridor (and the entire Perth metropolitan region) so as to encourage both affordability and a variety of housing.

### **Regional Context**

### Existing Land Uses

Approximately half the subject area has been extensively cleared and used for various farming and rural activities including grazing of livestock, horse agistment and poultry farms.

None of the remnant bushland in the amendment area has been designated as regionally significant in Bush Forever.

### Surrounding Land Uses

The broader locality of the amendment area contains a variety of land uses such as rural and semi rural activities, conservation reserves and the existing Forrestdale townsite.

#### <u>Access</u>

The area is already serviced by the existing regional road network in the MRS providing good access to major destinations in the broader locality (eg. Cannington and Armadale Strategic Regional centres, the proposed "Cockburn Central" shopping and mixed use area and several major industrial areas) as well as the remainder of the metropolitan region.

In addition to eventual staged extension of bus routes into the amendment area, there is easy access to proposed passenger rail stations to the west adjoining "Cockburn Central" at Thomsons Lake and to the east at Armadale.

#### Infrastructure

#### Water

The subject land is located within the future boundary of the Water Corporation's Canning Water Supply Scheme. Although overall planning for the scheme is limited over the subject land, it would be possible to service the subject land by providing a connection to an existing reticulation point at the intersection of Nicholson Road and Armadale Road.

#### Sewerage

The Water Corporation advised the proponents that development will require construction of a pumping station near the eastern site boundary. The pump station would discharge sewerage via a temporary rising main to the Westfield Treatment Facility.

#### **Drainage**

The landform through the area is generally flat with a high water table. The land drains north east and eastwards and is included in the Water Corporation's Forrestdale main drain catchment

The existing drainage scheme will form the basis of a comprehensive system of drains and compensating/ nutrient stripping basins which are proposed for the amendment site. This strategy would adopt the principles of Water Sensitive Urban Design and could be implemented on a staged basis as urbanisation of the area proceeds.

### 5. SUSTAINABILITY APPRAISAL

### Environment

The Department of Environment has advised that the following matters need to be addressed during structure planning:

- nutrient export and drainage issues;
- ii) protection of native remnant vegetation;
- iii) contamination associated with former land uses;
- iv) odour or noise impacts from adjacent and current land uses;

- the protection of significant wetlands and drainage lines;
- vi) the high pressure gas pipeline.

### **Drainage Nutrient and Flood Management**

The EPA advised that it considered that nutrient and drainage management and potential impacts on wetlands, groundwater and the Swan and Canning Rivers are critical issues in the DSP area which require considerable attention prior to changes in land use in the area. Further, it is crucial that changes in land use do not lead to unacceptable impacts on groundwater resources, wetlands and rivers.

In order to deal with this matter, the EPA required that an UWMS be prepared for the DSP area prior to major development. The Steering Committee for the study included representatives from the Department of Environment, the Cities of Armadale and Gosnells, the Department for Planning and Infrastructure, the Urban Development Institute of Australia, the Water Corporation, the Department for Conservation and Land Management, the Canning Catchment Group and the Swan River Trust. The UWMS has been finalized and endorsed by the EPA and the WAPC.

The UWMS aims to protect water resources, ensuring an enhanced living environment and to provide protection from flooding. It consists of 5 key elements to present an integrated water management strategy based on a catchment management approach:

- Water Quality Management The UWMS marks a distinct shift in the management of pollutants on the Swan Coastal Plain and mirrors the strategy adopted for the Peel Harvey Estuary. The UWMS provides a stronger emphasis on source controls and catchment management measures rather than "end of pipe solutions" to reduce pollutant inputs;
- ii) Wetland Management The UWMS reinforces the DoE policy that the Average Annual Maximum Groundwater Level (AAMGL) be maintained at existing levels to prevent the pollution of water bodies downstream, the drying out of wetlands and the saving of groundwater dependent vegetation. The UWMS does, however, recommend flexibility in the application of the policy where it can be demonstrated that a lowering of the AAMGL would not lead to the above impacts;
- iii) Flood Management The UWMS proposes attenuation of rainfall runoff rates to the levels that presently occur in the study area. This criteria will ensure that peak flows in the Southern River are not increased by land use change;
- iv) Monitoring The UWMS recommends that monitoring be undertaken to determine current catchment and waterway conditions prior to the establishment of definitive water quality objectives. Post development monitoring would be undertaken to ascertain whether any changes are required to the objectives and strategies applying to future development; and
- Catchment Management The success of the UWMS relies on a catchment management approach with water management integrated into public open space.

