Core IT Systems Implementation Status / Progress Report as at 27th August 2004

The following tables present the current status / progress for Phase 2 and Phase 3 of the Core IT Systems Implementation Project. (Phase 1 is now operational)

In essence what the tables show, is that both Phases of the implementation are proceeding in accordance with the timelines contained in the Project Management Plan. Scheduling of workshops and training for modules within Phases 2 and 3 is presently being arranged.

The implementation tasks mentioned in the following table are, in the main, common to all modules and are briefly explained as follows:

Overview: The Overview or introductory task is open to all staff, its purpose being to

raise general awareness of the concepts and functionality of each module. These sessions allow time for discussion of scenarios specific to the City and

the related implications.

Administration: The Administration training focuses on the detailed functionality and

operation of the module. Accordingly, these sessions are attended by fewer staff who are generally either responsible for or directly involved with the set-

up of the module and / or the ongoing system maintenance operation.

Set Up / Operation: This task is generally for officers that attend the Administration Training and

involves the detailed design and establishment of parameters and codes in readiness for data entry or transfer of migrated data. It also covers the

detailed operational aspects.

Data Migration: This task is applicable when information from the City's legacy system

(Administrator) is extracted, converted and transferred into the new Authority module. It should be noted that not all modules would entail data migration;

the typical reason being there is no current equivalent system.

Testing: The testing task is where staff are required to validate the data that was

migrated from the legacy system (if applicable) and to also test the different functions within each module to ensure that the module operates effectively and meets the City's requirements. Key staff, (generally those that require use

of the module) will be involved.

SOUTH EAST REGIONAL ENERGY GROUP

Minutes from the Meeting held on Thurs 5 August 2004

Present: Cr D Griffiths, Cr J Munn, Cr P Hart, Cr J Scott, Cr D Needham, C Eldridge, R Van Delft, W van Lieven and J Menzies.

Apologies: Cr C Matison.

Confirmation of Previous Minutes - 6 May 2004:

Motion: That the Minutes of the meeting held Thursday 6 May 2004 be accepted as a true and accurate record.

Moved: Cr P Hart

Seconded: Cr D Needham

CARRIED.

Business Arising:

1) Climate Clearance project profile - ICLEI "Initiative of the Month"

J Menzies advised the REG that D Murphy had responded to the letter sent by the SEREG in May 2004. There was a misunderstanding, and Councils participating in the CCP program can win the "IOM" award more than once. However D Murphy thought the project was more suitable as an information item in their monthly bulletin.

The Climate Clearance project was profiled in ICLEI's July 2004 bulletin, which also provided a link to the switch your thinking! website.

2) Sustainable Demonstration Home project

J Menzies has met with several large developers including Landcorp, the Armadale Redevelopment Authority and LWP Property Group (Ellenbrook developers) to discuss the possibility of constructing a sustainable demonstration home (or homes), within the region.

After several positive meetings, Landcorp informed J Menzies that they were not interested in sponsoring the project for a variety of reasons (including their intentions to withdraw from the Brookdale area, and they are proposing a similar type of project at Harvest Lakes).

The ARA have indicated they are still keen to be involved in the project and have requested that J Menzies submit a more detailed proposal for consideration by the board at their next meeting (1 September 2004).

LWP Property Group (R Perry) indicated they are keen to become involved in the SYT programme, and in the concept of building a sustainable display home in Byford (possibly Stage 2 of development on old ammunitions site) – just a question of when.

J Menzies to continue liaising with both parties, and others, in an effort to get the project up and running.

3) Tidy Bin Advertising Campaign 2004/05

J Menzies advised the REG that there are currently no promotional campaigns earmarked for the tidy bins in Gosnells, and one side of each bin was available for use in the *switch your thinking!* programme.

The CoA is currently considering whether to renew their contract with NatSales, who supply and manage the 'tidy-bins'. Currently 15 bins in CBD -8 in areas that don't sell.

R Van Delft advised the REG that it was highly probable that the bins in the CBD will be removed (as not consistent with new ARA design guidelines going before Council this month). The REG decided that it was not worth advertising on tidy bins in Armadale.

J Menzies advised the REG that CoA has 20 glass bus shelters (owned by the City) in which SEREG could advertise SYT. A further 5 bus shelters are currently being installed.

Motion: That J Menzies,

- 1) Proceed with proposed tidy-bin advertising campaign in Gosnells and coordinate the design and production of tidy-bin posters, and
- 2) Seek quotes for the design and printing of posters for bus shelters.

Moved: Cr P Hart

Seconded: Cr D Needham

CARRIED.

4) SEREG - Terms of Reference (ToR)

J Menzies advised the REG that he had begun investigating drafting a terms of reference document for the SEREG.

The SEREG was originally set up in 1999/2000 to implement the Local Action Plans and Regional Community Greenhouse Action Plan.

Members of the REG acknowledged the importance of having a ToR document and recommended they be prepared ASAP.

Recommendation: J Menzies draft a ToR document and circulate at the next meeting. The ToR document will need to be endorsed by each member Council.

Moved: Cr J Munn Seconded: Cr D Griffiths CARRIED

5) City of Armadale - Hopkinson Rd Tipsite - landfill gas emissions

R Van Delft advised the REG that studies on the quantities of landfill gas at the old tip site suggested there was not enough to make extraction and flaring economically viable. The cost of flaring was estimated to be approx \$250,000 - CoA does not have sufficient funds.

The CoA advertised locally for EOI's in extracting and using the landfill gas free of charge – no interest, not one EOI received.

B Sutton (Manager of Waste Services) is currently investigating a method of adding a 1m layer of topsoil to the tip site, to oxidise the CH4 (methane) and break it down to CO2 (much less damaging greenhouse gas). The CoA has also acted on green waste issues (nearly all green waste is mulched and used or sold), and as a result only a tiny proportion now goes to landfill.

6) City of Armadale - Admin building switching to Green Power

The CoA resolved to switch to Green Power in July 2003. As yet, no action has been taken.

CoA's Manager of Building Services is meeting with the company which won the tender to supply 'Green Power' next week.

J Menzies to follow up and report back at next meeting.

7) City of Armadale - Aquatic Centre - pool blankets

J Menzies advised the REG that he had discussed the matter with C Askew (Director, Community Development).

The CoA is currently waiting on a report from consultants. The report will look at issues such as the proposed enclosure of one of the Centre's pools. Council will review recommendations made in the report before any decision on pool blankets is made.

J Menzies to follow up with C Askew in September 2004.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

8) Sponsorship

- J Menzies advised the REG that the 2004/05 sponsorship drive was progressing well feedback on the proposal and programme has been very positive. The Examiner, Stockland and Water Corporation re-signed as sponsors in 2004/05. Solahart and Cool or Cosy are expected to re-commit in the next couple of weeks.
- J Menzies still liaising with AGL, Wesfarmers Kleenheat Gas, Alcoa, LWP Property Group and the ARA with regards to sponsorship of the 2004/05 SYT programme.

9) 12-week press series

J Menzies advised the REG that the press series concluded on 27 May 2004. The reaction from staff to the email component of the series was positive, with some staff seeking more information and several staff members taking advantage of the special discount offer from Cool or Cosy.

10) Great Gardens Programme

15 *Great Gardens* workshops will be held across the Swan Catchment during Spring. 4 of the 15 workshops will be held at Armadale and Gosnells as a result of strong support from SEREG and the AGLG, and good attendance rates at past workshops

Workshops will be held at:

Armadale – Wed 8 Sept from 6-9pm, and Thurs 9 Sept, from 9am – 12noon **Gosnells** – Sun 12 Sept, from 1-4 pm, and Mon 13 Sept, from 6-9pm

11) Green Light Project

J Menzies advised the REG that the final report and financial acquittal were forwarded in June 2004 together with an invoice for the second half of the original AGO grant (\$12,000).

The AGO was satisfied that the SEREG had done everything it set out to do in the project, and forwarding the balance of the grant (\$12,000) to Gosnells.

12) Climate Clearance Project

- J Menzies has completed the final report, and this will be forwarded to SEDO next week.
- J Menzies to organise accounts to be independently audited to fulfil obligations set out in SEDO Grant Agreement.

13) Regional Housing Retrofit pilot project

- J Menzies advised the REG that all audits were completed by mid-June. A total of 171 households participated in the pilot project.
- G Down completed 121 audits in total and submitted a summary report in July 2004.
- 80 households requested a worm farm. A special worm farm workshop was held at the City of Armadale on Sat 26 June 2004.
- J Menzies to take a stock-take of promotional items over left over from this, and other projects in the next couple of weeks.
- J Menzies distributed an Evaluation form to all participants in late June response rate of over 65%, indicating a strong interest in the project. Feedback was very positive with 100% of households implementing one, or all of the energy saving devices contained in the retrofit packs.
- J Menzies currently working on final report. Once complete, outcomes will be publicised as widely as possible.

14) 2004 Greenhouse Survey

J Menzies distributed the 2004 Regional Greenhouse Survey in May 2004. It was the third time the community has been surveyed on this topic.

Response rate was 21% (105 / 500) — all major indicators point to an increase in community knowledge on issues related to energy-efficiency and the greenhouse effect. *Switch your thinking!* programme appears to be successful. Full evaluation of programme needed to confirm this though.

J Menzies to investigate options for evaluation success of the programme and marketing initiatives to date.

15) SGIO Environment Awards 2004

J Menzies advised the REG that he was entering the *switch your thinking!* programme in the SGIO 2004 Environment Awards. Entering under Category 10 – Energy Efficiency.

W van Lieven also advised the REG that the CoG was entering the new Civic Complex (the Agonis) for an award – Category 11 – Eco-buildings.

Finalists will be announced in October 2004. Awards Ceremony will be in November 2004.

16) SEDO Funding Round

J Menzies met with Greg Elliott (Executive Director, SEDO Grants Committee) on 3 Aug 2004. Discussed current funding round and what type of projects SEDO would favour.

G Elliott mooted that there could be more money available in February 2005. On this advice, J Menzies will not seek funds for the Sustainable Demonstration Home project until next year.

J Menzies will prepare submissions seeking monies to implement the Switched on Living and an expanded Regional Housing Retrofit projects.

17) Community Based Social Marketing workshop

J Menzies and W van Lieven attended a CBSM workshop in June 2004. The workshop reviewed CBSM around the world and was very relevant to our SYT campaign.

Identified a need to evaluate the success of the SYT programme to date, before designing marketing strategy for 2004/05 (including brand recognition, effectiveness of different types of advertising (billboards, tidy-bins, press series etc).

J Menzies to investigate options for evaluating the success of the SYT programme to date (i.e. work with university / consultant to design and carry out a survey of some description) and report back to REG.

The REG also discussed the value of SYT displays at Community Events. J Menzies to create new display material and seek to have displayed whenever the opportunity arises. Display does not have to be staffed.

18) Neighbourhood Improvement Project (NIP)

J Menzies advised the REG that the NIP has now wound up.

J Menzies provided the NIP Committee a report on all sustainable projects run by SEREG, in conjunction with the NIP over the past 4-years (i.e. *switched on living pilot, Great Gardens and RHR pilot*), and their outcomes.

19) 2004/05 Draft Budget

J Menzies walked the REG through the 2004/05 draft budget. There are already sufficient funds in the SYT accounts to cover the operating expenses for 2004/05.

The budget is still in the early stages of development, and will not be finalised until the success of the campaign to date has been evaluated, and a new marketing strategy developed.

