Imagine Armadale 20 years from now

Over the last few months the City engaged extensively with the Armadale community to guide the preparation of a new Local Planning Strategy (LPS), which will provide a vision and plan for the City's future growth and development.

An LPS Community Survey conducted by the City in June 2022 attracted over 600 responses and provided valuable feedback, which will be combined with resident's feedback from LPS community workshops conducted at four different locations throughout the City in July. These will assist the LPS vision to identify and consider the community's needs and aspirations on what living, working and playing in Armadale will look like in the next 20 plus years.

Another community engagement opportunity will involve a number of community open-days and provide residents with a further opportunity to have a say and contribute to preparation of the draft Local Planning Strategy.

Once Council has endorsed and the State Government's Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage has certified the draft Local Planning Strategy meets legislative requirements in 2023, the Strategy will be advertised for public review and written community submissions before Council adopts it for final State Government approval.

Cohhectih WITH NATURE

We are fortunate to have such a diverse range of bushland reserves within the City of Armadale, many of which feature unique walk trail experiences. These natural areas are rich in plant diversity and provide habitat for native fauna.

The City's Environment team pay an essential role in protecting our natural environment – and we would like to share with you some recent success stories of their amazing work!



Recently dedicated research team from Murdoch University, the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions and City staff set traps for quendas in nature reserves in Roleystone.

Throughout the night, the research team progressively collected quenda in soft bags, before being carefully transported to a mobile vet clinic in Roleystone where they were closely monitored, sampled

for mange and other parasites then transported back to the capture location.

Quenda are a Priority 4 species in WA, meaning their ongoing survival is dependent on conservation and close monitoring of the population.

Outcomes from this research will provide valuable insights into the extent and severity of the occurrence of mange in the Roleystone quenda population.





GILBERT FROM HILBERT

When two possums were rescued after a local bushfire 18 months ago, it took a whole team of specialists working in land management and wildlife conservation, monitoring and rehabilitation to get them back on their feet and into the trees.

After treatment and a long rehabilitation at WA Wildlife Hospital, Blossom and Gilbert were rehomed in habitat boxes constructed by students from Carey Baptist College and installed by Simon Cherriman, an industry leader

in wildlife conservation and habitat supplementation.

Motion-sensing cameras near the release site were installed by the City, to help monitor the possums' progress.

"It's great that the City has partnered with WA Wildlife and Carey Baptist College to achieve this small but valuable local conservation achievement," Mayor Ruth Butterfield.



Recently, Mayor Ruth Butterfield joined our Environment Team at a City-managed reserve to help research fellows from the WA Museum band Forest Red-Tailed Black Cockatoo chicks. Banding helps researchers monitor bird movements which assists research of population numbers, foraging habits, and migratory patterns.

The City's Environment Team also provides artificial breeding hollows, such as cockatubes, to meet this species' nesting requirements

"Across City of Armadale Reserves, we have installed over 80 habitat boxes. The boxes are placed in natural areas to provide nesting hollows for fauna such as Black Cockatoos, possums, phascogales (Australian marsupials), and microbats".

FREE-VERGE TREES!

Applications close November.

Did you know the City provides a limited number of street trees to residents on an annual basis, as part of its Street Tree Planting Program.

One tree per 20 metre road frontage is available for residents to request for the verge adjoining their property – you will need to commit to watering the tree until established, approximately three years.

The most appropriate species for a location is selected based on local conditions, climate and strategies. The City preferably aims to create a 'boulevard effect' by planting the same type of tree within each street, however specific species requests are considered.



Investing in our youth

With the estimated population growth from 91,000 to 150,000 expected in the City of Armadale in the next 20 years, there has never been a more important time to invest in our youth.

The City is actively assisting with education and training for our young people through ongoing collaborations with State and Federal agencies. This helps to support people in securing jobs to reduce Armadale's unemployment rate (6.6%) which is historically higher than Western Australia's rate (2.9%).

During this year's National Skills Week in August, in conjunction with the Armadale Industry Training Hub, the City sponsored Aprentifest.

Aprentifest provided opportunities for Year 12 students to explore career interests, prepare for interviews and connect with suitable businesses that offered a post school qualification through an Apprenticeship or Traineeship pathway.

The City will continue working closely with the Armadale Industry Training Hub and the local Jobs & Skill Centre. Armadale's future is bold, exciting and we're ready to grow.




RATING SYSTEM

To improve the fire danger forecasting, and strengthen how fire authorities communicate bushfire danger to improve community safety, a new fire danger rating system went live across Australia on 1 September 2022.

There will now be a simplified system of four levels with action-oriented messages and feature an 'off' level for days where no proactive action is required.