The UWMS addresses the issues of drainage and nutrient management at the regional level and provides a framework for site-specific drainage and nutrient management plans. Because land in the DSP area is constrained, it will be essential that land use and

subdivision planning incorporates elements of water sensitive urban design through the application of best management practices. Therefore, planners and developers referring to the DSP need to be aware that more specific guidance on water management will follow and that this may result in modifications to aspects of the DSP in respect of land use and subdivision design.

The responsibilities of all agencies involved in the implementation of the UWMS will be outlined in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Environmental Protection Authority, the Department of Environment, Water and Catchment Protection, the WAPC, the Water Corporation and the Cities of Armadale and Gosnells.

The concept of the MOU resulted from the EPA's position that it favours a staged approach to development in the DSP area based on precautionary principles which would allow for monitoring of the impacts of development of water quality and hydrology and subsequent adaptive management approaches for later stages of development if required. Consequently, the EPA sought assurances regarding the implementation of the UWMS and requested that the MOU be prepared and signed by all key agencies involved in the implementation.

The environmental consultants for the landowners have provided advice on the proposed Drainage and Nutrient Management Plan concept for the amendment area. The plan concept meets the Water Sensitive Urban Design objectives to:

- manage the water balance and protect existing and future urban areas from flooding;
- ii) manage and where possible enhance groundwater and surface water quality;
- iii) protect and where possible restore and enhance the environmental, recreational and cultural values of waterways and wetlands, and
- iv) provide a sustainable, attractive and efficient stormwater management system.

### Protection of Wetlands

One wetland within the amendment area is protected under the Environmental Protection (Swan Coastal Plain Lakes) Policy 1992. There are also three Resource Enhancement category wetlands. The landowners intend requesting the EPA to reclassify these. The outcome of the reclassification will be reflected in local structure planning for the area. Accordingly there is no intention that these areas be added to the existing Parks and Recreation reservations in the area.

### Vegetation

There are no Bush Forever sites in the amendment area, however, these exist to the east and west. Therefore future development will need to consider appropriate management boundaries and buffers.

### **Buffers Between Incompatible Land Uses**

### Poultry Farm

The amendment site contains poultry farms on Lots 21 and 22 Nicholson Road. .

A generic 500m buffer area to residential development applies around such farms, unless appropriate studies show a reduced buffer area is appropriate or there is proof that the poultry farm no longer functions and will not recommence operations.

The relevant landowners and/or the City of Armadale will need to address the issue. For example, residential subdivision and development could be controlled through phasing of development linked to permanent closure of the poultry farm implemented in later stages of the planning process. If the issue is not addressed satisfactorily, the buffer area will need to be placed in the Urban-Deferred zone prior to finalisation of the amendment.

The farm on Lot 22 has not operated for more 3 years and the owner has indicated he has no intention of re-commencing operations. The owner of the farm on Lot 21 has indicated that he is prepared to close the farm subject to the rezoning being finalised, allowing him to continue operation until subdivision and development is closer to occurring.

#### High Pressure Gas Pipeline

The District Structure Plan and local structure plan both acknowledge the pipeline with a buffer strip. The amendment will in any case be referred to the appropriate government agency (Department of Industry and Resources).

#### Social

The DSP, of which this proposed amendment and MRS Amendment No. 1072/33 directly to the north are a part, adopts the urban structuring principles defined in the WAPC's "Liveable Neighbourhoods" document. The Liveable Neighbourhoods design principles aim to achieve compact, better defined and sustainable urban communities.

Liveable Neighbourhoods encourages a wide variety of housing types and sizes, a wide variety of local employment opportunities, a sense of community focused on walkable neighbourhoods and towns and support for public transport. Local Structure Planning and local scheme amendments are expected to carry forward the Liveable Neighbourhoods principles making the area sustainable in a social context.

The proponents have proposed a local structure plan for the amendment area. However, that plan is not part of or otherwise subject to this amendment. The structure plan will be developed and approved through a separate planning process, should this amendment be successful.