C Eldridge queried what the \$1500 allocated under the great gardens programme was for (itemised as demonstration garden). J Menzies advised the REG that this was a loose figure set aside to help set up a sustainable demonstration garden at each Council.

After some discussion, the REG agreed that since SJ missed out on some of the general SYT advertising in their Shire (i.e. Billboard and Tidy-bins in Armadale / Gosnells only), that the funds allocated in the budget for the demonstration gardens could be utilised by SJ to help set up a demonstration garden in the Shire and erect suitable signage.

J Menzies to investigate and report back at the next meeting.

20) 2004/05 Official Breakfast launch

J Menzies advised the REG that once all sponsors had been secured, an official breakfast launch would be held. It was envisaged that this would take place in Sept / October 2004.

The REG discussed where the breakfast would be held. The REG resolved that if J Menzies received administrative support from C Vella, that the breakfast would be held at Armadale this year.

21) RGC (J Menzies) contract and performance review

J Menzies departed the room whilst discussion occurred. W van Lieven advised that the RGC Management Committee (W van Lieven, C Eldridge, R Van Delft) had conducted a staff performance appraisal on 27 July, with the resulting recommendation to the REG that the RGC be awarded a 3% salary increment, backdated to 5 July 2004, in keeping with the City of Gosnells' appraisal and increment procedures.

The City of Gosnells Staff Development Cycle steps and objectives are:

- 1. Review Position Description Form to ensure currency and accuracy, clarify expectations of employee in terms of key tasks, duties and responsibilities
- 2. Review current Strategic and Business Plans to put the employee 'in the picture', identify priorities and provide a context for the individual plan
- 3. Review the performance of the employee and work area over the past (12 month) cycle in order to recognise and show appreciation for achievements, progress and efforts, and to identify problems and opportunities that need to be addressed
- 4. Record a written plan to make clear the performance (standards and results) expected of the employee, to guide and support the employee's work and development in the coming year, and to allow the employee to monitor and manage their own performance effectively

Recommendation: That the RGC, on the basis of a very successful performance appraisal, be awarded a 3% salary increase backdated to 6 July 2004, and that this recommendation be forwarded to the City of Gosnells' Human Resources unit for action.

Moved: Cr J Munn

Seconded: Cr D Griffiths

CARRIED

J Menzies rejoined the meeting, and was advised of the outcomes of discussion held in his absence.

22) Energy Audits

J Menzies advised the REG that he had borrowed an energy meter and was currently conducting energy audits at each Council, including audits of appliances and equipment left on over night, and quantification of energy usage and costs.

23) CCP – Milestone 5

W van Lieven advised the REG that the CoG was going to commence M5 in the coming months.

R Van Delft informed the REG that CoA was did not currently have the funds to carry out M5, but would seek to do so in 2005, when new software is expected to make the task feasible in a much shorter timeframe.

J Menzies to liaise with ICLEI and other CCP Councils in a bid to find a suitable person to complete the M5 reporting requirements. J Menzies to seek 2 quotes, one for doing just Gosnells, and the other to do Gosnells and Armadale.

24) Websites

W van Lieven advised the REG that Gosnells was in the process of reviewing its website, including the SYT website. J Menzies and W van Lieven to liaise with P Campbell (Manager IT) and update the SYT website.

SGIO ENVIRONMENT AWARDS

Category 10 – Sustainable Energy Development Office – Energy Efficiency Award Section 1: Executive Summary

The Cities of Armadale and Gosnells and the Shire of Serpentine-Jarrahdale are working as a region to encourage energy efficiency and reduce greenhouse gas emissions, promote health and liveability in the region, and to develop partnerships with business, industry and residents. Together, the member Councils are known as the South East Regional Energy Group (SEREG).

The *Switch your thinking!* programme (*SYT*) was instigated to enable the SEREG Councils and their communities to implement measures, which will save energy and operating costs, and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The programme has been strategically designed to engage the community in participating in achieving our regional emissions reduction target of 15% by the year 2010 (set as part of the Councils involvement in the Cities for Climate Protection (CCPTM) programme).

International experience shows that changing the way people behave with respect to energy conservation is never an easy thing to do. *SYT* epitomises a systematic and locally tailored approach to social marketing. Based on literature research and surveys of the community, the programme has been designed to address specific barriers and opportunities to changing environmental behaviour associated with the south-east metropolitan region.

Section 2: Media Summary

The South East Regional Energy Group comprises representatives of the Cities of Armadale and Gosnells, and Serpentine-Jarrahdale Shire. The Group's objective is to reduce regional greenhouse emissions by 15% by 2010 based on 1998/99 levels.

The comprehensive *switch your thinking!* programme was developed to address barriers and opportunities to changing environmental behaviour.

Ferguson flags more flexible R2R2

A Labor Government would make substantial changes to the operation of the renewed Roads to Recovery program, Opposition Transport Spokesman, Martin Ferguson, said this week. Addressing the National Infrastructure Summit in Melbourne, Mr Ferguson said Labor wanted to see "a \$300 million per year program from the Commonwealth leveraged into a \$400 million or \$500 million per year program" by encouraging partnerships among those with the capacity to be involved in infrastructure development.

He wanted Councils to think regionally, not locally. Labor was "prepared to consider three and four way funding partnerships for local roads involving all tiers of Government working to leverage private sector financing to get more projects completed more often". Labor's Roads to Recovery style program would also see the type of projects eligible for funding extended to include public infrastructure development, such as park and ride facilities, cycling trails, regional airport runways and freight terminals and railway crossings. As previously reported in ALGA News, Mr Ferguson last month committed Labor to renewing

the Roads to Recovery program for four more years and renewing the Black Spot road safety program. The commitments came when he addressed ALGA's National Roads Congress in the Barossa Valley in July.

R2R2 a "new deal", says Lloyd

In his first speech as Federal Minister for Local Government, Territories and Roads, Jim Lloyd has described the renewed Roads to Recovery program as a "new deal" with Local Government. Addressing National the Infrastructure Summit (www.ministers.dotars.gov.au) on Tuesday, Mr. Lloyd said the renewed program continued support for local roads until 2008 -2009. It also encouraged the development of strategic regional planning and infrastructure. He said the \$100 million a year strategic component would be available to Councils to undertake local land transport infrastructure projects of strategic regional importance, particularly those that support emerging and expanding industries.

"The strategic fund will be allocated competitively, however, the Government intends that the funding will be shared fairly across Australia," he told the Summit. ALGA and State Local Government Associations are pressing for a firm commitment on at least state-based allocations of the \$100 million a year strategic component of the renewed program.

Montgomery warns of infrastructure crisis

Access to a fair share of national taxation revenue, a Roads to Recovery style program for non-infrastructure and a whole-of-government approach to infrastructure policy setting and funding were needed to help avert the crisis facing Local Government's ageing asset base, ALGA President, Mike Montgomery, told the National Infrastructure Summit (www.ministers.dotars.gov.au) on Monday. Cr Montgomery said Local Government had been slow to embrace the use of public private partnerships. While they offered some hope for the future, they must not be used by State and Federal Governments as an excuse for avoiding a need to assist Local Government renew crumbling infrastructure and provide much needed new facilities, particularly in growth areas. Infrastructure will be the theme for the ALGA / National Economics State of the Regions report to be released at the Regional Development and Cooperation Forum (www.nga.alga.asn.au) in November. The forum is the curtain raiser to the National General Assembly of Local Government, to be held in Canberra on 7 – 10 November.

ALGA releases road data reports

ALGA has released two reports on how existing road data from all jurisdictions can be aggregated into a national roads database. Such a database would be a useful starting point for the quantification of important national local roads information. Over time, the database would also provide a basis for better decision-making on national local roads policy and infrastructure management programs. The studies were funded by the *Regional Funding Initiatives Branch* program (formerly Networking the Nation). Stage One of this project showed that key local roads data can be easily collected from existing data sources for all jurisdictions and held in an open-source database which can be interrogated by all sectors of Local Government. The Stage Two report developed a business case for a national approach to local roads data collection; outlined the costs and benefits which would accrue to all sectors of Local Government; and suggested an implementation strategy to complement existing Local Government Asset Management initiatives. The starting point would be the

development of a National Local Roads Asset Database, which collected data from existing State / Territory Grants Commission surveys. The project will be progressed by the ALGA Roads and Transport Advisory Committee, in the context of a national Local Government roads data and asset management strategy.

Digital divide looms for Councils

Continued Government support is likely to remain important to avoid a digital divide disadvantaging Councils, businesses and individuals in regional areas, a new report has found. The report – Broadband Adoption by Agriculture and Local Government Councils – was released by ALGA, the Federal Department of Communications, Information Technology and the Arts and the Rural Industries Research and Development Corporation. It said adoption of broadband could enable disadvantaged Councils to take "a large leap forward" by having access to low-cost broadband. A survey of 200 Councils across Australia found that while all Councils had internet access, 89% of urban Councils were on broadband compared to 59% of those in rural areas. Altogether, 68% of Councils were on broadband and 32% on dial up. Nearly 40% of Councils not on broadband (equivalent to 10% of all Councils) said they had no plans to adopt it or did not know when they would do so. The reasons given for remaining on dial-up were: broadband not available (62%); dial up perceived to be cheaper (15%); and dial up best for their needs (11%). ALGA is calling for further Federal support to assist Councils access the benefits of information technology now that the landmark Networking the Nation program had come to a close.

Broadband funding for regional projects

Expressions of interest have been called by the Australian Government for a second round of broadband infrastructure project grants from the Coordinated Communications Infrastructure Fund. The Fund supports investment in broadband infrastructure to improve health, education and Government services in regional areas. Successful projects from round one were announced in April (www.dcita.gov.au). These included a fibre optic cable in the Northern Territory, a microwave broadband backbone along the Yorke Peninsula in South Australia and a 'last mile' infrastructure project that will bring broadband to 16 towns in Far North Queensland. The Fund is open to State, Territory and Local Governments; health or education service providers; community groups; telecommunication carriers; service providers; and other companies. Details are available from the 'view tenders, current' section of the Austender website (www.tenders.gov.au). Expressions of interest close on 21 September.

Labor plans to cane greedy insurers

Insurers that failed to pass on the benefits of public liability law reforms would be faced with fines of up to \$10 million, Labor Financial Services Spokesman, Senator Stephen Conroy, said this week. A Labor Government would amend the trade practices legislation to allow the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission to take action against insurance companies that failed to reduce premiums while reaping excessive profits. Senator Conroy said the industry had been taking windfall profits instead of making policies more accessible. A monitoring report released last week by the ACCC showed that premiums rose by 17% last year, down from 44% the year before. Insurers expected premiums to rise by only 4% this year.


Senate backs ALGA water call

A Senate Committee has echoed ALGA's call for an early commitment by State and Federal Governments to a program of structural adjustment assistance to communities whose

economics will be adversely affected by the introduction of water trading under the National Water Initiative. The Council of Australian Governments has agreed to the concept of community focused structural adjustment for those communities that may be adversely affected by water trading, but individual Governments are yet to allocate funds for this purpose. Instead, they will allocate funds on a needs basis. The call comes in a report on rural water use (www.aph.gov.au) tabled last week by the Senate Rural and Regional Affairs Committee. The Committee also examined the problem the separation of water from land value presents for Local Government. The issue was raised by ALGA more than 12 months ago with the Council of Australian Governments. State Governments agreed to address the issue within their own jurisdictions.

