# **MAYOR'S** Message


### Welcome to the December 2023 edition of City Views.


# **ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF COUNTRY**

# Around Our City

### **ROLEYSTONE KARRAGULLEN VOLUNTEER BUSH FIRE BRIGADE** opening/funding

A sneak peak of the new state-of-the-art fire station at Roleystone's Springdale Oval sporting reserve was welcomed by the Roleystone Karragullen Volunteer Bush Fire Brigade who will now call this facility home.

The City's amazing volunteers put their lives on the line to keep our community safe through the long hot summer months – year in and vear out.

The volunteers now have modern facilities, fit for purpose, with cutting edge technology to help them respond to emergencies quicker and more efficiently in one of the state's most extreme bushfire risk areas.

It features some state-of-the-art systems for decontamination and cleaning of appliances, clothing, equipment and personnel, and training and education facilities.

The City is grateful to DFES and the Federal Government for their support of our wonderful volunteers, and their contributions that helped us bring this project to life.

The Neerigen Brook Culvert, built on passes through, underneath the road.

The headwalls to the culverts were constructed many years ago from sandbags with cement mortar between them. With persistent rains last year, this mortar has been washed away, resulting in movement of the headwall. This has rendered it unable to adequately retain the soil behind it, allowing water ingress which will cause damage to the road and path network.





INCREASING OUR native habitat

For Bedfordale residents Kelvin and Emma Wright, the City of Armadale's private land conservation program Habitat Links has assisted them to increase their canopy of native plants on their hills property.

Every year the City encourages eligible residents to sign up to the program with 126 property owners participating this year to receive an allotment of over 8000 dryland and wetland plants. The Wrights joined the program in 2021, after reading about it in the City Views Newsletter, in the hope that an increase to their canopy would attract more birds and bees to their property.

The Wrights were the winners of the annual Habitat Links prize this year, and received a small tree popper which is a type of weeding tool that will make removing unwanted weeds from their 5 acres hills property easier.

Kelvin said they purchased the property because it was a relatively untouched Jarrah and Marri bushland block, amongst predominately low-lying native shrubs and grass trees.

"Our desire was to live amongst the natural bushland and leave it pretty much untouched. Our primary drive to connect with the Habitat Links team was to seek advice for a plan to try and increase the count of mid-size native plants to attract birds and bees. After the initial walk around the block with the team we were given a target list of native trees to introduce to our property.

"We have always had a steady population of red tail cockatoo's visiting the block to help themselves to new season honky nuts and recently the Baudin's have been helping to prune our taller trees.

"We are hoping in coming years we will see the new native additions start to stand taller and play their role in attracting insects, birds, and other wildlife.

"While there has never been a shortage of 28's visiting, we have certainly noticed an increase in Red Cap parrots and also spotted a couple of pairs of Western Rosella's recently.

"Some of the flowering native climbers we planted have already attracted more bees to the vegetable garden, which is what we wanted to achieve.

"We are not horticultural experts by any stretch of the imagination. But to have knowledgeable people available within the City's Habitat Links Program to talk with, and get advice, helps to ensure we are adding to the native environment -

and all creatures great and small are the beneficiaries", said Kelvin Wright.

> Participants of the program receive technical advice of native plant species selection, planting techniques to maximize survival, weed management, feral animal management, creating wildlife habitat and erosion management.

The Armadale Gosnells Landcare Group (AGLG) continues to connect people to nature through its annual planting events across the City.





# Get prepared for BUSHFIRE SEASON

# DID YOU KNOW THE FIRE DANGER RATING SYSTEM HAS CHANGED?

Fire Danger Ratings are important because they provide people with information so they can take action to protect themselves and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of bushfires. Ratings are calculated using a combination of weather forecasting and information about vegetation that could fuel a fire. They do not indicate the chance of a fire occurring, although this is a common misconception.



### **MODERATE**

### Plan and Prepare Most fires can be controlled

- Stay up to date and be alert for fires in your area.
- Check your bushfire plan. If you do not have a plan, make one now.

### HIGH

### Be ready to act Fires can be dangerous

- There's a heightened risk. Be alert for fires in your area.
- If a fire starts, your life and property may be at risk.
- Review your bushfire plan. If you do not have a plan, make one now.
- Leave bushfire risk areas if necessary.

### **EXTREME**

# Take action now Fires will spread quickly and be extremely dangerous

- These are dangerous fire conditions.
- Put your bushfire plan into action.
- If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, plan to leave early.
- Avoid travel through bushfire risk areas.

### CATASTROPHIC

For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas

If a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost.

• These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire.

- It may be too late to make a bushfire plan. Prepare your emergency kit and choose where you will go and different ways to get there.
- Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.
- Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions. You may not be able to leave, and help may not be available.

### FIREBREAKS

All properties over 5,000m<sup>2</sup> must have a firebreak installed on or before **30 November 2023** and maintained until **31 March 2024**.

### **TOTAL FIRE BAN**

During a total fire ban you must not light a fire in the open air or use any equipment in the open air that is likely to emit sparks.

This includes the use of wood fuel BBQs, pizza ovens, chimeneas and incinerators; angle grinders, welders & chainsaws; lawn mowers or brush cutters; candles.

# DATES TO REMEMBER BURNING PROHIBITED

1 December 2023 to 31 March 2024

### RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD

(permits required)

1 October 2023 to 30 November 2023 and 1 April 2024 to 31 May 2024

No burning on Sundays or Public Holidays.
