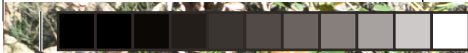

Creating homes and highways for wildlife

Our bushland, wetlands and watercourse areas are the homes and highways for wildlife. Birds, reptiles, a range a of animals, fish and insects require native trees, shrubs, grasses and other vegetation for food and shelter. They also use our natural areas to move around in search for food, water, shelter and breeding partners.

Australia is second in the world for biodiversity loss. Our wildlife and ecosystems face many threats and we are losing species and habitat at an unprecedented rate.

We live in an area that boasts natural beauty and we all have a role to play in taking care of our natural environment to conserve and improve it for generations to come.

Are you a City of Armadale resident whose property is zoned as Special Residential, Rural Living or Rural, and contains or is adjacent to priority conservation bushland, wetlands or watercourses?

You may be eligible to receive free native seedlings and ongoing support around the development and implementation of re-vegetation and habitat creation projects.

Our unique environment provides habitat for a range of wildlife including:

- Black Cockatoos

- Southwestern snake-necked turtles
- Quendas
- Wallabies

Our natural environment and the species that inhabit it need our help to conserve the existing and create new habitat and ecological linkages connecting bushland with wetlands and watercourses.