\$700,000 to help Councils counter car theft

The National Motor Vehicle Theft Reduction Council has launched a new guide on car theft for local communities and is providing \$700,000 in grants to Councils in car crime hot spots. The guide, Tackling Vehicle Theft: A Guide for Local Communities, provides facts about car theft, showcases creative prevention and education campaigns and highlights the Council's new range of free public education materials. Twenty grant packages of \$35,000 each (in direct funding, materials and immobiliser installations) have also been offered to selected Councils identified by police data as hotspots for older vehicle theft. The grants will fund projects that raise awareness about vehicle security and fit immobilises to high risk cars.

Hugh Mackay to address GA

The nation's best known social researcher, Dr Hugh Mackay, will be a keynote speaker at this year's National General Assembly of Local Government (www.nga.alga.asn.au) to be held in Canberra on 7 – 10 November. He will address delegates on the subject of 'Is the Tide Turning for Communities?' Dr Mackay is a psychologist, social researcher and writer who has made a life-long study of the attitudes and behaviour of the Australian community. Registrations for the General Assembly are now open.

Citizenship promotional material available for Councils

The Australian Government acknowledges Local Government's central role in welcoming new citizens into the community by conferring Australian citizenship and by being an important local point of contact for new citizens. To support the work of Local Government in promoting Australian citizenship, the Department of Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs produces Australian citizenship promotional material for use by Councils. An order form can be accessed on the Department's website (www.citizenship.gov.au). Material includes posters, fact sheets and planners.

ACCC reviews price increases for airport services

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission this week issued a paper seeking public comment on an airport charges pricing proposal by Airservices Australia (www.accc.gov.au). Airservices is proposing a long-term pricing arrangement that will apply for five years, beginning in October, covering all its air navigation services throughout Australia. Local Government has been strongly critical of the initial pricing structure

proposed by Airservices and the impact this would have on regional airports and communities. The new pricing proposal contains recommendations for increases in the prices of terminal navigation and aviation rescue and fire fighting services and decreases in the prices charged for en-route navigation services. The ACCC is seeking submissions by 14 September. A copy of the issues paper and Airservices pricing proposal is available from the ACCC.

Bike body seeks Council feedback

The Australian Bicycle Council has a number of current projects (www.abc.dotars.gov.au) on which it is seeking Local Government input. Issues for input include whole-of-life costings for cycle facilities, pedestrian-bicycle interactions and green bike lanes.

Sri Lankan Councillors to train in Australia

Local Government representatives are to be given training in Australia, the Sri Lankan Minister of Provincial Councils and Local Government, Janaka Bandara Thennakoon, said this week. Around 100 Councillors will be trained annually. The objective of the program is to enable Local Government representatives to provide a more productive service to the general public. Minister Thennakoon will tour Australia to explore training opportunities.

Cost shifting top issue for ALGA Executive

The ALGA Executive will today wind up two days of meetings in Darwin where it has considered a broad range of issues at its quarterly meeting. The Executive consists of two representatives from each State and Territory Local Government Association and the Government of the ACT. The Executive considered strategies and tactics to take forward the *FairShare* report on cost shifting and Local Government financing, tabled in Federal Parliament last November. In particular, the Executive considered a proposed model for an intergovernmental agreement on cost shifting.

An inter-Governmental working party has been established to develop a draft agreement, which will go before the Local Government and Planning Ministers' Council later this year. The Executive also considered steps that now need to be taken to secure ALGA's key goal – a fair share of national taxation revenue for Local Government. Other issues included the review of the national packaging covenant, the coming Federal Election and a major report on the outcomes of the national component of the *Networking the Nation* program.

Model DA sent back for more work

A working group reporting to the Development Assessment Forum (www.daf.gov.au) met last week to consider a fresh version of the controversial model for development assessment. The model has been reworked by consultants to take into account views expressed by key stakeholders during a round of national consultations held earlier this year. After considering the findings from the consultation, the working group has sent the model back to the consultants requesting further detail about how the revised model would work, particularly as it relates to development policy and determination processes. ALGA has strongly opposed parts of the model DA which undermine the ability of Councillors to exercise their right to make decisions on individual development applications. The final model is likely to provide a number of determination options, deferring the final decision as to the most appropriate option, to the relevant consent authority. ALGA was represented at the meeting of the working group by the President, Cr Mike Montgomery. The working group has established a taskforce to work with the consultants to ensure the new model reflects the concerns expressed by all stakeholders during the consultation period. ALGA is represented on the taskforce by Jonathan Cartledge, Assistant Director Regional Development Policy, (jonathan.cartledge@alga.asn.au). A full meeting of the Development Assessment Forum will be held on 30 September to consider a more detailed version of the model DA. The Forum includes representatives of Local Government, professional associations, State and Federal Governments and the construction and building industries.

ALGA welcomes new funds for regional airport security

ALGA. welcomed the Australian Government's announcement has (www.ministers.dotars.gov.au) that it will spend an extra \$48 million tightening security (www.dotars.gov.au) at regional airports. Transport Minister, John Anderson, said this week that a full range of security equipment, including metal detectors, would be supplied to 146 regional airports though these would only be used in response to specific information or within 12 hours of a change in terrorist attack alert levels. Mr Anderson said the Australian Federal Police would establish four rapid deployment teams that would fly to regional centres to counter any terrorist attack. The teams will be on standby in Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and Perth. The teams would also provide security advice and training to regional airport staff. The new funding also covered the cost of fitting hardened cockpit doors to charter aircraft that carried 30 or more passengers. The funding is in addition to an allocation of \$35 million to help smaller regional airports meet the capital costs of new security requirements at regional airports announced late last year.

General Assembly to consider post-election landscape

With a Federal Election imminent, this year's National General Assembly of Local Government (www.nga.alga.asn.au/generalAssembly/2004) features an examination of the political opportunities for Local Government in the months and years ahead. Two of Australia's most senior political insiders, Grahame Morris and Bob Hogg, will look at the post-election landscape and examine the implications for Local Government. Grahame Morris was a former Chief of Staff to Prime Minister John Howard while Bob Hogg served as ALP National Secretary and Senior Adviser to former Prime Minister, Bob Hawke. On-line registration is now available (www.nga.alga.asn.au/generalAssembly/2004). Early bird registrations close on 20 September. Motions must be lodged by 10 September. The 2004 General Assembly will be held in Canberra on 7-10 November.

Heritage: Councils eligible for story telling grants

Sharing Australia's Stories (www.deh.gov.au/heritage/programs/index) is a \$3 million, three-year grants program announced by the Australian Government this week. It gives Australians the opportunity to demonstrate how their stories have contributed to the great events and themes that have shaped our nation. Grants of between \$5,000 and \$50,000 are available to Local Government, community groups, schools and individuals who wish to tell the stories that shaped the nation. Multicultural, Indigenous and conservation groups are also encouraged to apply. Eligible projects could be about a place, a community, event, activity, tradition or family. They can tell the story of Australia's natural heritage or its flora, fauna or landscape. The project may involve publishing books, guides or websites, developing events or could be interpretive exhibitions and signage. Applications close on 15 October.

Hearings underway into price controls on Telstra

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission are holding a series of public hearings (www.accc.gov.au) as part of its review of Telstra price control arrangements. The current price control arrangements, which expire at the end of June next year, specify maximum prices Telstra can charge, on average, for fixed line telephony services, including line rental and local calls. Within these maximum average prices, Telstra is free to set its own charges for certain consumers such as business, residential, metropolitan, rural communities or pensioners. The ACCC is reviewing a range of issues including the price cap that allows Telstra to increase line rentals each year, the price cap requiring price reductions in a basket of local, fixed-to-mobile and domestic and international long-distance calls and the requirement on Telstra to cap calls at 22 cents a call. It will also examine the local call parity requirement, which means Telstra must ensure customers in non-metropolitan areas pay broadly the same price for un-timed local calls as those in metropolitan areas. The ACCC will report back to the Federal Communications Minister by 31 January next year.

Water label scheme to save a bucket

A new water efficiency labelling (www.deh.gov.au) designed to save more than 87,000 mega-litres a year, was launched last week. This is the first national scheme of this kind in the world. The mandatory scheme is being phased in and by late next year, all washing machines, dishwashers, toilets, showerheads, some taps and urinals must carry water efficiency labels. Minimum water efficiency standards will also apply to toilets. The labelling system will assist consumers to make informed decisions when choosing appliances and will educate people on what water savings are possible. Choosing more efficient appliances will not only reduce water use, but also electricity bills. Nearly half of the water savings will come from washing machines, 25% from showers and about 22% from toilets.



Revised guide on rural rollout rights

In response to community concern, the Australian Communications Authority has recently updated its report on the rollout of telecommunication facilities in rural areas. The report - Telecommunications Infrastructure: Information for Rural Communities — (www.aca.gov.au) has been developed to inform rural landowners and occupiers about their rights and obligations under the current legislative regime and provides answers to frequently asked questions regarding land restoration, paddock hygiene and the role of the

Telecommunications Industry Ombudsman. The report also provides an updated list of contacts and links for more information.

River communities eligible for grants

The Murray Darling Basin Commission is offering up to \$1.2 million to irrigation system operators, industry associations, Governments, catchment authorities and other groups, to projects implement water recovery under TheLiving (www.thelivingmurray.mdbc.gov.au) initiative. Communities have been asked for costeffective infrastructure improvement projects that can be further investigated and developed for future recovery of water for the environment. Examples include the installation of pipelines, lining of sections of irrigation channels, construction of works to change how storages operate, installation of metering systems and decommissioning of some supply structures and systems. Each funded project is likely to receive \$100,000 or less, unless a special case can be presented. Generally, matching funding or in-kind contributions will need to be offered by the project proponent. Projects are being called for the southern part of the Basin that will each result in an average annual increase of flows in the rivers of at least two giga-litres. Applications must be received by the Commission by 30 August. Organisations considering submitting a proposal should download the prospectus and application form (www.thelivingmurray.mdbc.gov.au).

ARRB running road safety and pavement design workshops

A workshop explaining and assisting road safety practitioners to use *Austroads Traffic Engineering Practice Part 4: Investigation and Treatment of Crash Locations*, will be held in Bendigo and Grafton during September. Details about this important aspect of road safety engineering have been posted to the ARRB website (www.arrb.com.au). Seminars at other locations will be announced in September. ARRB is also undertaking a series of seminars explaining changes to the *Austroads Pavement Design Guide*. These commenced in Melbourne this week and will run through to November.

Olympics: Sydney seeks homecoming parade

Sydney Lord Mayor, Clover Moore, has written to NSW Premier, Bob Carr, to propose a welcome home parade to honour Australian Olympians. Cr Moore said the City of Sydney would be pleased to offer Sydney Town Hall for a reception following the parade. In the letter, the Lord Mayor said she would be delighted to join with the Premier in welcoming home this outstanding Olympic team. "This is one of the best games we've ever had and, together with the State Government, we would like to pay tribute to our athletes, officials and their families," the Lord Mayor said.








Town Planning KPI's (January - June 2004)




BUILDING DEPARTMENT KPI's January – June 2004








Relative Incidence of Notifiable Enteric Disease




Number of Vaccinations in City of Armadale Clinics

BROOKDALE COMMUNITY HEALTH SURVEY

The Report on the Brookdale Community Health Survey, undertaken by the Department of Health in response to increasing community concern over the past few years relating to the possibility of chemical exposure and effects on health to people living in close proximity to the Brookdale Liquid Waste Treatment Facility (LWTF), was released on 5th August.