The objectives of the local structure plan are:

- to implement current best practice principles with respect to urban design (safely, legibility, diversity, energy efficiency, connectivity and identity);
- to implement current best practice in relation to urban water and nutrient management - management of water balance and quality, maintenance of water elated environmental, recreational and cultural values;
- to create a sustainable urban environment incorporating integrated living, working, education and recreation environments and the introduction of clean modern technologies;
- to provide site responsive design capitalising on the natural attributes of the site and sharing these benefits amongst the maximum number of residents;

- v) to deliver high quality functional and accessible public parklands and community facilities;
- vi) to protect and conserve areas of significant vegetation by incorporating them within public open-space;
- vii) to provide a linear public open space recreation system that effectively links key local distributors and connects in with the adjacent regional reservation for Parks and Recreation;
- viii) to provide greater opportunities for increased unitisation of public transport;
- ix) to facilitate improvements in the regional and district road network and provide strategic links within Armadale-and the other-distrait and regional centres:
- to provide a range of housing and lifestyle choices through diverse lot mix, location and affordability;
- xi) to provide a catalyst for the revitalisation of Armadale.

#### **Economic**

The amendment area will be largely developed by the land owners at their expense in accordance with usual subdivision and development requirements of the City of Armadale (including requirements for cost sharing between landowners) and the WAPC.

### Implementation

The proponents and the City of Armadale can progress detailed structure planning and appropriate local scheme amendments while the MRS amendment is progressing. However, the WAPC is unlikely to give final approvals to these until the MRS amendment is finalised.

Following approval to local scheme amendments and the local structure plan, landowners can apply for subdivision approval. Subdivision conditions will be applied to ensure the required standards of subdivision and development occur.

## 6. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AUTHORITY ADVICE

The proposed amendment was referred to the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) for advice on whether environmental assessment would be required.

The EPA has advised that the proposed amendment does not require formal assessment under Part IV of the Environmental Protection Act, but has provided advice on the key environmental factors for the amendment. A copy of the notice is included at Appendix A.

### 7. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION

With the modification to the Environmental Management Area for Lake Forrestdale, the proposed amendment is consistent with the Southern River Forrestdale Brookdale Wungong District Structure Plan. The DSP provides a guide as to the appropriate future development of the subject area of north Forrestdale as well as adjoining areas while providing for management of key environmental issues. The DSP therefore, provides an overall and comprehensive context for the WAPC to consider proposed rezonings of land to Urban/Urban Deferred in the South East corridor.

The proposed amendment to the MRS intends rezoning the area shown on Figure 1 of this report from the Rural zone to the Urban zone. This will allow for the gradual urban development of the subject area, primarily for residential development and the associated commercial, educational and recreational land uses.

An important precursor to the subject MRS amendment and subsequent urban development has been the finalisation of the UWMS associated with the DSP which aims to protect water resources, ensure an enhanced living environment and provide protection from flooding. In this regard, an MOU will outline the responsibilities of all the relevant state and local government agencies.

### 8. THE AMENDMENT PROCESS

The amendment is proposed to be processed under Section 33 of the *Metropolitan Region Town Planning Scheme Act* as an individual, substantial (or "major") amendment to the MRS. This is on the basis that the amendment represents a substantial change in land use in the South East Corridor.

### 9. SUBMISSIONS ON THE AMENDMENT

The Western Australian Planning Commission invites people to comment on this proposed amendment to the Metropolitan Region Scheme.

The amendment is being advertised for public submissions for a period of three months from Tuesday 1 June 2004 to Friday 3 September 2004.

- ii) the municipal offices of the Cities of Perth, Fremantle, Armadale and Gosnells; and

The submissions and the transcripts of public hearings will become public documents. They will be published and will be made available free of charge when the amendment is presented to both Houses of Parliament.


### 11. MODIFICATIONS TO THE AMENDMENT


After considering any comments received from Government agencies and the public, the Western Australian Planning Commission may make modifications to the amendment.

The proposed Metropolitan Region Scheme (MRS) Omnibus Amendment No 1079/33A was advertised for public comment on 21 May 2004. The amendment relates to various portions of land within the Municipality. The explanation of the proposals is outlined below and Location Maps for each relevant proposal follow.