The WA Health and Wellbeing Surveillance System (WAHWSS), an ongoing survey system conducted as a Computer Assisted Telephone Interview that asks Western Australians about their health and lifestyle, was chosen as the vehicle to conduct the special study of Brookdale residents. The WAHWSS was selected because it had been collecting information on symptoms commonly attributed to chemical exposure, via a special module containing questions about symptoms that have been attributed to such exposure, since September 2002 and as such was seen as an appropriate comparison group against which to assess the health and well being of Brookdale residents.

A random sample 1056 people drawn from the 2003 Electronic White Pages and living in and around the Brookdale area took part in the survey. Because, theoretically, potential for toxin exposure can be expected to be higher closer to the LWTF almost 40% of the households within a three kilometre radius compared to only 4.7% of households in a 3-5 kilometre radius of the Facility were surveyed. The overall response rate was 79.1%.

The analysis was conducted in three stages, these being:

- provision of a description of the demographic characteristics of the sample of Brookdale and comparing them with the City of Armadale as a whole;
- presentation of a profile of the risk factors and health-enhancing behaviours of the residents of Brookdale compared with the State; and
- comparison of health conditions and symptoms between Brookdale and the State.

Data were adjusted to compensate for lifestyle behaviour and prevalence of any particular condition(s) and weighted for over sampling and the probability of being selected to respond to the survey.

The major aim of the survey was to identify any health problems in Brookdale that were atypical of the State in general, and then to explain the differences if possible. Although it began in November 2002, it was stopped after one week to allow for more community consultation and didn't resume again in March 2003. The WAHWSS nevertheless kept collecting information on symptoms commonly attributed to chemical exposure until June 2003 to ensure that there would be enough people in the comparison group (residents throughout WA) to make valid judgments.

While the Report does not (and cannot) draw firm conclusions about the cause of any health outcome, the results do provide a comprehensive "snapshot" of health status of people whom live in the Brookdale area. Points of particular interest are summarized below.

- 1. A relatively high proportion of Brookdale adults (compared with the State as a whole) had lifestyle behaviours or characteristics known to be associated with ill health. These included:
 - Smoking (males and females);
 - Consumption of alcohol at high risk levels (females only);
 - Body Mass Index in the overweight range (females only);
 - Body Mass Index in the obese range (all persons);
 - Undertake no physical activity (all persons);

- Very sedentary in leisure time (all persons); and
- Eat no fruit (all persons);
- Do not eat vegetables daily (all persons).
- 2. An elevated proportion of Brookdale residents (men and women) reported high or very high psychological distress levels. While the actual cause of this prevalence cannot be determined by a survey of this type, the issue may require further investigation.
- 3. Of the self-reported doctor diagnosed health conditions investigated, prevalence of arthritis (males) and diabetes (males) were higher in Brookdale compared to the State.
- 4. The proportion of Brookdale residents (females and persons) who reported being diagnosed with high blood pressure or high blood cholesterol was lower than the State figures.
- 5. After controlling for socio-demographic and lifestyle differences, however, the analysis showed that only the likelihood of reporting diabetes seemed to have a significant association with living in Brookdale.
- 6. The study also investigated the prevalence of symptoms that have been commonly attributed to chemical exposure. While the initial analysis indicated that the prevalence of some symptoms, including breathing difficulties, feeling weak or dizzy, fatigue after a good night's sleep and skin irritations were markedly higher in Brookdale compared with the State, after controlling for differences in socio-demographic and lifestyle factors, analysis did not indicate any significant association between living in Brookdale and these symptoms.
- 7. A search of the literature on chemical exposure and associated symptoms found that symptoms commonly attributed, and reported as being due, to exposure primarily affect the respiratory and nervous systems and include headache, fatigue, weakness, difficulty concentrating, short-term memory loss, dizziness, irritability and depression, itching, numbness, burning sensation, congestion, sore throat, hoarseness, shortness of breath, cough and stomach pains. These were all included in the survey but participants were also asked about nosebleeds because it was a symptom frequently reported by the media as being common in Brookdale. The proportion of females and for all persons reporting a nosebleed at least once during the previous four weeks was significantly higher for Brookdale compared with the State.

The Report concludes that there appeared an association between living in Brookdale and an increased likelihood of reporting diabetes and nosebleeds. Examination of air, soil, water and sludge in and around the Brookdale Liquid Waste Treatment Facility, however, showed no toxicological evidence to support the involvement of the Brookdale Treatment Waste Treatment Facility in the reporting of nosebleeds. Similarly, although some studies suggested an association between chemical exposure and diabetes, the chemicals at the levels of exposure involved were not found in Brookdale.

It also remarks that, while not specifically associated with living in Brookdale, the elevated proportion of Brookdale residents who reported high or very high psychological distress levels and current emotional problems compared with the State was notable.

These issues were identified as needing further investigation, and a letter was forwarded to the Department of Health enquiring whether it is intended to undertake such an investigation, and if so

whether consideration has been given to what form it may take and when it is expected to begin. The reply from the Chief Medical Adviser, Population Health, says (in part):

"When all the available information is collated, there is no scientific rationale for further investigation in an attempt to find an undiscovered emission from the Facility. Consideration of all the information collected over the past two years shows the following picture:

- The Facility undertook cold processing of liquid wastes; there was no heating or other processes that would vaporize chemicals and create large volumes of fumes. The Facility has no chimney, so odours and fumes released would have been confines to the local area. While of low statistical power, the analysis of health data show that the strength of association between diabetes and nosebleeds was weaker for people living closer to the Facility than for those living at a distance.
- The workforce at the Facility was stable, long-term workforce with no reported health problems. They did not report nosebleeds or any specific health issues. Medical monitoring and regular monitoring for heavy metals did not indicate any particular exposure.
- Comprehensive monitoring of the environment by the Department of Environment did not show elevated levels of either volatile organic compounds or heavy metals. Environmental monitoring encompassed monitoring of air, soil, groundwater and some additional surface swabs taken from the Forrestdale Primary School.
- The high lead level reported in the air monitoring of August 2003 was clearly an error. The levels were too high to be credible, the monitoring points did not fit with a source at the Facility, there was no lead found in other environmental samples and the extensive blood lead survey (n=603) showed very low mean lead levels with <1% of the population having a blood lead greater than 10ug/dL (the NHMRC current 'level of concern'). This is not the picture of a point source exposure to lead.
- Biological monitoring for heavy metals among a group of people who presented to the community nurse did not show that people had toxicity from these metals.
- The community nurse collected data on the people who came to her for advice. The symptom and illness data do not form a pattern that identifies any particular exposures of unusual preponderance of illness."



OPENING AND WELCOME

Kim Fletcher opened the Meeting and welcomed those present.

MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

The Minutes of the Meeting on 19 February 2004 were confirmed on a motion of Margaret Bettenay seconded by Hugh Carder. Carried.

BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES

1. Old Chimney Pot

There was discussion on the old chimney pot currently in History House. It was agreed Mr Carder approach the City's Manager Property Services to enquire whether the chimney pot can be replaced on the chimney of the old School in the Minnawarra Historic Preceinct.

2. Armadale Shale Quarry

Mr Carder advised that he, Louis Fouché and Matthew Hall (Senior Projects Engineer) from the City of Armadale had met with Ian Baxter and Christine Lewis from the HCWA regarding the proposed Quarry entry in the State's Register of Heritage Places and its implications for Council, particularly in the light of safety concerns. The matter had been discussed and the HCWA representatives had advised that they saw no great problems for Council if the property was listed. They undertook to supply a formal written response to the City's letter.

Kim Fletcher advised that he had spoken to the CEO of the National Trust. They saw the Shale Quarry as an important geological site. There were few other such sites listed.

MINUTES - COMMUNITY HERITAGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING

GENERAL BUSINESS

1. Position of Minute Secretary

Mr Carder advised that he had received an expression of interest for the Minute Secretary position from Mr John Glassford (City of Armadale's Manager Property Services) who had an interest in heritage matters. It was agreed that Mr Glassford be invited to undertake the Minute Secretary duties.

2. Update on Morrison Park Displaced Persons Camp Project

Kim Fletcher advised that Adrian Choules had made a submission to Lotteries West on behalf of the Kelmscott Migrant Camps History Group seeking funds for the memorial. An amount of \$5000 was being made available for the project by the City's Community Services Directorate.

The Open Day held at the site on Saturday 2 May 2004 had been a great success. The more interesting names suggested for the park were "a New Beginning" and "Migrant Park".

3. Road Naming Criteria for Consideration

Cr Zelones advised that the Mayor is working on a list of names of Road Board Members, some of which may be suitable for road names. It was agreed that Mr Carder distribute the list of potential road names currently held by Council to CHAC Members.

4. Update on Historical Information Regarding Named Reserves in the City of Armadale

Members advised they were still noting various pieces of information regarding the named reserves. It was noted that Barry Poad Reserve and Horrie Hill Reserve were not on the list. Mr Carder to check to ensure no others have inadvertently been omitted.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Cr Zelones advised that he had been rephotographing as many properties in the MHI as were accessible. He had reformatted the MHI in a PDF format with the original photographs and new photographs included. It all fitted on a CD ROM.

Mr Carder advised that he had just received notice from the HCWA that St Mary's Church and Graveyard was considered not to have sufficient cultural heritage significance at the State level for inclusion in the State Register of Heritage Places. A copy of the advice was supplied to Members.

Doreen Bloomfield advised that this was the 100th year of the building of St Matthew's Church which had been consecrated on 18 December 1904. Commemorative celebrations were going to be held. Mr Carder to check whether it would be permissible to put information posters regarding the events in the City's libraries and on the Administration Centre noticeboard.

The next meeting is to be held at 7.00pm on Thursday 19 August 2004 in Council's Committee Room. With no further business, the Meeting was closed at 8.20pm.





10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys, an open concrete channel connected with cast iron pipe siphons following the contours of the Darling Scarp between Canning Dam and Martin, together with two stone chimneys and a number of associated works including stilling ponds, a flow measurement building (and flume) and archaeological sites such as the former chlorination plant and filtration equipment at the Gosnells terminus, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is the only example in Western Australia of an open contour channel built for the transfer of solely potable water, which provided drinking water to the metropolitan area from 1940 to 1975;

the construction of the place provided direct employment for a large number of men under sustenance programs during the 1930s Depression;

the place is an <u>important</u> site in the history of the provision of Perth's water supply, demonstrating the resourcefulness of the Metropolitan Water Supply and the Public Works Department in addressing the problem of Perth's water supply during the 1930s Depression; and,

the place was designed by prominent engineers, Russell (RJ) Dumas, Engineer in Charge of Construction, E. W. Tindale, the Chief Engineer and Resident Engineers Victor Munt and Don Munro. Engineers E. H. Oldham and J. W. Allen supervised the construction of the place.

11. 1 AESTHETIC VALUE*

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys, a series of concrete channels and joining cast iron siphons constructed following the contours of the Darling Scarp from the Canning Dam to Gosnells (today's location known as Martin), and two stone chimneys located along the length of the channel, sit well in their environment and provide a balance between the natural environment and the man made structures. (Criterion 1.3)

11. 2. HISTORIC VALUE

The construction of the place provided direct employment for a large number of men under sustenance programs during the 1930s Depression using a large quantity of local materials such as cement. It was one of the projects that contributed to the recovery of Western Australia's economy. (Criterion

With water sourced from the Canning Dam, Canning Contour Channel (fmr) provided the main supply of water to the metropolitan area from 1940 to 1975, when it was superseded by the Canning Tunnel. The place demonstrates the resourcefulness of the Metropolitan Water Supply and the Public Works Department in addressing the problem of Perth's water supply at a time of economic hardship. (Criterion 2.2)

The design and development of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) is associated with prominent engineers, Russell (RJ) Dumas, Engineer in Charge of Construction, E. W. Tindale, the Chief Engineer and Resident Engineers Victor Munt and Don Munro. E. H. Oldham and J. W. Allen supervised the construction of Canning Contour Channel (fmr). (Criterion 2.3)

The design and construction of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was an economically viable technical achievement in a time of economic hardship, requiring a high degree of manual labour due to the hilly terrain, which made it difficult to access with mechanical equipment. (Criterion 2.4)

11. 3. SCIENTIFIC VALUE

11. 4. SOCIAL VALUE

The continued use of parts of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys as a walking path by local residents reflects its ability to interest people beyond the time of its original function. (Criterion 4.1)

12. DEGREE OF SIGNIFICANCE

12. 1. RARITY

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) is the only example in Western Australia of an engineering project designed to transport large quantities of potable water by gravity whilst open to the elements. Canning Contour Channel (fmr) had minimal impact on the landscape it traversed. (Criterion 5.1)

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys represents the use of age old design principles and a method of construction considered viable and appropriate in the circumstances of the time but no longer practiced today. (Criterion 5.2)

12. 2 REPRESENTATIVENESS

12.3 CONDITION

The condition of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys and associated siphons ranges from excellent to poor. Some sections are in good condition, with little change to the fabric since construction in 1937.

However, other parts are missing or have been severely damaged through intrusion by rocks or natural bush growth from the surrounding terrain.

12. 4 INTEGRITY

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys have a moderate degree of integrity given their original purpose is clearly discernable but the places are no longer in use.

12. 5 AUTHENTICITY

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys have a high level of authenticity with most of the remaining intact original fabric clearly indicating their original state, form and purpose.

13. SUPPORTING EVIDENCE

The supporting evidence has been compiled by Cathy Day, historian. The evidence has been prepared using the work of Dr Richard Hartley (Engineering Heritage Consultant) and Wendy Brady (Historian) from the Canning Dam Conservation Plan 1998. Also of primary importance to the documentary evidence were the notes prepared by the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board in 1981.

13. 1 DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was a 16 kilometre long series of water channels connected by pipe sections over the gullies. Built between 1935-37 for the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board, Canning Contour Channel (fmr) has a number of associated works such as the stilling chambers (1937) and the Gosnells Screens (1937). It is the only contour channel built in Western Australia for the transport of potable water.

As early as 1878 the Canning River was recognised as a good source of water for the Perth region. Throughout the rest of the 19th century various proposals were made to dam the Canning River and pipe the water to the metropolitan area. In 1897 an engineer Thomas Hodgson surveyed and proposed a possible dam site, this later became Site No.1 for the Canning Dam but it was to be nearly half a century before the dam was to be constructed 1

In 1925 F. Stileman was appointed Engineer in Chief of the Public Works Department. He produced another report on the various options for a dam site and concluded that the Hodgson site chosen in 1897 was almost ideal. Stileman recommended that the construction of a concrete gravity dam should be commenced without delay.

However, the new dam was not commenced in the 1920s owing to the impact of the world Depression. By 1930 it was estimated that 10,000 people in Western Australia were dependent on government assistance. In recognition of the huge unemployment crisis, in 1931 the State Government appointed a special Unemployment Board. The Board recommended the Public Works Department proposal that to commence the construction of the Canning Dam would employ a large number of men and use great quantities of local cement providing further employment opportunities. The decision by the government to commence the building project with an estimated cost of £1,250,000 was popular and reassuring to the Western Australian people. In 1931 clearing the unoccupied, forested valley behind the dam was commenced with between 100 and 200 men employed over six months.²

After a number of proposals for the dam's design (not without interdepartmental controversy) Dumas finalised the plans for the Canning Dam in 1933. The dam was to be 66.4 metres (218 feet) high with a wall level of 205.9metres.³ By Christmas 1933 the preliminary work on the dam was well in hand and the once quiet valley in the Darling Ranges was a scene of intense activity.⁴

By 1934 the dam wall began to take shape. At either side of the valley two steel towers 78 metres high, draped with a network of wires and cables, supported the long chutes used for carrying the mixed concrete down to the wall below.⁵

At the western end of the valley, downstream from the DAM was the Canning Township complete with Post Office, general store, recreation hall, and school. On the slopes of the hillside to the north were the single men's tents and wooden cubicles. The married men's cottages were stepped into the hill at the western end of the valley overlooking the shops. On the south side were the resident engineers' residences and staff quarters.6

In the seven years it took to build the dam many hundreds of workers were employed in the project. In the early phase the need to make quick progress on the wall prior to the onset of winter rains resulted in three shifts a day being worked. Lights were erected because some of this work was done at night.7

The cement came from Rivervale; the sand from a pit near Armadale and the rock was quarried on site. Once the initial plant had been installed the method of placing the concrete in the wall was relatively straightforward. The mixed concrete was hoisted electrically in a skip to the required level on the chuting tower, tipped automatically into the chutes then directed by means of revolving trusses into the wooden frames or boxes prepared beforehand. Granite spalls were then placed by hand in the box and the whole compacted with pneumatic vibrators.

Generally construction work proceeded smoothly and from an engineering point of view there were few setbacks. However, one did occur in the early stages of construction. In March 1934 there was a violent storm bringing 130mm of rain in less than two days. As a result the river rose rapidly and entirely flooded the dam foundation workings. Pumps had to be installed and work resumed three days later. The method used to overcome flooding difficulties was to raise the wall as quickly as possible in the summer months, leaving a gap near the middle through which the winter floodwaters could escape. It was then possible, even in the flood periods, to continue

building up the wall on either side of the gap, which was later filled in when the water level subsided in summer.⁸

The dam was completed in September 1940. The final cost of the dam was significantly less than had been originally budgeted for, and the work was completed on schedule to a date that was calculated by the engineers seven years previously.

Russell Dumas, as Engineer in Charge of Construction, and from 1934 as Engineer of the Metropolitan Water Supply, held overall responsibility for construction of the dam subject to the supervision of E. W. Tindale, the Chief Engineer. Victor Munt and Don Munro, both in their late twenties, were the Resident Engineers who had the day-to-day responsibility for all aspects of the construction of the dam. Other professional workers on site for varying lengths of time included engineers Frederick Lawson, Thomas Hodgson, Frank Botterell, Eric Stoddart, M. Whitfield and W. T. Graham, surveyors Bill Fawcett and J. M. Cohen, draftsmen E. G. Turnball and A. L. Dent. Administrative and clerical duties were carried out under the direction of Harold Riva.9

A large labour force was required for the Canning Dam project and in the main it came from the ranks of the unemployed men who were registered with the state labour bureau and in receipt of sustenance. Within weeks of the project being announced several hundred men were working on the site. Some came with public works experience while others included men unused to manual labour. These men were engaged in operating concrete mixers, hoists and jack hammers or worked in concrete gangs spreading, tamping and vibrating the concrete in boxes. Others were employed in the crushing plant or adjacent quarry as labourers, drillers and powder monkeys. The men employed on the dam wall were organised into gangs under the general foreman Bill Slingsby and the foreman fitter Bob Collins. Those engaged in the quarry or on carting sand and cement were the responsibility of the individual contractors.10

The idea of an open contour water channel had first been recommended by a Mr Ritchie in a water supply report presented in 1920. After comparing the merits of pipeline versus open channel, Mr Ritchie concluded the most economical way to convey water was by open channel.11 In 1935 E. W. Tindale the Director of Works supported this conclusion. He said that a contour channel would keep costs low and as he had seen this type of operation work successfully in Victoria he believed it could also work in Perth. The projected cost for the Contour Channel and associated pipeline was £155,000, with £130,000 advanced on 3 July 1935.12

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was commenced in June 1935 under the supervision of Engineers E.H. Oldham and J. W. Allen. Until its completion in 1937, all water from the Canning to Perth was conveyed through a 762mm pipeline from the dam to Kelmscott and a 914mm pipeline from there to the storage reservoir at Mt Eliza in King's Park. This pipeline was only a temporary measure. Once the rising dam wall increased the storage capacity of the partly completed dam and hence increase the volume of water available, the water was released to be conveyed through Canning Contour Channel (fmr).

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) followed the Canning River Valley for a distance of 16kms to a point in the foothills above Gosnells. From there a 1.37m pipe took the water to Cannington where it connected with mains to Fremantle and Mt Eliza. Canning Contour Channel (fmr) walls were constructed with concrete made with base of local gravel - oolithic laterite, and passed through thick bush and at times traversed extremely steep sided valleys and gullies making access very difficult. Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was cut into the sides of the hills and a number of piped siphons were also built to pass the channel water from one side of the valley to the other or to cross under existing roads.

A statement by the Under Secretary for Water Supply Mr G. H. Long describing the construction of *Canning Contour Channel (fmr)* and the siphon pipes was made in *The West Australian* on 8 August 1936.

Siphons across shallow gullies have been constructed of 30 inch diameter cast iron pipes removed from Stirling Highway and before being reused have been concrete lined and reconditioned. Two lines of these pipes have been laid with lead joints at each siphon, the total length of which is 3,550 feet.

At steeper and deeper valleys 42 inch diameter steel(??) pipes are being laid. The pipes are concrete lined and when buried underground are wrapped on the outside with cement-asbestos......After being placed in position the pipes are welded together, forming one continuous pipe line.

Some of the gorges have precipitous rocky sides and considerable ingenuity has been displayed in placing the pipes in position for welding. The line of the siphon is first surveyed and closely levelled so that the final setting of the pipes can be drawn on a plan before construction is commenced. The line is cleared and a 24inch gauge tram line laid across the valley a few feet from the siphon centre line. The pipes are delivered at the head of the siphon, they are loaded one at a time on low trolleys and lowered by means of a winch to the bottom of the valley. A hoist placed at the head of the siphon then hauls the pipe on its trolleys up that side until it is opposite to its final position. It is then rolled off and jacked into contact with the pipe immediately below it and welded to it. The pipes when not buried are mounted on short masonry piers. 13

Owing to the difficult terrain, mechanical devices used on the building of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) were few. Light rail was laid in the completed parts of the channel to take equipment and pipes to the

workface. Photographic evidence 14 shows a small tractor but by and large the photographs of the channel site works show many men using the basic implements of picks, shovels and wheelbarrows. Simple pulleys, sheer legs, block and tackle were used to position the cast iron siphon pipes. Horse and cart were used to take equipment into the areas that were not too steen

The workers employed on the construction of the channel lived in camps in varying places along the channel. The camps were made of tents with few permanent built structures, except for the occasional stone chimney that was used to dry the workers clothing. The construction of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) required considerable ingenuity and its construction involved backbreaking work for the several hundred sustenance workers involved. The sustenance workers were drawn from the large body of unemployed men created by the severe decline of the Western Australian economy during the Great Depression. However, it must be noted that though many of the men employed were sustenance workers, a large number of the foremen and lead gangers were permanent water supply employees. Despite the hard work the project at least provided work while it lasted. In January 1937 when the channel and the pipe main were completed 320 men were laid off. The actual cost of the work was lower than originally projected coming in at £125,000. 15

Water from the Canning Dam was released into twin parallel stilling chambers, 200m from the dam, passed through a flow recorder and then ran over boarded weirs into a concrete lined open contour channel which carried the water 16km down the Canning Valley to join a trunk main at the Gosnells screens. The valley was crossed in several places by piped siphons, the first being 250m from the stilling chambers. At the Gosnells screens the water was filtered of any polluting matter and chemicals such as fluoride were added through a chlorinating plant (built c1954). The water then entered the pipes for the rest of the journey to Perth.16

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) remained an integral part of the Perth water supply from the time it was first commissioned until 1975 when it was retired once the Canning Tunnel pipeline was opened. During the decades of its operation the maintenance of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was a daily task for up to three gangs of men (one gang checked the Kangaroo Gully Contour). Each day during the summer months, when the channel was flowing, a man walked the full 16km length to report on its operation. The person inspecting the channel would try and rectify any problems found or take note of the position on the channel and a team would then go in with tools to fix the obstruction or cracks in the concrete walls. A sample inspection report from the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and

Drainage Department highlights the types of problems the maintenance workers faced.