The proposals appear supportable. Most are of a generally minor nature. Proposal 17 relates to the transfer of Lot 1 Bishop Close, Armadale from "Public Purpose (High School)" to "Urban". Proposals 13, 17 and 18 will require subsequent minor modifications to the local TPS and can be reflected in TPS No 4. The proposals within the Cities of Canning and Gosnells, the Town of Victoria Park and the Shire of Serpentine-Jarrahdale under Amendment 1079/33A are relatively minor and do not affect the interests of the City of Armadale.

The Executive Director Development Services will make a submission to the WAPC supporting the proposed amendments. Any comments Councillors may have on the proposal should be forwarded to EDDS by Monday 12 July 2004 to ensure the submission can be forwarded to the WAPC by Friday 23 July 2004.

### City of Armadale

#### **PROPOSAL 13**

To rationalise the Rural zone and the Parks and Recreation reserve boundaries between Lots 900 and 901 and remove the Parks and Recreation reservation from a strip of land on the northern boundary of Lot 2, all on McNeill Road, Armadale.

Rationalisation of the Parks and Recreation reservation boundary between Lots 900 and 901 is required to reflect a recent assessment of the parks and recreation attributes of the subject landholdings. The WAPC is acquiring the portions of the landholdings proposed within the revised Parks and Recreation reservation. The strip of land north of Lot 2 is no longer required for Parks and Recreation.

### **PROPOSAL 14**

To transfer portion of the road reservation adjoining Lot 6 Brookton Highway, Roleystone from the Urban zone to Primary Regional Road (PRR) reservation.

The subject triangle of Urban zoned land is within the road reserve for the Brookton Highway. Accordingly, the land should be transferred to the PRR reservation.

### PROPOSAL 15

To transfer a portion of the Armadale-Kelmscott District Memorial Hospital site (Lot 4110) from the Public Purpose (Hospital) reservation to PRR reservation.

Rationalisation of the PRR reservation is required to make it consistent with cadastre boundaries of the hospital site. The subject land incorporates a deceleration lane and access to the hospital and it is therefore appropriate to transfer the subject land to the Primary Regional Road reservation.

### PROPOSAL 16

To increase and rationalise the PRR reservation at Lots 17, 16, 100, 58 and 60 fronting Albany-Highway between Haselmere Drive and Carawatha Avenue, Mt Nasura.

The proposal is to increase the PRR reservation to meet the cadastral boundaries of the above lots and to reserve additional land from Lots 16 and 58. The additional land will allow for bus embayments on Albany Highway.

Main Roads Western Australia supports the proposal.

### **PROPOSAL 17**

To transfer Lot 1 Bishop Close, Armadale from the Public Purposes (High School) reservation to the Urban zone:

The subject land contains an existing residential dwelling in private ownership. Accordingly, its reservation for High School purposes for the Cecil Andrews Senior High School is not appropriate and the land should be zoned Urban, consistent with the prevailing zoning in the locality.

The Education Department of Western Australia has no objection to the proposal.

### PROPOSAL 18

To remove the PRR reservation from the various properties on the South Western Highway between Albany Highway and Burndale Road and reclassify those properties as Urban zone, Central City zone and Public Purpose (High School) reservation as appropriate.

The Main Roads WA study "South West Highway Road Reserve Definition Study" reviewed and redefined the future reservation requirements for the section of the South West Highway south of Armadale to Burndale Road. The study found that the current 80m width is greater than is likely to be required for any future improvements to Highway and that only a 30m width is required. Accordingly, the MRS should be amended to reflect the reduced width.

However, part of the Highway south of Armadale Road is within the Armadale Redevelopment Area in which the MRS is suspended. Therefore, only that portion of PRR reserve shown on Figure 18 can be included in this MRS amendment.

### **PROPOSAL 19**

To transfer portion of Lot 14 Orchard Avenue, Armadale from PRR reservation to Parks and Recreation reservation.

A slight reduction of the PRR reservation and replacement with Parks and Recreation reservation is required to reduce the impact of the PRR reservation on the immediate surrounds of "Minnawarra House" on Pt Lot 14. The land requirements for the upgrading of Armadale Road have been amended accordingly.

Main Roads Western Australia has no objection to the proposal.