Slab Gully siphon being undermined by stormwater from the Karragullen Rd requires stone pitched drain from road culvert leading under pipe distance about 1.5 chains. To be done this summer. Drain carrying Slab Gully Brook under siphon requires patching and concrete wall raising about 1 foot, only a small job, requires doing this summer. 17

Further maintenance work required was the cleaning of algae, scrub bashing to clean the banks either side of the channel and constant checks for the stability of the land on the high side of the channel to prevent rock falls. Other problems were caused by children throwing rocks into the water to create a small dam wall further blocking smooth passage of water flow, 18

From its initial opening Canning Contour Channel (fmr) faced difficulties. Up to 20% of the water released from the Canning Dam leaked from the channel. Constant small breaks and cracks required vigilant maintenance. On top of this when it rained heavily, dirt, bark, leaves and other matter would pollute the water. The Gosnells Screens at the terminus of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) played an important role in the cleaning of the water before it entered the pipeline to Perth. The screens made up of a battery of six fine wire screen enabled the filtering of the water of leaves and the remains of kangaroos, emus, birds, snakes, goannas and much other wildlife that became trapped in the swiftly flowing water of the channel 19 'Prior to the instalment of the chlorinating plant regular weekly samples of water were taken from the screening chamber and examined in the bacteriological laboratories of the Health Department'. In c1954 a chlorinating plant was built at the Gosnells screens along with a large shed used for the storage of chemicals.

A major disruption to Perth's water supplies occurred in 1950 when a section of the contour channel near. Araluen collapsed and water restrictions had to be imposed on the city. Supplies were restored with by the extension of one of the siphons to bypass the collapsed section of the channel. The Canning Dam was the main source for Perth's water supply until supplemented by the Serpentine Dam completed in 1961.21. However despite the demonstration of the vulnerability of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) it was not until the 1970s when an alternative was finally introduced.22

Supervising engineers of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) included E. H. Oldham and J. W. Allen. One of the lead gangers involved (under foreman Mr Babs) was Jim Pyke. He was in charge of about ten men. Jim was a lead burner, which was the fabric used to join the cast iron pipes, though he was multi skilled and was also involved in the pouring of the concrete for the channel walls.23

Maintenance men known to have long-term involvement in Canning Contour Channel (fmr) include Les Dawkins, Keith Buckingham, Johnny Goodall, John Prugnoli and Keith Towton. Les Dawkins worked as a channel cleaner in one of the work gangs from 1972-75 and was still employed by the Water Corporation (previously known as Metropolitan Water Board and Water Authority of Western Australia) in 2002. Les remembers specially made equipment used for maintaining Canning Contour Channel (fmr) such as a mechanical wheelbarrow contraption for removing algae. The whereabouts of the equipment is not known.24

Johnny Goodall was one of the inspection people who on a daily basis walked the full length of the channel (whilst flowing) for his twenty years working life at the Water Corporation. Johnny was responsible for the rockwork that is still clearly visible at the site of the Gosnells screens. He was very proud of his work and maintained the Gosnells screens area at a very high standard.25

Keith Buckingham (from a local Roleystone pioneering family) was a foreman of the maintenance crews and was reputedly a very hard taskmaster. Keith told Les that the workers in the early days of constructing Canning Contour Channel (fmr) travelled back each night to a camp at Kelmscott Depot known as "The Yard".26 John Prugnoli and Keith Towton were both maintenance workers on Canning Contour Channel (fmr) during the 1970s.

Owing to the constant maintenance and problems that arose from the open method of transferring water to Perth from the Canning Dam, the construction of a tunnel from the Canning Dam to Roleystone commenced in 1973. Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was retired in 1975 with the launching of the Canning Tunnel which was officially declared opened by Hon. D. H. O'Neil MLA the Minister for Works and Housing on Friday 17 January 1975.27

As a precautionary measure, Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was maintained and opened to a flow of water in the summer for two years after

its official retirement. During the last years of operation of *Canning Contour Channel (firn)*, Stephen O'Brien the Gosnells Local History Librarian and resident of Roleystone, remembers children playing in the channel. Stephen's father made a canoe which Stephen and his brother floated down the channel when the flow was low and not swiftly flowing. He also has memories of children using surfboards to play on in the channel.²⁸

In 2003, Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys are no longer used for any purpose.

13. 2 PHYSICAL EVIDENCE

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) comprises a series of water channels connected by pipe sections over the gullies. Built between 1935-37 for the Metropolitan Water Supply, Sewerage and Drainage Board, Canning Contour has a number of associated places including the stilling chambers (1937) and the Gosnells Screens (1937). It is the only contour channel built in Western Australia for the transport of potable water.

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys are set in the Canning River Valley. The landform consists of a series of steep to moderately steep sided undulating hills and valleys typical of the Darling Plateau. The natural vegetation formation of the area close to the Canning Dam is tall open forest of jarrah, black butt and marri. Closer to the Martin end of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) the forest thins out and features sheoak, flooded gum, wandoo and banksia vegetation interspersed with rocky outcrops that support little to no vegetation other than low heath shrubby plants.

Canning Contour Chennel (fmr) starts from the Canning Dam in Illawarra and is set in various places throughout the Canning Valley, passing through Roleystone, Araluen, Kelmscott and Martin. It crosses a number of different land ownership boundaries from State Forest, CALM land, private land (with numerous owners) and land still vested in the Water Corporation which Water Corporation would like to dispose of for private use.

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was used to carry the water from the stilling chambers approximately 16kms to the Gosnells screens (actually in Martin), with a number of siphons along the distance when gullies needed to be traversed. Canning Contour Channel (fmr) extends from the stilling chambers approximately 250m on the northern side of the valley to the first siphon. It then continues on the south side of the valley towards Roleystone. The entire length of Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and siphons, from the Canning Dam to the Gosnells screens, was inspected in November 2002.

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) is approximately 1.5m wide at its base with raking sides at 45 degrees banking up to the natural ground level. At

ground level the channel is approximately 5m wide and the overall depth of the channel is approximately 2m deep. The channel was cut from the natural ground or rock as it was found and lined with concrete for its full width. The concrete was made from Western Australian made cement transported to Roleystone by truck and mixed with locally sourced gravel – oolithic laterite.

Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was built using natural rock walls when possible and followed the contours of the land so that the channel ran 'downhill' only slightly over the distance. The cast iron, lead joined siphon pipes (ranging in diameter) took the water across the gullies.

The siphons and drainage pipes were built supported by a series of concrete piers, anchors and bolsters.²⁹ The siphons ranged in size and at some points required overflow pipes to control the flow. This can still be clearly seen at the head of the Stony Gully siphon near Contour Rd.

To control water run off from the slopes above the contour channel a series of drains were built to guide the water to pipes that went either over or under the channel to spillways. This was necessary to endeavour to keep the water as clean as possible in the channel. Another addition to help keep the water free from pollutants was the screens placed at the beginning of each siphon point.

Little is left at the Gosnells screens but it used to be an integral part of the operation of Canning Contour Channel (fmr). The screens filtered the water of foreign bodies before the water went into the pipes that carried the water from this point to Perth. At this stage the chlorinating plant built alongside the channel also treated the water. In 2003 the built features that remain at the Gosnells screens include the footings of the chlorinating plant house, the pad of the chemicals shed, the brick footings of some small structures close to the pipe head and the original channel walls (now filled in with sand).

The original supply pipe that carried water from the valve house opened into a reinforced concrete pair of parallel stilling chambers. These are approximately 35m long, 3m wide and 2.5m high and located on the northern bank of the valley. These chambers originally acted to reduce the velocity and power of the water under pressure before it flowed on to the contour channel.

The concrete structure of the stilling chambers is intact and in good condition although it has not carried water for some time and there is some intrusion from local vegetation. Markings on the wall clearly indicate the water level when the chambers were in use. The timber weir boards at the downstream end of the chambers are intact and are in good condition with little evidence of deterioration. $^{\rm 30}$

Approximately 50m along the contour channel, downstream of the stilling chambers, is a bulge like construction in the channel and a small red brick building, approximately 20m square with a single door entry and gable roof. This held the equipment to measure the flow rate of the water through Canning Contour Channel (fmr). The equipment, which would have extended from this building into the channel, is no longer there. The exterior of the building shows reasonable condition.

In 2002, Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and Two Stone Chimneys ranged in condition and integrity from excellent to poor. Some parts of the channel, particularly siphons, have been removed altogether. The channel is sometimes incredibly clear and walkable while other times it is totally full of vegetation or blocked and half filled with water.

There are two essential parts of Canning Contour Channel (fmr): on Water Corporation land from the Canning Dam to the edge of private land just before Croyden Rd and from Contour Rd through to the terminus of the channel at the Gosnells Screen in Martin off Mills Rd. In these sections the fabric of the channel and siphons is still intact (except for one small section where a siphon has been removed from the Gosnells Screens vicinity) and the condition fairly good. There are some cracks in the concrete walls of the channel and the siphons appear sound with some slight evidence of rusting.

Where Canning Contour Channel (fmr) crosses private land from just before Croyden Rd through to Contour Rd, the channel and siphons have a number of intrusive elements. In some parts the channel is being used as a dumping ground for rubbish and parts of the channel plus siphons have been removed, leaving little evidence of their former existence. There is also evidence of damage in a number of places along the channel where walls have caved in owing to washaways or major rock falls. The sections of the channel that cross private land are not included in the Registered place.

No archaeologist was involved with this study. However according to an assessment made by Historical Archaeologist Gaye Nayton in the Canning Dam Conservation Plan 1998;

The nature of the Stilling Plant Contour Channel and Siphon is such that they do not accumulate archaeological deposits associated with their use. There is likely to be some evidence in the area surrounding them associated with their construction. Evidence of the old pipe line to the stilling chamber exists in the form of a line of concrete supports to the north of the present pipeline. Bottle glass was found scattered over this area. ³¹

Of potential archaeological interest are *Two Stone Chimneys* that still stand along the route of *Canning Contour Channel (fmr)*. Chimney One is situated 80 metres down a track from McNess Drive and 150m from *Canning Contour Channel (fmr)*. The track is one kilometre north of the junction between McNess Drive and the road to the north wall of the Canning Dam.

Other indicators to find the track are powerlines crossing McNess Drive and some non-indigenous trees that mark the track. This site is not accessible by car for the public as the track is chained off.

Chimney Two is visible from McNess Drive on the right hand side of the road whilst travelling north. The chimney is approximately 2.5kms from the junction of McNess Drive and the Canning Dam north wall road. The chimney is located in a designated picnic site.

There is also a third chimney located on Peet Rd 750m north of the junction of Peet Road and Brookton Hwy. It is on the left hand side of the road going north up the hill. It is clearly visible from the road as it is only about five metres from the road edge. It is opposite the junction of Mackie and Peet Rd, Roleystone. This chimney is not included in the Registered place.

The *Two Stone Chimneys* are the remnants of the campsites of workers on *Canning Contour Channel (fmr)*,³² Anecdotal evidence suggests they were inside large temporary sheds built for the workers but this is open for dispute. The *Two Stone Chimneys* show the use of light rails as lintels for the fireplaces.

13. 3 COMPARATIVE INFORMATION

Kangaroo Gully Contour Channel

In 1952 the intake of water into Canning Dam was augmented by the diversion of a stream, from the adjacent Kangaroo Gully catchment, by means of a pipe head dam and contour channel. Supplies from this source which flow into the dam about 800 metres upstream from the wall on the north bank are estimated to be 2,100,00 cubic metres per year.

Though the Kangaroo Gully Contour Channel is built on similar design principles to Canning Contour Channel (fmr), its intent and purpose are different. The Kangaroo Gully Contour Channel, built above the Canning Dam, diverts water into the dam while Canning Contour Channel (fmr) carries the potable water from the dam – the only channel to be used for this purpose in Western Australia. The Kangaroo Gully Contour Channel has not been nominated for any heritage list or register.

South West Irrigation Channels

Other concrete lined contour channels built in the south of the state are used for irrigation purposes only. However, the design of these is based on the same principles for transporting water – principles that go back to Roman times. It is in the construction that Canning Contour Channel (fmr) and the irrigation contour channels differ the most. Owing to the terrain, mechanical excavation was not possible in the Roleystone area so Canning Contour Channel (fmr) was built with manpower using simple tools. The contour channels south of Pinjarra were built with a high degree of mechanisation.

BUSH FOREVER PLANNING INITIATIVES

In December 2000 the Western Australian Government released Bush Forever following an extensive process that included scientific assessment of vegetation significance, consideration of economic and social factors such as zoning and development approvals and public comments.

The Western Australian Government has now advertised for comment Metropolitan Region Scheme Omnibus Amendment 1082/33 and Statement of Planning Policy No. 2.8 Bushland Policy for the Perth Metropolitan Region that together effectively implement Bush Forever. These are described in Planning Bulletin Number 69 (copy following). Copies of the documents are available at the front counter or on the internet at www.wapc.gov.au. Public comment is open until 12 November 2004.

Following gazettal of the Metropolitan Region Scheme Amendments it is intended to issue a delegation that an application on land within or abutting a Bush Forever area should be referred to the Department for Planning and Infrastructure for comment before being determined by the Local Government. However, if the recommendation of the Department for Planning and Infrastructure is unacceptable to the local government the proposal will need to be referred to the Western Australian Planning Commission for a decision. This will increase administrative workload, but should not increase application processing times.

Aspects of the proposal relevant to the City of Armadale include:

- (i) Local governments will need to amend their local schemes to comply with the identified Bush Forever sites once the Metropolitan Region Scheme is amended. However, draft Town Planning Scheme No. 4 is already consistent with the proposed Metropolitan Region Scheme amendments.
- (ii) Specific Policy Measure 5.2.4 (ii) of Statement of Planing Policy No 2.8 identifies best practice decision-making for freehold rural lands affected by Bush Forever that should be followed by Council. In making decisions on development applications or subdivisions within these areas Council will need assess the proposal against a 90% bushland retention target and the suitability or adequacy of long-term protection and management measures. Three lots in Forrestdale, plus eight lots on the north west side of Forrestdale Lake are affected by this Specific Policy Measure. For one of these lots, a 34ha lot south of Forrestdale Lake, the policy permits the Commission to disregard the City's Scheme and permit subdivision to lots over 10ha provided the decision is consistent with the Policy measures already described. Given the policy framework this is considered acceptable.
- (iii) The Statement of Planning Policy includes an expectation that local governments will prepare a bushland protection strategy. This reinforces existing expectations agreed as appropriate by the Australian Local Government Association and the Western Australian Government Association. The Policy states that lack of a formally endorsed bushland protection strategy should not be used as a reason to refuse a planning approval.
- (iv) The Planning Bulletin notes that although currently outstanding, an agreement is currently proposed over Bush Forever site 342C, which is the industrial land on the corner of Anstey and Ranford Roads.

- (v) There is an error in the mapping for both the Metropolitan Region Scheme Amendment and the Statement of Planning Policy. The additional area identified for inclusion in Bush Forever for the lot south of Forrestdale Lake has not been shown (Additional Bush Forever site No 16 in the Bush Forever Information Sheet "Nominated Additional Bush Forever Areas).
- (vi) An area that is mostly well vegetated but which was not identified in Bush Forever adjacent to the City's proposed Golf Course (on the eastern corner of Waterworks and Hanlin Road) is being reserved for Parks and Recreation under the Metropolitan Region Scheme as part of this amendment. This consolidates surrounding Parks and Recreation reservations into one larger area. The subject land is owned by the Department for Planning and Infrastructure.

It is intended to forward a submission to the Western Australian Planning Commission generally supporting the proposals.

Proposed Bush Forever protection areas (for comment)

Purpose

The purpose of this planning bulletin is to advise of a package of statutory planning measures that are being introduced to ensure that bushland protection and management issues are appropriately considered and addressed in planning decisions and actions in the Perth Metropolitan Region. In particular, these measures will give statutory effect to the protection of regionally significant bushland identified in Bush Forever (Government of Western Australia, 2000).

2 Summary

The following complementary statutory planning measures (see Figure 1) have been released for public comment:

- Metropolitan Region Scheme
 Omnibus Amendment No. 1082/33
 (Bush Forever and related lands),
 which proposes to:
 - (i) amend the Metropolitan Region Scheme (MRS) to create Bush Forever protection areas (BFPA) over Bush Forever sites zoned and reserved in the MRS;
 - (ii) amend the MRS to reserve a number of Bush Forever sites and related lands for parks and recreation; and
 - (iii) amend the Metropolitan Region Scheme Text to establish a BFPA and related provisions and requirements.

- 2 A draft Bushland policy for the Perth Metropolitan Region statement of planning policy 2.8 (hereafter referred to as the draft Bushland SPP), which provides:
 - (i) a statutory policy and implementation framework for the protection and management of regionally significant bushland within a BFPA; and
 - (ii) policy measures for other areas of native vegetation, outside BFPA, that support the preparation of local bushland protection strategies by all local governments in the Perth Metropolitan Region.

A Bush Forever newsletter and community guide have also been released to support the above package of measures.

3 Background

Western Australia, and the South-West Botanical Province in which Perth lies, is one of the most biologically diverse regions in the world and home to a broad range of ecological communities and plant species. Aside from its biodiversity values, bushland plays a crucial role in meeting a variety of environmental, social and economic needs (sometimes referred to as ecosystem services) and should therefore be regarded as part of an area's essential environmental infrastructure.

Bush Forever is currently a nonstatutory regional policy under the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) policy framework and has been endorsed by the Western Australian Government, the WAPC and the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) as a whole-of-government bushland protection policy for the Swan Coastal Plain portion of the Perth Metropolitan Region (PMR).

Bush Forever identifies 51200 hectares of regionally significant bushland and any associated wetlands for protection and management in 287 Bush Forever sites. It seeks to protect and manage these sites through a variety of mechanisms. Bush Forever also recognises the scope to use land use planning processes to protect bushland areas, while accommodating future development requirements and development that is compatible with bushland protection objectives or provides for an improved environmental outcome. These planning approaches are referred to as negotiated planning solutions and apply to both urban and rural zoned lands to varying degrees. These solutions may be supported by other statutory or non statutory mechanisms, which provide advice, assistance and financial incentives for bushland protection and management, such as conservation covenants. Bush Foreve also proposes the reservation of lands of high conservation value for eventual acquisition and management by government.

To support these planning approaches, Bush Forever proposed the establishment of a special control area (referred to as a Bush Forever protection area herein) in the MRS to cover Bush Forever sites and the preparation of a complementary statement of planning policy.

4 Bush Forever protection areas

Introduction of a BFPA requires amendments to both the MRS (under the provisions of section 33 of the Metropolitan Region Town Planning Scheme Act 1959) and the Metropolitan Region Scheme Text, both of which form part of Omnibus Amendment 1082/33. BFPA are based on the special control area provisions contained in part 6 of the Model Scheme Text (WAPC, July 2000), which were given effect by the Town Planning Amendment Act 1999. This regulation requires that local government town planning schemes comply with the Model Scheme Text.

Special control areas identify spatial areas that are significant for a particular reason and have special provisions that target a single issue or related set of issues, such as natural resource management. The BFPA special control area, can best be described as a policy overlay in to planning schemes to deal with regionally significant bushland protection issues that overlap zone and reserve boundaries and require special consideration. BFPA provisions apply in addition to the underlying local government town planning scheme zoning provisions. Where there are inconsistencies, BFPA provisions override zoning provisions. BFPA also provides government agencies and land valuers with a statutory mechanism to deliver local rate and state land tax incentives to landowners, in addition to incentives that may be provided through other mechanisms, such as statutory conservation covenants.

Once the BFPA and its related provisions are incorporated in the MRS and the Metropolitan Region Scheme Text, local governments, under section 35A of the Metropolitan Region Town Planning Scheme Act 1959, will be required to initiate amendments to their town planning schemes within three months of gazettal of the MRS amendment, to ensure consistency with the MRS.

Changes to the boundaries of BFPA and subsequent amendments to the MRS may be required through the ongoing implementation of Bush Forever. However, BFPA boundary changes will not generally be a requirement prior to the determination of a proposal where the proposal is consistent with the Metropolitan Region Scheme Text provisions for BFPA and the underlying zone in the MRS.

A local government may also amend its town planning scheme to apply complementary and more detailed site-specific provisions for any given BFPA, provided they are consistent with Metropolitan Region Scheme Text provisions as a minimum requirement. For example, the Shire of Serpentine-Jarrahdale has introduced a conservation zone for some Bush Forever sites in its locality, with attendant local rate incentives and management plan requirements.

5 The draft Bushland policy for the Perth Metropolitan Region statement of planning policy 2.8 (hereafter referred to as the draft Bushland SPP)

The purpose of the draft Bushland SPP is to guide and inform agencies, authorities, landowners and the broader community on bushland protection and management issues to be taken into account, and given effect to, by the WAPC and local governments when considering a proposal or in undertaking decision-making which is likely to have an adverse impact, direct or indirect, on regionally significant bushland within

This policy has been prepared in the context of the WAPC's policy framework (see Statement of Planning Policy No.1: Sate Planning Framework and Planning Bulletin No.68) and is a supplementary policy under the Statement of Planning Policy No. 2: Environment and Natural Resources Policy (Government of Western Australia, 2003).

Statements of planning policy are prepared under section 5AA Town Planning and Development Act 1928, which states that local government and the Town Planning Appeals Tribunal must have due regard to statements of planning policy. This requirement gives significant weight to this policy in the exercise of planning and decision-making. Any proposal that deviates from this policy will not be supported without overriding justification.

The Environmental Protection
Authority (EPA) has provided section
16(e) advice on Bush Forever to the
Minister for the Environment (EPA
Bulletin 1007, January 2001), which
outlines the EPA's role in relation to
the possible referral of a proposal
affecting a Bush Forever site. While
not constraining other legislation, it is
expected that if a reasonable outcome
through a negotiated planning
solution is achieved within a BFPA
through compliance with the draft
Bushland SPP, a proposal is unlikely
to be formally assessed under Part IV
of the Environmental Protection Act
1986. (see also Guidance Statement
No.10, EPA, 2003)

5.1 Policy measures for Bush Forever protection areas

The policy measures for BFPA in the draft Bushland SPP provide a robust and transparent basis for decision-making and for determining reasonable outcomes and the acceptability of a proposal.

The policy measures apply specific land use planning controls, issues for consideration, information requirements and planning assessment and decision-making criteria and processes (see General Policy Measures, s5.1, which cover all BFPA).

The draft Bushland SPP also includes Specific Policy Measures (see \$5.2) for particular site implementation categories, which have been assigned to each BFPA. The Specific Policy Measures apply in addition to the general policy measures for any given site. Map 1 at the rear of the draft

Bushland SPP identifies BFPA and their associated site implementation categories.

The following key policy measures for BFPA are of particular note:

- Recognition of regionally significant bushland and its management as a primary purpose in a BFPA as part of an area's essential environmental infrastructure (see s5.1(i)). In a number of circumstances, will be a case of 'how development fits in with bushland rather than how bushland fits in with development'.
- That all reasonable steps are taken to avoid, minimise or mitigate any likely adverse impacts, direct or indirect on regionally significant bushland (see 85.1 (ii)).
- Recognition of existing commitments and approvals and wider social and economic considerations (see Policy objectives and negotiated planning solution criteria) (in Schedule 1).
- The following planning assessment process where there is likely to be an unavoidable adverse impact, direct or indirect:
 - A requirement for a Statement of Environmental Effects and an Environmental Management Plan for significant adverse impacts (see s5.1(iii)).
 - Negotiated planning solution criteria (see s5.1(iii) and Schedule 1) as a basis for determining a reasonable outcome, including: bushland retention benchmarks for different categories of land in private ownership; adoption of bushland-sensitive design measures; a requirement for long-term protection, management and minimisation measures; support for wider strategic outcomes; consideration of mitigation and off set measures; and support for development which provides for an improved

environmental outcome, such as rural subdivision for conservation and the provision of large bush blocks.

- A presumption against clearing within the Bush Forever Reserve (proposed and existing) site implementation category (see s5.2.1(i) with exemptions indicated), which includes land within the current conservation estate and parks and recreation reserves in the MRS.
- The protection of regionally significant bushland within the government lands and public infrastructure site implementation category as a priority (see s5.2.3(i)); and support for the co-ordinated consideration of an agency's land assets (see s5.2.3(ii) referred to as Bush Forever sustainability strategies) as part of wider government agency sustainability action plans (as required under the Hope for the Future: Western Australian State Sustainability Strategy, Government of Western Australia, 2033).

In general terms, the General and Specific Policy Measures do not prevent development where it is consistent with the draft Bushland SPP. In addition, existing land uses can continue at their existing approved levels of activity.

Compensation is limited to circumstances where a town planning scheme permits development on land for no purpose other than a public purpose, or prohibits wholly or partially the continuation of an existing lawful use. Where land is not proposed to be reserved and acquired by the state, compensation will generally not arise from the establishment of BFPA on zoned land, as land or property should not be deemed injuriously affected by reason of making any provision in a town planning scheme for the purpose of protecting the environment (Item 10 and 11A of Schedule 1 of the Town Planning and Development Act 1928) and the controls do not permit development for no purpose other than a public purpose.

The planning assessment process for BFPA will increase the scrutiny of proposals and may cause longer assessment times. It is therefore suggested that, to minimise delay, proponents should undertake preapplication consultation with the Department for Planning and Infrastructure (DPI) Bush Forever office. For more complex applications, it is recommended that an environmental planning consultant be employed. The key to developing proposals for BFPA is to regard the policy measures and processes in the draft Bushland SPP as an integral part of the design process, rather than a bureaucratic chetcale.

More detailed guidelines, planning bulletins, practice notes and operational policies will supplement the policy measures identified in the draft Bushland SPP, as required, to assist the planning assessment process. Preliminary draft guidelines on particular matters, such as requirements for statements of environmental effects, are currently available and copies may be obtained from the DPTs Bush Forever office.

5.2 Bush Forever protection areas – current status of key negotiated planning solutions

Negotiated planning solutions (NPS) apply to a proposal or to decision-making that is likely to have an adverse impact, direct or indirect, on regionally significant bushland within a BFPA, consistent with the draft Bushland SPP.

Key negotiations for BFPA with current commitments and approvals (particularly for sites with urban, urban deferred or industrial zonings) have been advanced as priority. Agreed conservation outcomes are reflected in the BFPA boundaries in the MRS amendment and draft Bushland SPP (Map 1), where possible. Where full agreement has been reached, the area to be protected for conservation is also identified for parks and recreation in the MRS amendment, and in the Bush Forever reserves, proposed and existing, site implementation category on Map 1 in

the draft Bushland SPP. These include Bush Forever sites 23, 67, 122, 125E, 253B, 295D, 322C, 395B and 492. In accordance with Bush Forever, the area to be set aside for conservation is generally ceded free for of cost for conservation over and above normal open space contributions.

Many of the other key NPS are also at an advanced stage but propose conservation areas may not be suitable for inclusion in the parks and recreation reserve in the MRS at this stage (Table 1 at the rear of this planning bulletin identifies the status of the key outstanding NPS). Where a site is at an advanced stage of negotiation (i.e. **Agreed or **Agreement Proposed in Table 1), boundary adjustments have been made to the BFPA in the MRS amendment and in the draft Bushland SPP (Map 1) to reflect the area proposed to be set aside for conservation. Where the area to be set aside for conservation is still to be determined, the total BFPA subject to a NPS is identified in the MRS amendment and in the draft Bushland SPP (Map 1).

Once a NPS is finalised, any necessary adjustments to the BFPA boundary will be made to reflect the conservation outcome. The proposed conservation area will also be reserved for parks and recreation in the MRS with the conservation area set aside free of cost, unless agreed otherwise.

5.3 Local bushland

Bush Forener supports the preparation of local bushland protection strategies by all local governments in the Perth Metropolitan Region. This will enable the identification of locally significant bushland for protection and management. Local bushland protection strategies should form part of a wider local biodiversity strategy, or similar, where possible, which may identify both vegetated and nonvegetated natural areas.

The proposed clearing permit regulations under proposed amendments to the *Environmental Protection Act* 1986 also highlight the

need for comprehensive native vegetation assessments as a requirement of future planning proposals that involve the clearing of native vegetation. Endorsed local bushland protection strategies, which should consider wider social and economic considerations, may provide a robust strategie basis for the consideration of clearing permits.

The draft Bushland SPP supports the proactive selection of locally significant bushland sites again consistent environmental, social and economic criteria. An implementation strategy should be an important component of any local bushland protection strategy and the implementation and planning assessment process for BFPA (as outlined in the draft Bushland SPP) may provide an appropriate planning framework for local bushland protection measures. To provide greater certainty and consistency, the relevant council and the WAPC should also seek to formally endorse local bushland protection strategies as a basis for future decision-making, set within the context of wider local planning strategies.

The Model Scheme Text (Town Planning Amendment Regulations 1999) identifies a need for local planning strategies as a basis for local government town planning schemes. A local bushland protection strategy, biodiversity strategy or similar, should form an important comp of wider local planning, natural resource management and sustainability strategies at the state. regional and local level. Local planning strategies can provide a rationale and justification for future land use zonings and policies at the local level that are aimed at the protection of locally significant bushland areas identified for protection as part of an endorsed local bushland protection strategy, while also providing a framework to appropriately consider wider environmental, social and econconsiderations

In the interim, the lack of an adopted local bushland protection strategy should not be used as a reason to

refuse a planning proposal, particularly for land already committed and approved for development. Each application should be considered on its merits, with information requirements (possibly similar in form to the Statement of Environmental Effects, as outlined in the draft Bushland SPP) to support the assessment of a proposal involving the clearing of potential locally significant bushland or native vegetation.

The Western Australian Local Government Association (through support from Bush Forever, local government and the commonwealth) has developed draft criteria for the selection of locally significant natural areas and draft Local Government Biodiversity Planning Guidelines (fune 2004).

6 Metropolitan Region Scheme text amendments

The proposed amendments to the Metropolitan Region Scheme Text seek to establish Bush Forever Protection Areas and include the following key elements:

Currently, under c16 of the Metropolitan Region Scheme Text, 'permitted development' (as identified) is exempt from approval under the MRS, nerally in accordance with a range of reserves under the MRS. The exemptions do not apply to development which involves the clearing of regionally significant bushland. Under the proposed amendments, any development within a BFPA will require the prior approval of the WAPC (subject to the normal delegation provisions, see Section 7) regardless of whether it is 'permitted development' to enable any indirect impacts on regionally significant bushland to be considered. Where there are no indirect impacts, the approval process will remain straight forward with regards to bushland protection issues

2 In considering an application to carry out development in a BFPA, the WAPC will have due regard to Bushland policy for the Perth Metropolitan Region statement of planning policy 2.8.

7 Notice of delegation development control powers under the Metropolitan Region Scheme to local governments

Following final approval and gazettal of the above measures to establish BFPA and its related provisions, it is proposed that the Notice of Delegation under the Western Australian Planning Commission Act 1985 be amended with regard to development control powers for BFPA under the MRS to local governments.

Under the current notice of delegation, most development control powers under the MRS are delegated to local government, with the WAPC retaining a number. With the introduction of BFPA, these delegation provisions are retained.

However, under proposed amendments to the notice of delegation, an application for development on land within or abutting a BFPA which, in the opinion of the local government, is likely to have an adverse impact (direct or indirect) on regionally significant bushland within a BFPA, shall be referred to the DPI (Bush Forever office) for comment and recommendation before being determined by the local government.

If the recommendation provided by the DPI is not acceptable to the local government, the application will be referred immediately to the WAPC for determination.

In the interim, prior to the proposed changes to the Notice of delegation, local government is advised to consult with the DPI (Bush Forever office) where, is the option of local government, an application is likely to have an adverse impact, direct or indirect, on regionally significant bushland within a BFPA.

8 Conclusion

The establishment of a statutory planning policy and implementation framework for bushland protection in the Perth Metropolitan Region through the introduction of a BFPA, represents an important landmark for land use planning in Western Australia and places the Western Australian planning system at the forefront of planning for bushland conservation.

Importantly, the policy measures in the draft Bushland SPP seek to closely align land use planning with environmental protection and management. They also aim to secure long-term and improved environmental outcomes through planning processes set within the context of wider social and economic considerations, and represent an important step toward performance and effects-based' planning for bushland protection, which is more closely aligned with the concept of sustainability.

The approaches adopted for BFPA can be equally applied to other bushland or natural areas of significance and identified for protection as part of other local and regional strategies prepared for the Perth Metropolitan Region and other areas of significant land use change throughout the state.

Proposed Bush Forever protection areas - package of statutory planning measures


